STOCK PRICES POINT UPWARD TO SLIM GAIN

NEW YORK, Aug. 20 (AP)—Financial markets generally took a hitch in their recovery belts today without the benefit of much important news stimulation from either the war, business or politics.

The stock list pointed moderately higher at the start in slightly more active dealings. There was a subsequent letdown and a further stiffening of prices near the final hour. While volume was nothing to cheer about from the standpoint of commission houses, transfers of around 230,000 shares compared with yesterday's 24-year low of 129,650. Closing gains of fractions to more than 2 points were at or near the day's best.

Wall street seemed to derive mild comfort from British Prime Minister Churchill's remarks expressing optimism for eventual victory against the nazis. Many speculative contingents, however, continued to stand aside pending the next Hitler shift.

Favored were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, General Motors, Chrysler, Great Northern, Chesapeake & Ohio, Douglas Aircraft, Glenn Martin, United Aircraft, American Telephone, Texas Corp., Briggs Mfg., and Anaconda.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20 (AP)—A 14 per cent population increase was reported today in Oregon by the census bureau bringing the total of 1,087,717.

The state's 133,931 gain in the last decade was spread over nearly all its counties. However, the changes ranged from a decrease of 2.1 per cent in Sherman county to an increase of 75.3 per cent in Malheur county. Changes in Oregon's cities of 10,000 or more population varied from a decrease of 2.4 per cent in Astoria to an increase of 17.2 per cent in Salem. Portland, largest city in the state with a count of 307,572 was 1.9 per cent larger than in 1930.

WHEAT TONE FIRM AS PRICES CLIMB

CHICAGO, Aug. 20 (AP)—Wheat futures exhibited a firm tone today and the advances continued throughout the session. Mill buying, short covering and the strength displayed at Minneapolis were factors contributing to the rise. The May future advanced as much as two cents a bushel.

News of the war on England failed to act as a market factor. Reports or renewed air raids attracted little attention. Wheat closed 13-14c higher than Monday's final prices, September 70 1/2c, December 72 1/2c; corn was 1-1c up, September 61 1/2c, December 55 1/2c; and oats were 1 1/2c higher.

SAN QUENTIN CONVICT WINS SPEAKING LAURELS

SEATTLE, Aug. 20 (AP)—San Quentin penitentiary's public speaking course came in for high praise Monday in federal court when a "graduate," Frederick M. Robbins, 32-year-old Canadian, pleaded guilty for entering the United States illegally.

Despite Robbins' half-hour oration on why he should be given a suspended sentence, Judge Lloyd L. Black said he could not suspend sentence because of Robbins' prior record. Robbins was sentenced to a year and a day in prison.

Robbins recited that he had just completed a four-year sentence in San Quentin for writing a worthless \$24 check and while there took a public speaking course.

Judge Black described the prisoner's address as one of the most persuasive appeals ever made in his court.

PORTLAND GUARD PROVES TOUGH IN 4-STORY FALL

TACOMA, Aug. 20 (AP)—If all national guardsmen are as tough as Lieut. George C. Becker of Portland the country's defenses are well high impregnable.

Becker, attached to the 218th field artillery, Oregon national guard, early Sunday fell four stories onto a hotel marquis after apparently losing his balance on a window ledge on which he was sitting.

The hardy guardsman had the "wind knocked out of him" and suffered a few minor bruises, but he didn't feel it was necessary to go to the hospital. Detectives Sam Blake and Harry Shaner, who reported the incident, prevailed upon him to undergo an examination, and he remained at the Pierce county hospital a few hours for observation, but Monday he was reported back at Camp Murray, "as good as new."

TWO-HIRE CARRIER LEGION DRUM CORPS PERMITS REQUESTED MAY GO TO FAIRS

Two applications have been filed with the state utilities commissioner for permission to operate common carriers for hire in the vicinity of Klamath Falls. Charles Fisk would operate a parcel delivery service within 25 miles of Klamath Falls, the weight not to exceed 150 pounds. A hearing will be held at the city hall on August 30 at 9 a. m.

Ted R. Webb has asked for a permit to engage in transportation of agricultural commodities and supplies within a 50-mile radius of Klamath Falls. The hearing will be held August 30 at 10 a. m. in the city hall.

EUGENE APPROVES POWER CONTRACT

EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 20 (AP)—The Eugene water board authorized a power contract today with Bonneville, providing for the purchase of 1500 kilowatts a month for one year to augment the municipal system.

