SAFETY INSPECTOR PROPOSAL ENTERED

PORTLAND, Aug. 20 (AP)—B. A. Green, State Federation of Labor attorney, recommended at an interim committee hearing yesterday that three per cent of the state industrial accident commission's estimated \$150,000 annual income be budgeted to hire safety inspectors.

Green also urged that the Oregon workmen's compensation act become compulsory and that similar work now handled by the public utilities and labor commissions be consolidated under one body.

An amendment permitting individual workmen to appear before the committee without an attorney was advocated by V. R. Griggs, former assistant state attorney general. He also suggested that workmen should be able to appear without forfeiting the right to appeal.

J. A. Hazelwood, stevedore superintendent for the American-Hawaiian Steamship company, told the committee that the law requiring immediate reporting of injuries should be enforced more strictly.

Oregon's rise to a large mercury producing area makes protection against occupational dis-

ease more necessary, F. W. Watson of Portland, Secretary of the Oregon Mining association said. He referred to salivation, a disease resulting from inhalation of mercury fumes.

DARING BRITON ADDS TO SCORE

LONDON, Aug. 20 (AP)—A German Heinkel 111 bomber attacked a British training plane over southwest England Monday. The British plane had no armament and was at the mercy of the swift and heavily armed German.

A moment later, the score was 5 to 1 for Britain. The British pilot whipped his tiny plane around and crashed head on into the bomber.

The bomber crashed and its crew of five died. The British pilot also was killed.
