Work of the National Reclamation association in Washington, D. C., during the past year, was outlined by F. O. Hagie, secretary-manager of the association, at a meeting held Tuesday night in the Willard hotel when 26 interested persons attended. H. P. Bosworth Jr., president of Klamath County chamber of commerce, presided.

Hagie discussed legislation which has passed recently, and his talk was followed by a round table discussion of reclamation matters of importance to residents of this section. Also a speaker of the evening was Judge Robert Sawyer of Bend, vice president of the National Reclamation association, and director for Oregon. Sawyer briefly outlined the formation of the group.

Present were representatives of the Jackson county irrigation districts, including Medford, Rogue River, Talent, and Eagle Point, and Klamath districts embracing Langell Valley, Klamath, Pine Grove, and Enterprise. Also present were members of the agricultural committee, and the board of directors, of Klamath county chamber of commerce, and a group of interested farmers.

The US postoffice, formerly located at Rocky Point, has now been moved to Harriman lodge, it was announced.

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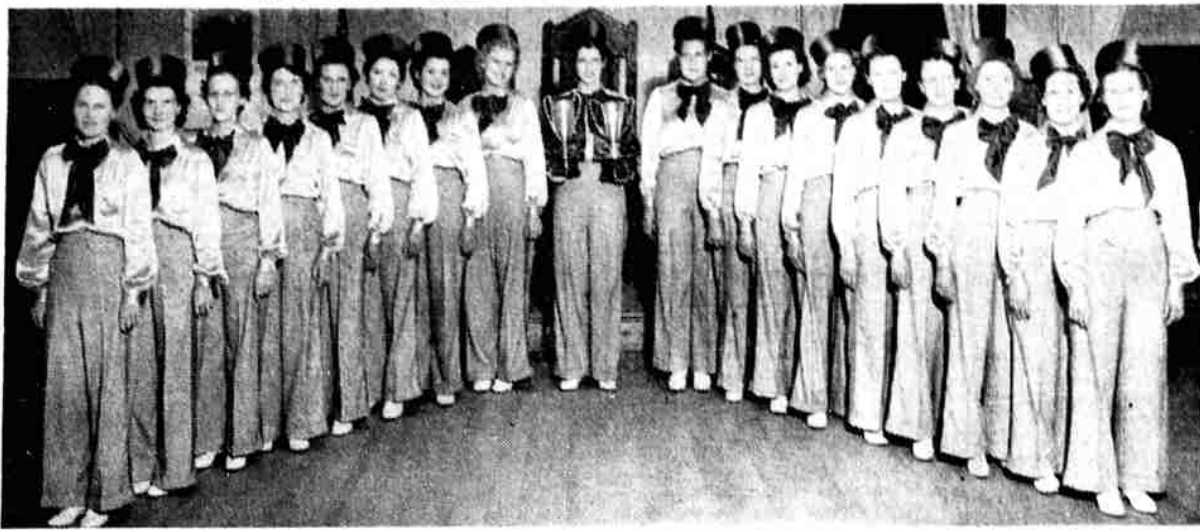
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Drill Team Takes First Place at State Meet

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for refused to disclose the source of his information or to name the senators he said were involved.

On the house side the military committee adopted an amendment proposed by Rep. Byrns (D-Tenn.) for the express purpose of "scuttling" the bill, but all the members who would comment were in disagreement as to just what actually was accomplished.

Byrns, while not explaining how the bill would be scuttled, declared the amendment removed a draft restriction which limited to home defense units conscription of men 18 to 21 and 45 to 64. Rep. Wadsworth (R-N.Y.) said the registration as well as the draft section was altered so that only men between the ages of 21 and 45 had to register and become subject to service.

The Byrns amendment was put orally and there was so much disagreement over it some persons thought it would receive further committee attention.

Ten Killed in Mine By Blast Deep Underground

BATES, Ark., Aug. 28 (AP)—Ten men, the entire night crew of the Bates Coal Corporation mine, were killed by an explosion deep down in the slope-type shaft here a few minutes after they went to work late yesterday.

State Mine Inspector J. W. Fitzjarrrell of Fort Smith pressed an investigation in an effort to determine the cause of the blast which occurred approximately 1700 feet underground.

The badly burned bodies were removed from the mine before midnight and taken to Heaven, Okla., and Hartford, Ark., mortuaries. The mine is a few miles east of the Oklahoma border.

The reception at the battery probably was the least spectacular ever accorded visiting royalty. A small crowd huddled in the rain outside the covered pier and watched the crown princess and her retinue whiz past in a motor caravan.

The princess held her 3-year-old son, Prince Harald in her lap in the first car. She wore a blue ensemble, with a silver fox scarf and a wide brimmed, dark hat. She also carried a large bouquet of roses.

Weather Dark

During the trip up the bay she remarked that the weather was the same as it was when she came here last year to open the Norwegian pavilion at the New York world's fair. It was a dark, rainy day.

Mrs. Florence Jaffray Harriman, U. S. minister to Norway, and a number of other diplomats remained aboard until the vessel docked in Brooklyn.

The royal party was met by Wilhelm de Morgenstierne, Norwegian minister to the United States, and George T. Summerlin, chief of protocol of the state department. At the crown princess' request, there was a minimum of ceremony.

The royal party planned to drive to Hyde park tomorrow and be the guests of Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt until the crown princess can find suitable quarters.

The American Legion was picked up 500 miles at sea by two United States destroyers forming an honorary escort.

