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to reports that the German and Italian ambassadors in Moscow had visited Soviet Premier Joseph Stalin.

They insisted, however, that it has long been known to all powers, including Soviet Russia, that Germany considers the Balkans her special sphere of influence whereas Russia, in her recent phase of expansion, merely wanted the frontiers of her former empire—that of the czar—restored.

These sources said that with the accession of Benito Mussolini to power in Italy, the Balkans had been accomplished and the gain of northern Bulgaria had gone beyond this aim.

Three Questions
"Again I ask the president—Is he for or against the Overton-Russell amendment? Was it introduced in the United States senate with his knowledge and approval? Does he believe in its principles?"

"The president is correct in his statement about me if he meant to imply that I am doing my very best to induce him to state his position on problems concerning the duty of a man running for president to state his position on such problems and doubly so when he is seeking a third term."

"As I previously told correspondents with reference to that portion of Mr. Wallace's notification speech having to do with appeasement, Mr. Wallace was 100 per cent wrong, and now the president is 100 per cent wrong in implying that the re-

publican party is the party of appeasement. The reverse is completely true.

"The president announced to the press at the time I delivered my acceptance talk, that he did not have time to listen to it. I know he is very busy but before commenting on the republican attitude toward such subjects as appeasement, perhaps a perusal of the republican platform and my talk would show him that both he and Mr. Wallace have made a misrepresentation."

The president said today Wallace's speech spoke excellently for itself. Wallace called the GOP the party of appeasement.

Tickets for Klamath games this fall will go on sale September 3, being handled by KUHS students, it was announced Friday at the chamber of commerce. Regular sales at 8 a. m., Thursday, September 6.

Season tickets, entitling holders to attend five major games and probably two additional Wildcat games, will be priced at \$2, a reduction from last year. Reserve seats will be sold at 25 cents additional, the sale of these tickets opening September 6. General admission tickets will be priced at 50 cents.

BRITISH TURN BACK BOMBERS ABOVE LONDON

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a swarm of British fighters met them and split up the formation. Streets of the suburbs were crowded with shoppers when the bombs were dropped. Men and women who had gone out after the second warning ended, had to take shelter again.

Reports from a southeast town said that while London's second warning was in progress 12 high explosive bombs and a few incendiaries were dropped in outlying districts, and several persons were injured and one man died of shock. Some houses were badly damaged.

The gunfire over one suburban area was described as "terrific" by some eye-witnesses as one German bomber was shot down over the London area with two British fighters in hot pursuit.

The all clear signal sounded over the London area at 5:48 p. m. (8:48 a. m. PST).

The president and Mrs. Roosevelt and their son, Franklin Jr., sat beside a radio in the library of their home last night and listened to the address in which Secretary Wallace formally accepted his nomination as the democratic vice presidential candidate.

Then the chief executive, made public today at the temporary White House, to his political teammates:

Henry A. Wallace, Des Moines, Iowa.
A grand speech and splendidly given before an appreciative nation. We have been sitting at the radio and only wish that all of us Roosevelt could have been with the Wallaces in Des Moines tonight. You good luck and my affectionate regards.

Franklin D. Roosevelt.
While Wallace was getting off to the "glorious start," the president showed no signs of altering his position that world conditions and the defense program would not give "the time or the inclination to engage in purely political debate."
