ARMY UNITS TO STOP HERE ON WAY TO SOUTH

Klamath Falls will again play the role of host to some 1800 men and 1703 horses when members of the 76th field artillery of the United States army, and the Eleventh cavalry, will pass through this city en route south from Yelm near Ft. Lewis, Wash., where the war games have been in progress. Destination of each section is Monterey, Calif.

According to an announcement of the Southern Pacific, the following schedule of arrival here will be observed. Each unit has a stopover privilege of six to seven hours during which time they will feed, water, and rest the horses at Texum, two miles south of the city.

Friday, 3:15 a. m. 76th field artillery, 512 men, 470 horses, leave between 10 a. m. and noon.

Friday, 8:15 p. m. 76th field artillery, 417 horses, 505 men, leave around 3 a. m. Saturday.

Saturday, 5:15 a. m. 76th field artillery, 306 horses, 327 men, leave around noon.

Saturday, 12:15 p. m. Eleventh cavalry, 542 men, 510 horses, leave around 7 p. m.
