

Soroptimists Plan Union Creek Picnic

British Magazine Article Recounts Impressive Ambulance Presentation at Ceremony

Definite plans for the annual picnic of the Soroptimist club were made by members at their business luncheon when Union Creek was decided upon as the place, August the twenty-fifth as the time and half past one o'clock as the hour. Mrs. Gwendolyn Wright, chairman of the social committee, with Miss Catherine Gaylord will have charge of the luncheon. Reservations will be handled by Mrs. Effie Garcelon. The picnic will be a joint affair with the Klamath Falls Venture club.

Mrs. Sylvia McClelland was welcomed home at the round table luncheon held Thursday noon, and guests present were Mrs. F. Kahler, daughter of Mrs. Henry Ray, and Mrs. Lucille O'Neill.

Much of the interest of the club is centered on the European conflict with anxiety for sister Soroptimists in that war torn continent. At the convention held in Salt Lake City in June with contributions made to the American Red Cross in the sum of \$250, a like amount to the Canadian Red Cross, \$500 to Soroptimist refugees and \$200 to American Council of Venture clubs was a most important contribution of \$1500 for an ambulance to be presented to Great Britain through Canada. Interesting is the account of the actual presentation of the ambulance as given in the British Soroptimist magazine.

The barbed wire and the sandbags outside seemed to enhance the warmth of the friendly atmosphere which greeted the fortunate few, the members of the board of governors and the divisional union presidents able to attend who accompanied the federation president when she went to the war office on Saturday, June the twenty-second to hand over the ambulance to the war office. The members of the federation had subscribed. Each was entrusted with a personal pass that would insure our safe departure and this helped to remind us of the rarity of the presence of a body of women inside that building.

"Once inside the quadrangle, we saw our dreams come true in the very substantial presence of the fleet of four ambulances, with their bronze plaques in position bearing the badge and motto of the federation in enamel above the several inscriptions. At the very last moment we heard that the quarter master himself, Lieutenant-General Sir Walter K. Venning, KCB, CBE, MC, a member of the army council, would honor us by receiving the ambulances in person, although he might not have time to say more than "Thank you."

"Mrs. Williams explained that three ambulances were the gifts of members in Great Britain, Ireland, Australia and New Zealand, and that the fourth was the gift of Soroptimist clubs in the western and maritime provinces of Canada. Sir Walter Venning accompanied the president to inspect the ambulances before leaving the quadrangle.

"At the word of command, each ambulance wheeled, turned and was driven out of the quadrangle followed by the eyes of all the watchers at the windows towering above us, as well as by the gaze of the little company below. We British are not given to dramatizing even our formal occasions, but nothing could have given a more fitting conclusion to the little ceremony than the instant commission of the ambulances for service in the cause in which our arms now stand alone."

The ambulances referred to in this article taken from the British Soroptimist do not include the one provided for by the contribution at Salt Lake. Fourteen members and guests enjoyed the round-table luncheon Thursday, of which but two more will be held, regular meetings to be resumed the first Thursday in September.
