Mrs. C. B. Harding Visiting Here

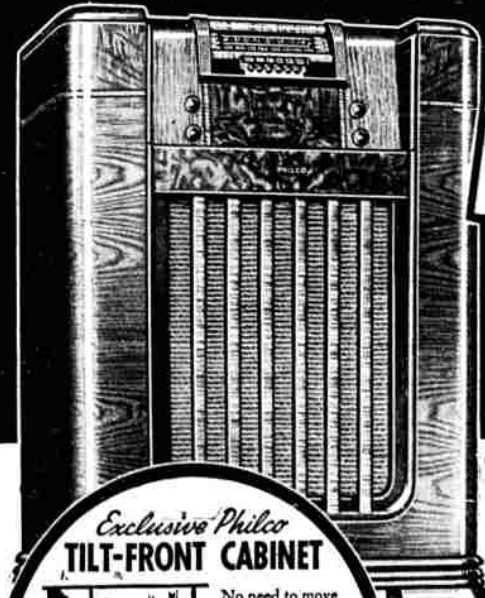
