WPA EMPLOYEES FAIL IN COURT TEST OF RULING

SEATTLE, Aug. 27 (AP)—A challenge by two discharged WPA workers of the constitutionality of the WPA loyalty to government affidavits found no support in federal court here.

Shortly after Federal Judge Lloyd L. Black's ruling yesterday, however, one of the two, William Henry Coyle, announced he had decided to sign it. He had objected to the part that asked him to swear he was a citizen of the United States, contending that under his religion, Jehovah's Witnesses, he is a "citizen of heaven."

"I still think the affidavit could be used in a subversive manner," he said. "But I am going to bow to the will, as expressed by the company servant of Jehovah's Witnesses and also the court here, and sign the affidavit."

Judge Black dismissed the injunction suit brought by the two against State WPA Administrator Carl W. Smith, ruling the court was without jurisdiction because the suit involved was less than \$3000.

The men sought to restrain the administrator from enforcing the rule requiring WPA employees to sign an affidavit declaring the signer is a United States citizen, that he does not belong to the communist party or Nazi Bund and that he does not believe in the overthrow of the government.

Ralph Turnbaugh, the other of the two, said he was opposed to signing it because "if they put this over there is nothing to prevent them from making you swear you are not a Methodist or Presbyterian or something else." He said it constituted "regimentation." Each contended their constitutional rights were infringed.

Attorney John Caughlin said the ruling would be appealed.

GIG HARBOR, Aug. 27 (AP)—Axel Uddenberg, about 85, prominent in Gig Harbor for a half century, died Sunday at his home here. Visiting Puget Sound for the first time as the master of a sailing vessel, he decided to stay and opened the general store which is now a Gig Harbor landmark.

He had long since turned management of the store over to a son, Bert, and lived in retirement. Other survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Aida Dinsmore of Klamath Falls, Ore., and Mrs. Alice Stevick of Gig Harbor.

Mrs. W. J. Dinsmore and Mr. and Mrs. Guy LeRoy Stevick left for Medford early Monday morning and Mrs. Dinsmore and Mrs. Stevick flew by plane to Seattle. Stevick motored north. Dinsmore left Monday afternoon for the north to join his wife. Mr. and Mrs. Stevick had been visiting here at the Dinsmore home.

Mr. Uddenberg was found dead in his chair Sunday afternoon, according to Dinsmore.