The contract provides for interchange of power in case of emergency and for peak load service. Board Superintendent J. W. McArthur and City Attorney S. M. Kalkins declared the city, a pioneer in cheap municipal power and light, had not sacrificed any local control.

OHIO YOUTH WINS CAA PILOT PRIZE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20 (AP)—Edward F. Scanlon, 21, of Steubenville, O., this week won the \$1000 scholarship prize as the outstanding airplane pilot trained by the Civil Aeronautics authority.

Scanlon, a Phi Beta Kappa graduate of Kenyon college, at Gambier, O., defeated six of the best CAA pilots in a contest sponsored by the Institute of Aeronautical Sciences by turning in the best performance of flying at boiling fluid.

Second prize went to Jefferson Davis Lewis, also 21, of Tallahassee, Fla. Lewis won \$750, which he said will be the first down payment on a new airplane he bought before the contest. Waldo E. Schroeter, 22, of Redley, Calif., was third, winning \$500.

LAKEVIEW MAN ELECTED BY BAR

PORTLAND, Aug. 20 (AP)—Gunther Krause of Portland, William G. East of Eugene and Herbert P. Welch of Lakeview are the new members of the Oregon state bar's board of governors. Their election was announced last night by F. M. Sercombe, bar secretary. Each new member represents a congressional district.

The American Legion drum corps may make a trip to fairs at San Francisco and Sacramento next month. At a meeting Wednesday night the corps members will consider a suggestion from Tom Stanley, manager of the Shasta-Cascade Wonderland association, that the corps go to San Francisco September 8, and on the next day stop at the California state fair at Sacramento.

GUARD READY FOR REGISTRATION OF DRAFT ELIGIBLES

SALEM, Aug. 20 (AP)—The Oregon national guard is ready to begin registering all men between the ages of 21 and 31 for military service, and all it is waiting for now is for congress to pass the conscription bill.

The five officers and 10 enlisted men who have been studying for several weeks how to conduct the registration gave their system a trial last night, with men of the 249th coast artillery acting as guinea pigs. It took about 45 minutes for each man to answer all the questions.

The questions pertained mostly to whether the men have dependents, employment status and religious affiliation. Governor Charles A. Sprague watched the demonstration.

WOMAN RETURNING TO ENGLAND HOME

SEATTLE, Aug. 20 (AP)—Mrs. Thomas Wayman-Hales of Chester, England started her homeward journey by United Airlines mainliner Monday after leaving her three-year-old son with his aunt and uncle in Olympia.

Mrs. Wayman-Hales made a quick trip from England for her son's safety and will return to England to fight alongside her husband, an attorney and munitions plant worker.

She belongs to the Women's Volunteer Service as an ambulance driver and is also an air raid warden.

REVOKED LICENSES SET NEW RECORD

SALEM, Aug. 20 (AP)—An all-time monthly record of 177 drivers' licenses were revoked or suspended in Oregon during July, 102 drivers losing their permits for driving while intoxicated, Secretary of State Earl Snell said today.

Stopping Over

A column of chat about Klamath visitors.

Through the good old traditional American medium of starting from the bottom and working up, Angus D. McDonald got to be president of the Southern Pacific railroad.

He even played football at college, didn't graduate, and was given an honorary LL.D. degree years later.

He was born in Oakland some time before the century's turn, grew up in the bay area, and worked at this job and that after graduating from high school.

Frugal as the Scotsman in any tale, McDonald eventually put enough aside to finance his schooling at Notre Dame, which he entered in the fall of 1898.

He played football and baseball for four years—just as many present day tycoons will allege when recounting. Here the similarity stops for a moment for McDonald can't recall any storied hero of the gridiron whom he played against.

He doesn't remember Willie Heston of Vost's famous point-a-minute Michigan squads. Walter Eckersall is just a name to him. And what Knute Rockne was doing at the time leaves him cold.

Anyway, he left school before commencement time and went to work with his father as a clerk in an S. P. office in Texas. This was in 1900.

In 1912 he was made a vice president. What he did in the intervening 12 years has been lost along with Willie Heston.

Nevertheless this set some sort of a record for vice presidents, a mark that has been eclipsed only by Joe Kennedy, currently our ambassador to the Court of St. James. Joe was a president at the age of 23. This was accomplished in banking, however, which was probably easier.

Either the president was unusually healthy or our man from the highlands, of Oakland, lost something in the struggle, for he remained at the vice president's job until 1932, when he finally reached the pot of gold and was elevated to the presidency.

A year later Notre Dame conferred the belated degree on him—realizing, probably, that here was a man destined for success.
