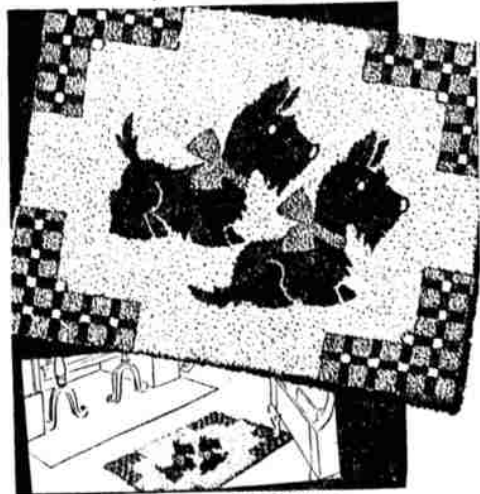
Couple Wed In Nevada

Results Show Weed Control Possible By Cultivation

The most outstanding development in weed control in the past few years has been to definitely prove that perennial weeds can be killed by cultivation, and the general acceptance of that fact.

There are at the present time 76 acres of white top under cultivation for weed control, 73 acres of morning glory, 28 of Canada thistle, and 7 acres of leafy spurge in Klamath county, and in all probability these figures will be raised to include a number of patches that are in fields where the crop is now being harvested and cultivation for weed control will begin yet this summer.

Can Start Any Time

Cultivation of weed infestations can start any time during the growing season. However, eradication will probably be accomplished with one or two less cultivations if the operations are started at the weak stage of the plant, which in most cases appears to be between two and three weeks after emergence.

Areas which are inclined to be too wet to work until quite late in the spring should be plowed in the fall, just as late and as deep as possible. This will delay emergence of the weeds in the spring until such a time as the ground is in shape to work.

Rye Seeding Possible

Cultivation usually consists of a deep plowing to begin with, followed by frequent cultivations. For these, duck foot and rod weeder are used but in most cases discing and plowing will do the job. If after two or three discings a dust mulch is formed on top of the patch, it will be again necessary to plow the area.

After one or two years of intensive summer fallow it is possible to seed rye as a smother crop. By this means one can control the weeds and still harvest a hay or grain crop. After the crop is harvested the area is again cultivated or seeded down to alfalfa or grass.
