It is interesting to note, however, that both the teams have fine recuperative powers. The Yankees came back, with Ernie Bonham pitching a five-hitter, to blast the Sox 3-1 in the afternoon, while the Cards outslugged the Bees 8-5 to square the day's proceedings.

The Yankees split, with Washington's victory over the Cleveland Indians by a 5-4 count, left the world champions in third place, only five and one-half games back of the Tribe. That Washington victory was Rookie Sal Hudson's thirteenth of the season and sent the Tribe down to its fourth straight defeat.

In the American league's other offering, the Boston Red Sox dropped into the second division by losing the first game to Johnny Niggeling and the St. Louis Browns, 7-2, but then crept back into fourth place with a 17-3 win in the short night game, during which Jimmy Foxx hit a homer with the bases loaded to knock in four of the 14 runs the Sox scored in the sixth inning.

The top club in the National League fared better than the top one in the American. The Cincinnati Reds won a pair from the Phillies, 3-2 and 6-5, to stretch their advantage over the Brooklyn Dodgers to seven and one-half games. Jim Turner pitched five-hit ball to win the first and in the second the Reds simply outhammered the Phils, despite two homers by Johnny Rizzo.

The Dodgers split with the hard-punching Pittsburgh Pirates, losing the first 4-3 on Dick Lanahan's eight-hitter, but winning the second 8-1 as "Old Faithful" Fred Fitzsimmons spun a five-hitter for his thirteenth win of the season, and 205th of his career and the fifth this season over the baffled Bucs.

The New York Giants and Chicago Cubs split a double bill, Don Dilliesandro's tenth-inning double giving the Windy City outfit the first 5-4 while the Giant hitters took more credit than the Giants' pitchers for the 12-8 nightcap victory, in which both teams got a total of 31 hits.

More Entries Made For Armory Tourney

New applications in the past few days have boosted the entry total to 30 for the wrestling tournament tentatively slated to get underway here September 10. A new Pacific coast junior heavyweight champion will be crowned at the end of the tourney.

A preliminary look at the entry list leads Promoter Mac Lillard to predict that at least 10 weeks and probably 12 will be required to decide the championship. That and the quality of the contestants will make the event the biggest wrestling news in the north-west this year, Lillard says.

The winner and new champion will take some \$500 in prize money into his tight belt, the regular night purses. The winner of each of the two semifinal bouts will collect \$100 with the losers getting \$50 apiece. Then the lucky finalist will get \$500 more, making a

total of \$800 in prizes for the show.

Two chances will be given each wrestler in the tournament. This provision will eliminate chances of an "off" night spoiling the chances of a good man. Many a clever grappler has found Klamath's 4100-foot altitude more of a handicap in the ring than he expected and has lost his first bout here before getting acclimated. A second defeat will mean an elimination from the tournament.

The tournament is open to anyone weighing 200 pounds or less who wants a chance at the crown, and entry lists will probably be kept open for about two weeks after the matches begin.

In the meantime, Klamath has another matter to be decided. Mike Nazarian, who, incidentally, is one of the men who have been able to come up to this altitude direct from sea level at Los Angeles and win every bout, is faced with the job of disposing of Ernie Piluso to keep his four-straight-win record clean.

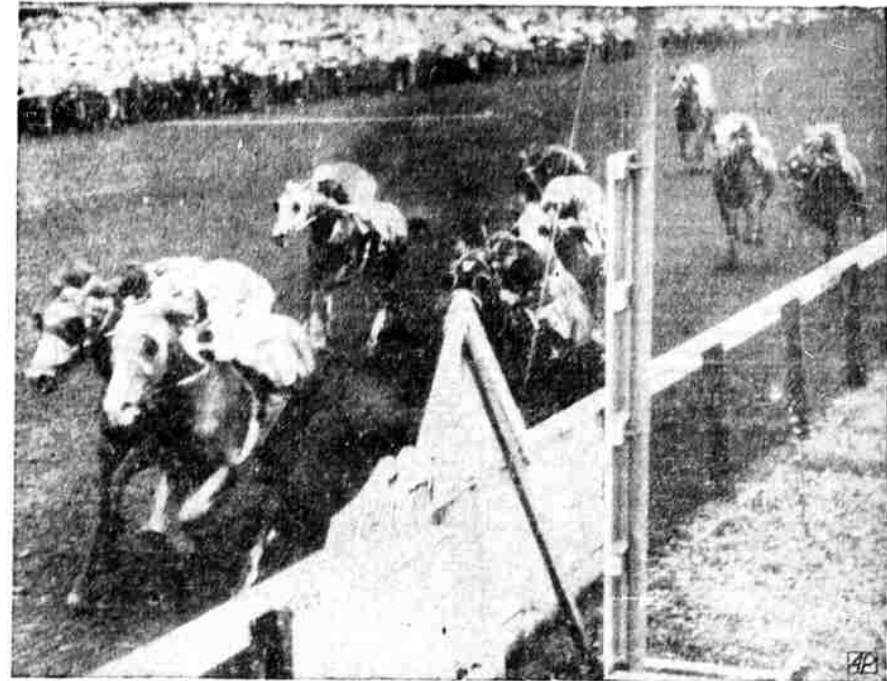
