

TOUR OF BASIN FARMS SET FOR NEXT THURSDAY

A farm tour has been arranged by the county agent's office and farm organizations for Thursday, August 22, to see various interesting new developments in agriculture. During the day some of the things to be viewed are excellent fields of strawberry clover, good pastures for alkali land, dry land grass nurseries or trials including Michel's grass, fields of dry land grasses, weed control by cultivation and use of chemicals, Ladak alfalfa, etc.

Schedule for the day is as follows:

9 a. m.—Leave from county fairgrounds.

9:15 a. m.—Shasta way—Griffith farm—Control of Canadian thistle by cultivation, as well as plots showing various methods of control, and results.

9:45 a. m.—Altamont—Byrd Tompkins—Small field of excellent strawberry clover. This is the clover that grows particularly well on alkali land and is an excellent forage crop.

10:15 a. m.—Miller Hill—Wallace Reed—Irrigated grass and clover pasture on strong alkali land.

11 a. m.—Pine Grove—Andrew Collier—Large field of dry land created wheat grass.

12 noon—Hildebrand—Jesse Drew—Dry land forage crop trials. Approximately 40 grasses in this dry land nursery including Michel's grass.

12:30 p. m.—Lunch—Hildebrand grange hall. Bring your own lunch—coffee will be provided.

1:30 p. m.—Hildebrand—S. K. Hartzler farm—Old stand of Ladak alfalfa.

2:15 p. m.—Bonanza—Santford Jones ranch near oil well—40 acres strawberry clover.

3:30 p. m.—Lone Pine—S. P. right-of-way near Merrill highway—79 county weed control plots demonstrating white top control.

Anyone interested in agriculture or any of the subjects mentioned is cordially invited to attend. Everyone should make provision for their own luncheon, coffee being provided at the Hildebrand grange hall in Hildebrand. Time will be taken out for lunch at 12:30.

REDHEADS TO MEET AT OREGON FAIR

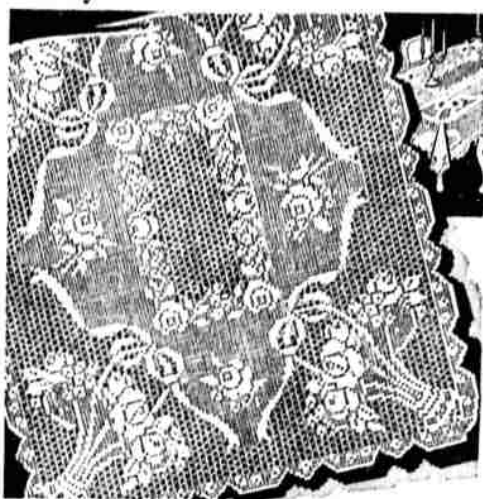
TECHNOCRACY MEETING TO BE HELD IN KLAMATH

Learn When and How to Make Use of Canned Food Articles

Canned foods have their part in the drive for economy. But you must know when to use them. Many canned vegetables and fruits are at some seasons much cheaper than the corresponding product in its fresh state. The canned product, when cheaper, also has the advantage of requiring very little fuel, time and effort in preparation.

In buying canned goods the grade and size of the container make a marked difference in cost but not in wholesomeness, and for the most part, not in food value. Families who are very limited in food money and are therefore following one of the cheaper diet plans are wise to buy cheaper grades and to buy in the largest container that the family can use to advantage.

If the markets are abundant with local vegetables and fruits, or if wild greens grow free in the fields near you, greens such as dandelion, mustard, lambs-quarters and such, use these low valuable greens and vegetables with some of the canned foods your family enjoys because of their high flavor and seasoning.

In that way, you will combine one very cheap type of food with a somewhat higher priced food and thereby keep within your budget and at the same time add novelty and extra flavor to the menus.

There is a canned chili, which comes packed in tins on which is printed the exact number of servings in the can and also recipes for using. This quality product is the kind of thing to keep on the shelves in summer for quick but satisfactory meals. Turn the heated chili into parboiled green pepper cups and serve with an inexpensive vegetable and a large green salad.

Here's a recipe using well-flavored condensed tomato soup with macaroni and cheese. The result will be a one dish meal, adequate in vitamins and nutrition, and popular with all members of the family. Serve with a green salad.

Macaroni and Cheese
Two tablespoons butter, 3 cups macaroni, cooked, 4 cup milk, 1 can condensed tomato soup, 2 cup grated cheese.

add cooked macaroni. Heat well, then add milk. Cook until macaroni has absorbed all the liquids. Then add tomato soup and grated cheese. Heat until the cheese is well melted and the flavors blended. Be sure the macaroni absorbs all the milk before adding other ingredients, otherwise the sauce may curdle.
