NYA AGE LIMIT REDUCED TO 17

PORTLAND, Aug. 19 (Special) — Effective this week, the age limit for NYA employment will be 17 instead of 18 on all work-experience projects throughout Oregon, according to announcement here by Ivan G. Munro, state NYA administrator.

Munro said it was anticipated that lowering of the age requirement will benefit many boys and girls previously rejected by NYA as too young. These youths may now re-apply for NYA assignment through offices of Oregon state employment service.

It was pointed out that the new ruling does not apply to the NYA work-school program, on which the age limit is already 16. Nor will there be any change, Munro said, in the upper age limit of 24 for all NYA work.

TRADERS STAND ASIDE TO WAIT DEFINITE NEWS

NEW YORK, Aug. 19 (AP) — The stock market virtually was on dead center today as many traders stood aside to await more conclusive war developments.

The session was one of the slowest on record. The turnover of around 125,000 shares actually was the smallest since 1916, when only 540 individual issues were listed on the stock exchange compared with 1,233 as of January 1, this year.

Numerous stocks never appeared on the prominent ticker tape and a wide assortment held at Saturday's final quotations.

U. S. Steel, Republic and Youngstown Sheet were among resistant shares as this week's estimated mill operations were placed a shade above the preceding week.

A few occasionally were American Telephone, Montgomery Ward, Douglas Aircraft, Boeing, Du Pont, Westinghouse, Kennecott and N. Y. Central. Backward were American Smelting, Bethlehem, General Motors, Chrysler, United Aircraft, Standard Oil of N. J., Consolidated Edison and Johns-Manville.

Bonds were fairly steady and commodities a bit uneven. Wheat at Chicago was off 1/2c to 1c per bushel and corn unchanged to down 1/2c. Cotton, in late transaction, was up 3/4c to 20c a bale.

WHEAT RALLIES TO PARTIAL RECOVERY

CHICAGO, Aug. 19 (AP) — After falling as much as 14 cents to within about a cent of the seasonal lows established last Friday, wheat prices today rallied, recovering part of the loss.

Moderate hedging in connection with the largest receipts of the season at spring wheat terminals; liquidation of September contracts, and trade nervousness because of the European war accounted for the weakness. Mill buying helped the rally.

Wheat closed 1/2c lower than Saturday, September 68 1/2c, December 70 1/2c; corn unchanged to 1/2c down, September 60 1/2c, December 54 1/2c; oats unchanged to 1/2c down.
