Harry Surles, Great Northern rodman, and Van R. Thome, Great Northern timekeeper, en route to Klamath Falls from Beatty on business, arrived on the scene less than 10 minutes after the crash. Pool was lying at the side of the road in the dust bleeding profusely, the other two close by. The boys commandeered a passing CCC truck which was en route from Medford to the Alkali lake camp. Surles removed the governor from the motor, loaded Pool in the truck body, and rushed him to Hildebrand hospital. Molene and Hunsaker were brought by Thome to the hospital.

FRENCH MINISTERS VOTE NATION DRY

VICHY, France, Aug. 24 (AP)—The council of ministers last night approved a decree establishing partial prohibition throughout France to end what was called "a disastrous era of alcoholism among French soldiers" that left them unfit to face the German blitzkrieg.

For eight months during the "phony war" when there was virtually no action on the western front the French troops drank tremendous quantities of alcohol, a spokesman said, and military authorities blamed widespread intoxication for much of the moral collapse of the soldiers.

The drinking produced nervous disorders and shellshock when the French forces finally came up against the Nazi mechanized forces, particularly such terrifying weapons as whistling bombs and swarms of tanks, it was said.

The new decree, to be published in tomorrow's official Journal, limits drinks to 16 degrees of alcoholic strength and provides for three non-alcoholic days each week.

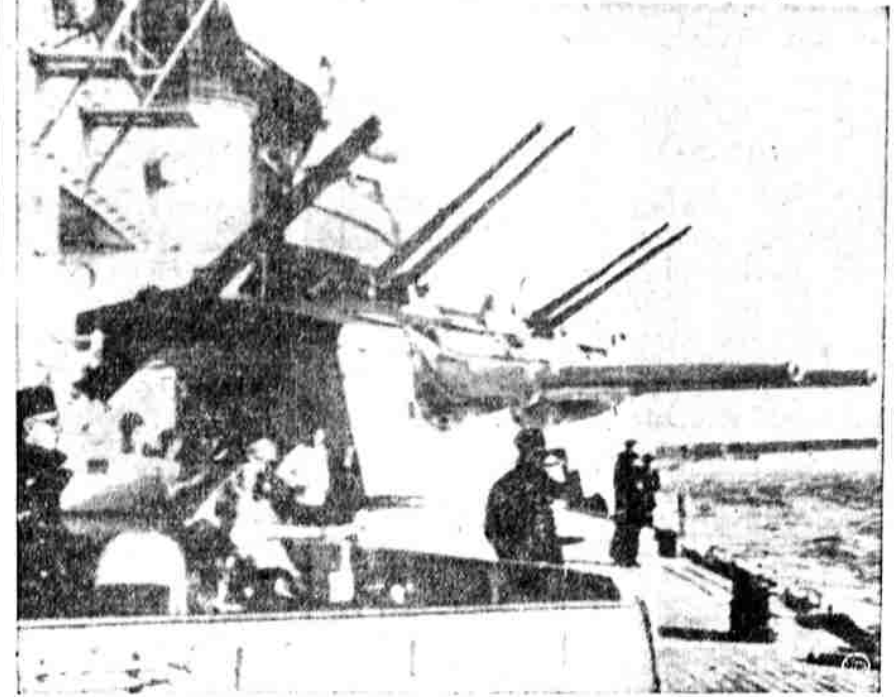

YOUNG COWHAND LEADS PAGEANT

Lake county's youngest cowboy will lead the parent parade which is the scene of the crowning of the queen of Lakeview's 21st annual roundup Saturday night. Joe Riggs, six-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Evan Riggs of Paisley, will vie for honors with the royal court when he takes his place at the head of hundreds of horsemen, an emigrant train bands of Indians, mostly synthetic, and numerous other attractions which have been lined up for the pageant by Clifton Howard, the one-man committee in charge.

Carries on Traditions
As far as his career as a cowboy is concerned, Joe is merely carrying on the tradition of the family. His grandfather, Harry Riggs, is one of Lake county's oldest cowhands both in years and experience. Joe's uncle, Everett Riggs as well as his dad, Evan, will be remembered by rodeo fans for their riding exhibitions in local and outside shows of but a few years ago.

Young Joe is serious about his riding. From the time he was two, when it was impossible to find a saddle small enough for him, he rode bareback for hours on end after stock with his dad. He now enjoys all the sport of real western life at the ZX ranch, where his dad works. Cowboy Joe won the prize in last year's roundup parade for being the youngest cowboy.

Held Under Lights
The pageant will be held at Daly field under lights and will be the scene of a real emigrant train, arriving from uptown and pitching camp on the field. Out of this will emerge representatives of the three of Lake county's granges who will show their ability in the art of the square dance. The Indians may not be what they are painted but they will put on a surprise raid on the emigrants. Songs, cowboy music and honoring of the pioneers will all lead up to the crowning of the queen, Miss Lucille Harvey, who will officially take over her position of honor in the Lakeview show. She will be attended by Zetorose Spalding and Madge Honnold as princesses.

A sight which will be a joy to all horse lovers is the grouping of pinto and other oddly colored horses in the parade. Activities will start at 8 o'clock at the athletic field of the high school.

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U. S. DELIVERS NEW WARNING TO JAPANESE

HONG KONG, Saturday, Aug. 24 (AP)—The United States government has delivered a new and drastic warning to Japan that a time of reckoning must come if Japan persists in her present course in East Asia, reliable informants told the United Press today.

The warning was said to have been delivered personally to Japanese Ambassador Kensuke Horinouchi in Washington by Undersecretary of State Sumner Welles.

Sent To Tokio
It was in the form of an "aide memoire" and was forwarded to Foreign Minister Yosuke Matsuoka in Tokyo who has not replied to it and probably will not do so, the informants said.

Horinouchi was called to the state department about a fortnight ago, according to the informants, and given a long review of the American viewpoint after which the written memorandum was handed to him for the information of his government.

The document reviewed in broad outline the history of Japanese-American relations since the beginning of the Chinese-Japanese conflict in July, 1937, the informants said, and stressed the viewpoint of the United States government with regard to the rights of Americans in China.

Reckoning Will Come
It went into detail with regard to hindrances to American trade and other American rights in China, and concluded with an assertion these matters are not being forgotten and a time certainly would come when a reckoning would be necessary.

The language of the warning, according to the informants, was extremely blunt and the most vigorous the state department has used in all the series of communications it has sent to Tokyo during the past three years.

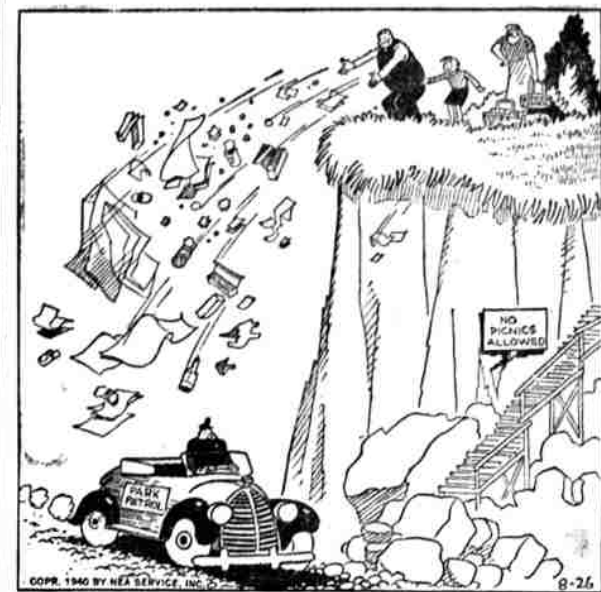

State Department Bans Trotsky Body

WASHINGTON, Aug. 24 (AP)—The state department refused today to admit the body of Leon Trotsky, exiled soviet leader, into the United States for burial.

The former war commissar of soviet Russia was killed recently in Mexico by an assassin who attacked him with a pickaxe. He said on his deathbed that the soviet secret police probably was following the attack.

The department issued the following terse statement on the question of burying him in this country:

"In response to inquiry from the American consul at Mexico City, George P. Shaw, the department informed him that it perceives no reason to bring Mr. Trotsky's body to the United States and that it would not be appropriate to do so."

SUGAR WORKERS IN DEADLOCK ON WAGE DEMANDS

SEATTLE, Aug. 24 (AP)—Charles C. Hughes, international representative of the American Federation of Labor, reported here last night that a deadlock has been reached by sugar beet company employers and workers over wages in seven western states. He said 30,000 employees of four companies are affected, all of them affiliated with the Sugar Workers' council.

Hughes, returning here from Toppish, reported the local union there "standing pat" on wage demands.

He said the companies affected were the American Crystal Sugar company, Great Western Sugar company, Holly Sugar corporation and the Utah and Idaho Sugar company. The last named firm operates in Washington, Idaho, Utah, Montana, Oregon and other states.

The deadlock, according to Hughes, lies between company offers of two and one-half cent hourly wage increases, or five dollars monthly to salaried workers, and union demands for seven and one-half cents hourly increases or \$10 monthly.
