Guardsman Dies On Train Nearing Klamath Falls

Ralph A. Goa, Los Angeles national guardsman en route home after maneuvers at Camp Lewis, Wash., died yesterday aboard a Southern Pacific train as it was nearing Klamath Falls. Cause of the death was undetermined but it was said Goa suffered severe head and abdominal pains about 1:30 Thursday afternoon. A medical officer was called and the guardsman put to bed. He died at 4:40. County Coroner George H. Adler will make an investigation today. Goa was a member of Company H, 160th infantry.

WILKIE BEHIND THE NEWS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23—A few barbed words hidden away in a report from an American commercial attaché in Japan have roused the fears of diplomats who are wondering what Japan is up to. The report quotes the president of the Japanese cabinet planning board, Naomoto Hoshino, as saying the time has come for Japan to sever connections with the dollar and pound "in favor of forging a link with the German mark." No more conclusive evidence of Japan's future diplomatic intentions could be found—if it is seriously intended. Attachment of the Japanese currency to Hitler's funny money would mean more than a political or diplomatic alliance. But our diplomats suspect Hoshino is spoofing. Whether Japan does enough commercial business with Germany to make such action feasible is a moot point.

KEY VOTERS

Never at this stage of modern presidential campaigns have there been such evidences of widespread doubt and indecision. It is puzzling but true that the yet undecided groups of voters in such widely separated key states as New York and Nebraska are sufficient by large to prove decisive in the result. This conclusion is inspired by all the available private information in partisan and non-partisan quarters. A survey of New York state has been privately made by a competent poll-taker for certain republican leaders who needed it in their business. Its apparent impartiality was attested by the result which showed Roosevelt ahead in the cities (New York, Buffalo, Rochester, Albany) but by decreased majorities from 1936. As a whole the state stood Willkie 43 per cent, Roosevelt 39 per cent, four per cent minor parties, and—here's the surprise—14 per cent undecided. This clearly means the undecided vote would swing the result.

The situation is causing sharper scratching for the "don't know" vote and the republicans are elated. They figure that if a man has not made up his mind about Roosevelt in eight years, they have a 60 to 70 per cent better chance to get him than the democrats.

Travel On The Willamette

A COUPLE of Bend men, interested in knowing just what the Willamette highway is doing to travel north of here, spent a day this week checking traffic at the Willamette-The Dalles-California highway junction north of Chemult.

They counted 915 cars from 8 a. m. to 6 p. m. Approximately half this number used the new Willamette highway. The count included both northbound and southbound cars.

Because of the great interest here in Willamette highway travel, the count made by the Bend men in 10 hours at the junction follows:

- Oregon cars, Eugene from Klamath, 99.
- Oregon cars, Bend from Klamath, 74.
- Out of state cars, Bend from Klamath, 99.
- Out of state cars, Eugene from Klamath, 83.
- Oregon cars, Eugene to Klamath, 93.
- Oregon cars, Bend to Klamath, 83.
- Out of state cars, Eugene to Klamath, 119.
- Out of state cars, Bend to Klamath, 171.
- Oregon cars, Eugene to Bend, 39.
- Out of state cars, Eugene to Bend, 7.
- Out of state and Oregon cars, Bend to Eugene, 41.

It will be seen from these figures that the Willamette highway is carrying a considerable volume of the traffic, living up to expectations if not exceeding them.

The Bend men said eight out of ten northbound motorists, with the exception of strictly local travel, stop at the junction to read the sign which states:

- Portland 215 miles (via Eugene)
- Portland 254 miles (via Bend)

A vast majority of these motorists turned left after reading the sign, indicating that the mileage difference has much to do with influencing travel. The Willamette highway is obviously creating a considerable diversion from The Dalles-California highway.

We have no way of knowing, however, how much of this northbound travel was diverted from the Pacific highway at Weed. Bend people cannot consider all of the diversion at Chemult a loss, because certainly the Willamette highway is going to pull traffic to this side which otherwise would have gone north on the Pacific highway and never would have reached Bend anyway.

Bend people were advised by the traffic counters to work for the completion of the Warm Springs highway, which will cut the mileage difference between the Willamette highway route to Portland and the route through Bend. Klamath will welcome two alternate short routes and is also interested in the Warm Springs completion. Both roads will help build tourist traffic through here.

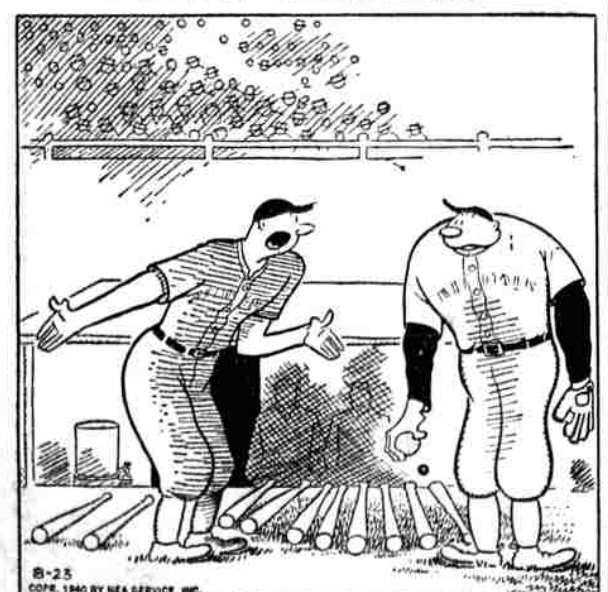
