Raider Attacks Ship in South Sea

WELLINGTON, N. Z., Aug. 23 (AP)—The 8,706-ton British steamer Turakina sent a radio from the Tasman sea Tuesday night saying she was being fired on by a raider, Prime Minister Peter Fraser of New Zealand announced today.

This was the first report of an attack on a British ship in Australian waters.

The message gave the ship's position but no later advice has been received from the vessel, which was due at a New Zealand port last night.

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DOVERI AWARDED HENLEY CONTRACT

PORTLAND, Aug. 23 (AP)—The S.P. & S., United and Oregon Electric railroads told the state highway commission yesterday they had no desire to block the Portland Front avenue highway project.

Commission Chairman Henry F. Cabell previously had notified the city council that unless the Front avenue railroad tracks were removed the commission could not approve the project.

The commission awarded contracts for seven road jobs and referred two others to the commission engineer or county court with power to act.

Award made were: Klamath — reconstructing the Henley flume and widening USRS division canal bridge 8.6 miles south of Klamath Falls on the Klamath Falls-Malin highway. Angelo Doveri, Klamath Falls, \$8,143.50.

Heart Attack Blamed in Death

TACOMA, Aug. 23 (AP)—Dr. Frank R. Maddison said today an autopsy had disclosed United States Marshal A. J. Chitty "died of an acute coronary occlusion, or clot in the heart, following an altercation."

The autopsy was performed by Dr. Charles Larson, Tacoma pathologist, whose report, details of which were not revealed, was turned over immediately to District Attorney J. Charles Dennis.

Chitty died late yesterday after two manacled bank robbers, inmates of McNeil island federal penitentiary, attacked him in the Federal building.

Tents to Stand As Army Leaves

CAMP MURRAY, Aug. 23 (AP)—Some 13,000 national guardsmen here for annual maneuvers during the past three weeks will be gone by tomorrow night—but not forgotten.

The huge tent city spreading over the prairie at Camp Murray and its environs will remain standing, Brig. Gen. Maurice Thompson, adjutant general of the Washington national guard, said today. Envisioning passage in congress of mobilization orders, Gen. Thompson said dismantling of the tents would prove unwise "if the troops return in two or three weeks."

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'Master Mind' in Trotsky Murder Sought By Police

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 22 (AP)—Mexican police, declaring they believed an "international master mind" was behind the assassination of Leon Trotsky, maintained constant guard tonight over both the confessed assassin, Frank Jackson, and his Brooklyn, N. Y., friend, Sylvia Ageloff.

They held both incommunicado, but permitted Arthur P. Shaw, the American consul, to interview the girl. Shaw found her hysterical.

Associates of Trotsky said they believed Miss Ageloff was an "innocent tool" of Jackson, but Col. Leandro Sanchez Salazar, chief of secret service, said his investigation of the young woman was incomplete. The girl, who introduced Jackson to Trotsky, insists she had no knowledge that Jackson planned to kill him or that she knew he was a soviet agent.
