

AFL PROTESTS SIGNS; EYES SHAW PLANT

The Klamath basin district council of the AFL lumber and sawmill workers on Sunday passed resolutions protesting against "no trespass" signs on properties of lumber concerns here and indicating renewed activity in the Ticonia plant of the Shaw Lumber company.

This is the resolution on the Shaw situation:

"It is recommended to local union No. 2444 Ticonia that the local union cease to temporize over interference with legitimate union activities at Ticonia, that unless the majority destroyed as the union alleged by interference by management, is recovered by Wednesday, August 21 the Labor Board be requested by telegram to proceed with the hearing."

It is pointed out that unfair labor practices were filed in March alleging interference and refusal to bargain, but these charges were temporarily liquidated by a consent election held June 1. However, the union filed charges citing fourteen points of discrimination and interference in the conduct of an election and revived the original charges. These last unfair practice charges were investigated and the Labor Board investigator recommended a hearing on the entire situation. The local union agreed with management, however, to give a period of three weeks to attempt to proceed under a policy of strict compliance. Now, the union maintains that the compliance notices ordered by the government have been removed at the operation of the Shaw Lumber and interference continue.

A special meeting has been called of all A. F. of L. workers at the schoolhouse in Ticonia to consider the recommendation of the district council, this Wednesday night.

The "no trespass" question was covered as follows:

WHEREAS organized labor must always rest its final appeal with the general public in all matters of right and justice.

WHEREAS the frequent necessity to call for the protection of the United States government in the Klamath basin to secure compliance with federal law and to stop interference by management with legitimate organization indicates to the public the struggle of the workers to bring the simplest form of orderly, collective bargaining in this area.

WHEREAS in certain instances we believe the machinery of the labor board was used by management to frustrate the demonstrated desire of workers.

WHEREAS it is a matter of common knowledge that "no trespass" signs have been posted and have been reinforced by telephone calls from management and attorney warnings that the service of the county sheriff would be evoked to enforce such notices.

WHEREAS daily these signs are not enforced against salesmen, laundry drivers, applicants for employment, etc., but are enforced solely against labor organizers.

WHEREAS the orderly approach to men on their own time at the place of employment is the most effective and the usual place in the lumber industry to talk with men, and such method is not in any way associated with violence and damage to property.

WHEREAS the Oregon law specifically requires posting, enclosure and proof that trespasser enters with intent to destroy property and we sincerely believe that such no trespass signs are being unlawfully used against organized labor.

WHEREAS relief has been sought through the courts by means of a declaratory judgment, but which relief has been delayed by protests made by management through attorneys and we believe that there is truth in the statement that "justice delayed is justice denied."

WHEREAS A. F. of L. organizers have been solicited by men on the job to have the no trespass policy of management reversed in order to secure assistance to relieve workers from unbearable pressure from volunteer CIO organizers who are also in the employ of companies at regular jobs.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Klamath Basin District Council of Lumber and Sawmill Workers present the facts outlined in this resolution before the bar of public opinion by means of the news columns of the Klamath Falls News-Herald.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this District Council go on record in protest against a policy of lumber operators which we deem to be unjust and intolerable.

MAN SENTENCED ON SECOND CHARGE OF ILLEGAL GAME

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persons in front of the shrine, "do you want to see Hitler in Independence hall making fun of the Liberty Bell?"

"No," he shouted, and the crowd shouted with him.

"Write and telegraph to your senators and representatives," he urged. "Write to your newspaper. Demand the privilege of being called into the service of the nation. Tell them that we want conscription. Tell them that we back up General Fershing."

(General Pershing, commander of the American expeditionary force in the last year advocated in Washington August 4 that "at least 50" destroyers left over from the World war be made available to the British.)

If Great Britain is conquered, Bullitt foresaw that island along with the whole continent of Europe organized into one economic unit directed from Berlin. No country of North or South America, he said, would be able to trade with Europe except on such terms as "might be pleasing to the dictators."

In the Pacific, he asserted, "would be the Japanese navy, cooperating with the dictators, which would be able to cut us off from our supplies of rubber and tin and would compel us to leave a large part of our fleet in the Pacific to defend Hawaii and the west coast."

With Bullitt on the platform were two other American envoys to German-conquered European nations, Anthony J. Drexel Biddle, ambassador to the Polish government-in-exile, and John Cudahy, who returned recently from his post in Belgium.

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French coast and claimed their air fighters were parrying nazi air blows with an increasingly favorable advantage.

The order to make the isles a defense area—subject at a moment's notice to drastic edicts by closely cooperating civil and military authorities—was issued as a "precautionary measure" by the ministry of home security.