Virtually all the 897 passengers were Americans fleeing countries under German and Russian domination.

President Signs Refugee Law

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28 (AP)—Authority for American vessels to enter the European combat zone to bring refugee children to the United States has been signed into law by President Roosevelt.

Under the new act, the vessels may enter war zones otherwise forbidden to American shipping by the neutrality law in order to remove children, provided assurances first are obtained from belligerents that the ships would not suffer any molestation from their armed forces.

BRITAIN WEATHERS NIGHT BOMB RAIDS

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four towns in the southeast and northwest.

Great numbers of incendiary and explosive bombs were dropped, but the government said damage was done only to houses, and that the attacks were indiscriminate.

No Casualties

No casualties were caused in London. In one northeast town 70 persons had to be given shelter after bombs smashed a housing project.

Two of 21 German bombers and one of the escorting Messerschmitt fighters were shot down in a series of dogfights over a southeast town.

One German bomber was seen to crash into the sea several miles from land and another was shot down by a Spitfire into the sea after jettisoning its bombs while only 50 feet above water. Two survivors were brought ashore by lifeboats.

Three women were injured by a bomb which hit an apartment building during the fights. Rescuers dug for other casualties. Streets of the residential section were covered with broken glass and pieces of shell, but the residents had taken shelter.

The capital had two alarms, one of 24 hours just before midnight and the second of less than an hour shortly after midnight. Few planes were heard and anti-aircraft activity was light.

It was the second successive night of heavy bombing through the country, the action far outstripping daylight attacks of yesterday and approximating that of Monday night, which was the heaviest night assault of the war.

From an increasing number of communities came reports of individual towns having "the biggest attack of the war," and the widespread use of incendiary bombs indicated the Germans may be employing a new tactic.

Knox Replies to Plane Criticism

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28 (AP)—Replying to what he called "unintelligent criticism" of army and navy plane purchasing policies, Secretary Knox said today that the navy had 1031 combat planes, 1489 training planes, and 21 miscellaneous craft under contract but not yet delivered.

He gave the breakdown to his press conference in elaboration of the overall picture of army and navy plane purchases given by President Roosevelt yesterday when Mr. Roosevelt said 10,015 planes were under construction.

Returns from 10,036 precincts out of 13,540 gave:

Democrat senator: John Anson Ford, 103,894; Sen. Hiram W. Johnson, 356,322; James D. Meredith, 17,519; Richard S. Otto, 11,564; Lieut.-Gov. Ellis E. Patterson, 133,681; Assemblyman Sam W. Yorty, 51,267.

Republican senator (10,673 precincts): Ford, 30,354; Johnson, 411,198; Patterson, 38,722; Yorty, 24,477.

Progressive senator (5718 precincts): Johnson, 2234; Otto, 522.

Most, if not all, of California's members of the house appeared assured on renomination.

In Mississippi, Senator Theodore G. Bilbo won democratic nomination for a second term. It was the equivalent of reelection in that predominantly democratic state.

Unofficial returns from 1319 of the state's 1600 precincts gave Bilbo 80,881 votes to 58,849 for former Governor Hugh White, in the only contested representative's race, A. L. Ford, the incumbent, now.

Incomplete South Carolina returns gave renomination to five representatives who had opposition, and there, too, nomination is tantamount to election.

Mendel Rivers, young Charleston attorney, apparently defeated Alfred H. VonKoltz to succeed Rep. Clara G. McMillan, who did not seek renomination. Rivers led VonKoltz 16,262 to 10,793 in 183 out of 198 precincts.

The unofficial count on prohibition in 1181 out of 1523 precincts was 126,769 for a dry law against 89,276 for retention of the present system of selling liquor in licensed packaged stores and beer and wine with few restrictions. The result will not affect South Carolina's present liquor law enacted five years ago, but is intended to serve as a guide to the legislature in its session next year.

Two Arkansas representatives appeared to have won in another state where democratic nomination is as good as election. They were E. C. Gathings and W. F. Norrell, the only two representatives involved in the second primary held in races where no candidate received a clear majority in the first.

Delaware democrats, in convention, nominated James M. Tunnell Sr., to oppose Senator John C. Townsend Jr., republican incumbent, in November. They named Dr. Philip A. Traynor as democratic candidate for the state's only seat in the house.

Complete returns from the Dorris precinct last night gave Hiram Johnson an overwhelming victory in that section of the California primary election. The count gave:

Johnson 108; Patterson 25; Yorty 9; Otto 8; Ford 5; Meredith 2.

Rep. Harry Englebright (R.) running unopposed polled 147 votes.

Other results included: Fulcher 98; Gunlock 45; Agar 49; McMurphy 38; Rohrer 44; Hawkins 63; Jacobs 185.

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City Moves to Foreclose on 1200 City Lots

Approximately 1200 lots within the city limits, subject to foreclosure for all street and sewer assessments not paid through 1937, will be foreclosed upon by the city of Klamath Falls it was announced Wednesday afternoon.

The council sought to order the foreclosure at Monday night's meeting, and at a meeting of the bond committee Wednesday afternoon in the city hall, final authorization for the act was given. It is hoped that as many pieces of this property as possible be foreclosed upon between now and January 1, 1941.

Persons wishing to keep their property from foreclosure may apply at the police judge's office and make arrangements for either partial payments, rebond, or can deed the property to the city and buy lots back on contract for the amount of city assessments.

Once the property list is published, however, persons wishing to redeem the land must pay the full amount against it, it was advised.
