WINDSOR ENVOY MAKES PLANS FOR DUKE VISIT

NEW YORK, Aug. 29 (AP)—An emissary of the Duke of Windsor has been in New York apparently making quiet preparations for the former British sovereign's expected visit to the United States and Canada.

News of his presence did not become known until Wednesday, 24 hours after his departure.

The duke in an interview recently at Bermuda while en route to Nassau expressed great interest in New York City and said he thought he should pay the city another visit.

He still has a fine cattle ranch in Canada, which he described as "the only property I own in the world," and the projected trip undoubtedly would include a stop there.

FIRE TOLL LIGHT FOR CALIFORNIA

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Aug. 29 (UP)—The forest and range fire toll in California during the first seven months of 1940 was the lightest in the past three years, the state forestry division reported.

The division said that damage amounting to \$93,774 was caused by range and forest fires up to Aug. 1 of this year, compared to \$289,966 in the same period last year and \$160,940 in 1938.

Fires so far this year have burned over 481 acres of timber, 64,817 acres of brush, 30,770 acres of grass and 2774 acres of hay and grain for a total of 98,856 acres. The acreage burned in the seven months last year totalled 267,324 acres.
