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Weekend Roundup

ELSEWHERE in this paper today are remarks and law citations from Secretary of State Earl Snell, bearing out our repeated contention that the practice of voting in precincts in which the voter no longer resides is a violation of the law. It is an improper condition that is widespread in Klamath county, and should be thoroughly cleaned up before the forthcoming election on November 5.

It is safe to say that there is virtually no intention wilfully to violate the law by the citizens who are registered in the wrong precincts in this county. But the point is that this IS a violation, punishable by fine or imprisonment, and the intent to do no wrong is not a valid excuse for the violator.

As we have said before, the most serious aspect of this improper registration and voting is that it makes it possible for persons not residing in a city or other municipal division to go into that municipality and vote on measures affecting it exclusively, as for instance the imposition of a special levy on the property of the district.

The law as quoted by Secretary of State Snell is plain, the impropriety of non-resident registration has been widely publicized, and there can be no excuse for any local people failing to correct their registration before the registration books are closed this fall.

It is not just baloney for home consumption when we say that the tax and assessment record system now being used in this county is outstanding in the state—and we have support for that statement in the fact that a delegation of Willamette valley officials came here the other day to look the system over.

Since the system was installed, County Assessor Charles H. Mack has received inquiries about it not only from Oregon but all parts of the country. Visiting officials have been impressed with this modernization that is logical, sound and economical. Assessor Mack worked out the plan, with the cooperation of Sheriff Lloyd L. Low, and the county court wisely approved it.

REQUESTS to keep court records out of the paper do not reach us so much as they used to, due to a well established policy that is now pretty widely known, but we still have to say "no" to occasional pleadings of this sort.

This newspaper has a strict policy of carrying the news on all drunken driving cases and the more serious misdemeanors, and all felony cases, which are filed in the courts here. For us to undertake to make exceptions for the benefit of certain individuals would be unfair and put us in the position of having to judge the merits of one case against another. This we refuse to do. Instead, we carry news on the records as the cases are filed, and we carry news on the final disposition of each case.

That is a fair principle which we must follow.

COUNTY JUDGE U. E. Reeder had a ready answer the other day for a delegation of substantial taxpayers who reminded him of the taxes they pay in asking for an improvement.

The judge asked the visitors if they paid taxes because they wanted to and as a voluntary contribution to the welfare of the community? He went on to say that if each taxpayer could come before the court and demand certain things on the basis of the amount of taxes he paid, there are certain individuals who could require that the county construct paving entirely around their properties, regardless of the general public service of such paving.

Taxes must be collected on the assessed value of property. They must be spent where they will do the greatest public good.—M. E.

News Behind THE NEWS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17 — Pressure-heat never traveled faster or more furiously than it has sped by wire, phone and messenger from Washington to Wendell Willkie to influence his stand on the draft bill.

Even after his Elwood acceptance speech went to press, a final administration appeal was conveyed through third parties to the republican nominee to save the draft bill by a firm declaration for it. Pressure of the Wheeler-Norris opposition had grown so fast the administration leaders were afraid the measure would be fatally postponed or disastrously amended.

Thirty republican congressmen are reliably reported to have framed, signed and dispatched a telegram urging upon the nominee the exactly opposite course. Willkie's good friends, Representatives Bruce Barton and Halleck, were also importuned privately by the republican draft opposition to use their influence on him.

Two old friends of Willkie, reportedly closest to his ear on the subject of the draft and foreign affairs, are Anne O'Hare McCormick, the New York Times foreign affairs expert, and General Johnson. They both strongly advocated the draft.

CUDAHY CASE

The administration's repudiation of Ambassador Cudahy turned out instead to be a repudiation of his repudiator, Sumner Welles, undersecretary of state.

Mr. Welles never crawled out on a limb ill-advisedly. When he demanded the notes on Cudahy's London remarks for the purpose of reprimanding the ambassador, it was naturally assumed he exercised his usual discretion of getting his orders from above. Even later when Cudahy landed in New York the ambassador encountered a White House cold shoulder. He begged leave of newsmen at the landing field to telephone the White House, but returned sometime later confessing he had been "unable to get in touch with the party he wanted."

Reporters could not believe their ears when Mr. Cudahy emerged from a delayed conference with the president two days later and announced he had not only NOT been reprimanded but did not even intend to resign.

Only explanation current outside the sanctum sanctorum is that Mr. Cudahy contemplates making his usual contribution to the democratic campaign fund, and offering other valuable political services in his doubtful home state of Wisconsin. (He stumped for Roosevelt four years ago and a "John Cudahy" is listed as a contributor of \$3000.)

CUDAHY EXPLAINS

It would not have been hard for Mr. Roosevelt to forgive Mr. Cudahy even without a contribution. The story as he told it to the president was:
