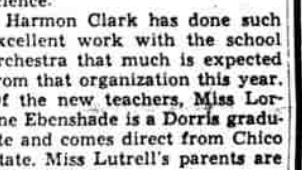
DORRIS SCHOOLS WILL OPEN SOON

When they brought his car back, we rode around the block in it. And boy was he happy! I think he's going to give me a free appendicitis operation to show his gratitude!

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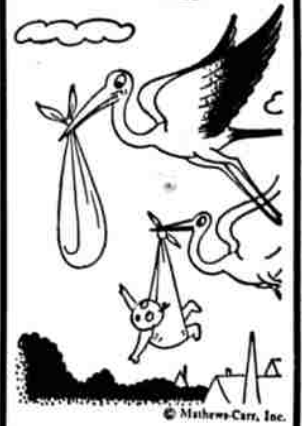
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