Regional commissioners for England, Wales and Scotland will have authority, it said, "subject to control and direct of the ministry of home security, to issue directions or orders required for the purposes of defense within their respective areas."

Although there were no immediate new restrictions on Britons, the new order authorized "any measures which might become urgently necessary through enemy landing by air or sea to be introduced without delay in any part of the country, in which they are required."

Until now, only a 20-mile strip of the eastern and southern coasts from the Scottish border to Portland had been a defense area.

THREE YOUTHS RESCUED FROM ABOVE CRATER

Park rangers Saturday ended a spectacular 22-hour battle for the lives of three southern California youths, marooned high above the deep waters of Crater lake since Friday night, with the successful rescue of all three.

The last youth was brought into the rim lodge at 6:15, climbing the almost ceaseless efforts of the entire ranger staff which had begun with the discovery at 8 p. m. Friday of the trio on the sheer cliffs of Garfield mountain.

Nearly Exhausted

All three were virtually exhausted but, according to Chief Ranger Carlisle Crouch, in surprisingly good shape considering their long vigil on the rocky slopes.

The boys were George F. Gubser, 17, Glendale, Calif., Norman C. Goeckel, 17, and Alfred B. Wredman, 17, both of Los Angeles.

According to Crouch, the trio had climbed to the top of Garfield along the regular trail Friday afternoon, then had descended the steep face on the lake side. They planned to walk along the shore to a point below the lodge and climb back up from there.

Reach Lake

All three reached the lake level, Crouch said, but found their way blocked by the perpendicular rock face that runs to the water's edge. They then attempted to make the ascent back to the peak. Gubser and Goeckel stopped to rest at a point a few hundred feet above the water but Wredman continued up the crater wall to a rocky shelf about 1500 feet over the lake.

Unable to progress further when night fell, they shouted for help and were heard by visitors at the hotel who notified rangers. The park men, led by Crouch, spotted them from the water's edge and in the pitch darkness fought to reach the lower pair with ropes. But hampered by the lack of light, they were forced to give up at 3 a. m.

Struggle Resumed

The struggle was resumed at daybreak and shortly thereafter Ranger Otis Foiles, one-time Rocky Mountain forest ranger and schooled in mountaineering, reached Gubser and Goeckel. They were brought to the hotel at 7 o'clock.

It was then decided to attempt a rescue of Wredman from the top of Garfield peak but a study of the precipitous upper cliffs showed it to be impossible, so a party began the tortuous job of cutting steps in the rock to where the remaining youth had spent the night.

Elwyn Mann, of the park summer staff, clinging to every available handhold, finally reached the exhausted youth at 4 p. m. and with the aid of a safety belt began the slow descent.

With the aid of additional rangers spotted along the improvised trail Wredman was lowered to the lake and brought to the hotel just before sundown. According to Crouch, the ascent made by Wredman, without equipment of any kind, was one of the most remarkable in the annals of the park service at Crater lake and the rescue made by the park crew one of the most difficult in their history.

It was recalled that another similar rescue was effected last June when two Willamette valley youths made the same attempt as did the California trio.

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for furthering American defense.

"Any man who purports to put up a dictatorship," he continued, "comes mighty close to being false to his country."

The Idaho senator added Bullitt's speech was "not only approved but inspired by the state department."

In the house, Rep. Pace (D-Ga.) touched off a series of one minute speeches when he endorsed Bullitt's remarks.

Rep. Knutson (R-Minn.) termed Bullitt "more of a publicity seeker than a diplomat," and Rep. Schafer (R-Wis.) suggested the justice department, in its drive against fifth columnists, "get hold of Mr. Bullitt and lock him up right away."

Clark's remarks brought several other senators to their feet. Ashurst (D-Ariz.) said he thought Bullitt "entitled to some sympathy" because "having this speech bottled up in his chest he was tortured until he could get it off."

Senator Clark (D-Mo.) asked Ashurst whether he had given any thought to the possibility that "the reason Mr. Bullitt is roaming around the country now asking for recognition for the fascist-controlled French government of Marshall Petain is that he is anxious to keep the commitments he has made from coming out in the French war guilt trial."

Ashurst did not reply to this question, but remarked "How difficult it is for an American ambassador to keep quiet when he should keep quiet."

Guards Training After War Games

The citizen soldiers, their thoughts on their probable mobilization this fall, have started the final period of their three weeks' encampment.

The Pacific northwest's biggest war game, participated in by 41,000 regular and national guard troops ended Saturday with each side a moral victor.
