REVIVAL SERVICES ATTRACT AUDIENCES

The revival services in the gospel tent at Wantland avenue and Mitchell street are attracting large audiences according to the pastor, the Rev. Cecil C. Brown.

The Rev. L. B. Sigle, former pastor of the local church is conducting the revival mission. Mr. Sigle has returned to Klamath Falls almost annually for tent meetings since leaving the pastorate of the First Baptist church. After spending several years in evangelistic work he accepted a call to become pastor of the First Baptist church of Longview, Wash. It is expected that hundreds of friends will attend the tent services to hear Mr. Sigle.
