Breeding Studies at Squaw Butte Station Promise Wide Benefit to Range Stockmen

WASHINGTON, Sept. 6 (AP)—How does the Squaw Butte range station near Burns, Ore., actually affect the individual western stockmen for whose benefit studies conducted there were inaugurated? Harry I. Stearns, chairman of the Squaw Butte advisory committee and himself a stockman, wrote in the *Grazing Bulletin*, a publication of the interior department's grazing service, that practical range men can apply the principles and studies carried on at Squaw Butte to their own ranges. "One of these studies being conducted with considerable interest by the cowman," he said, "is a range cattle breeding program based on the intensifying of blood lines through the use of sires of similar blood lines. Regardless of the breeding ability of the bull or the uniformity of his get, it has always been considered a bad practice to breed too closely on range livestock. This study will be carried on over a period of years to see if any detrimental results can be seen, or on the other hand, if any improvements can be shown in uniformity and type. Some very definite results have been accomplished through the intensifying of blood in registered cattle, and it will be interesting to note what results will be shown in applying this practice to commercial cattle breeders."

APPEAL MADE FOR TEMPORARY JOBS

Another study being conducted at Squaw Butte which should have a marked influence on the improvement of range cattle is a project based on the selection of 25 foundation heifers from the "bottom herd." Ten of the heifers were of the modern type and conformation, being selected by a committee appointed for that purpose, and the other 15 were selected for their lack of the qualities. These heifers will be bred to the same bulls or bulls of the same type and bloodlines. Throughout this experiment, at the end of a definite period a comparison will be made of the results accomplished through the use of good foundation stock as against the use of inferior stock. This study also will assist in determining the relative costs involved in production, as well as the net returns on breeding cows of both classes. Stearns' article was entitled

DOCTORS INDICATE DEFENSE READINESS

EUGENE, Sept. 6 (AP)—Approval of the American Medical association program of medical preparedness was voiced today by Dr. J. H. Fitzgibbons, Oregon delegate to the AMA, in a report on the recent national convention given before members of the state society here.

Dr. Fitzgibbons, a Portland physician, told how the AMA had offered the services of 117,000 licensed M.D.'s in the interest of national defense. The offer was made, he said, "before the government requested it."

Further information of the medical preparedness program will be presented the 250 physicians attending the state session this evening when Dr. John H. O'Shea, Spokane, member of the national committee, speaks on "Medical Preparedness."

Dr. Charles E. Hunt, Eugene, is the Oregon representative on the nationwide committee.

Dr. Ralph A. Fenton, Portland, trustee of the AMA, also speaking on the national defense program, said many physicians will be needed to maintain the health of the augmented army, even though conscription may not be passed by congress immediately.

PINE ORDERS DROP AT END OF AUGUST

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 6 (AP)—Western pine lumber orders dropped more than 13,000,000 feet in the week ending August 31 compared with the previous week, the Western Pine association said today. The orders totaled 106,838,000 board feet as compared with 120,154,000 feet last week and 86,299,000 for a similar 1939 period. Shipments for the week came to 83,585,000 feet, production to 86,884,000 feet.

CEDARVILLE — Officials of the Modoc County Fair association have been busy for the past two weeks preparing for the opening of the annual Modoc county fair to be held here Friday, Saturday and Sunday, September 6, 7 and 8.

Fourteen dollars in cash prizes are offered to exhibitors of farm produce, handicraft and livestock.

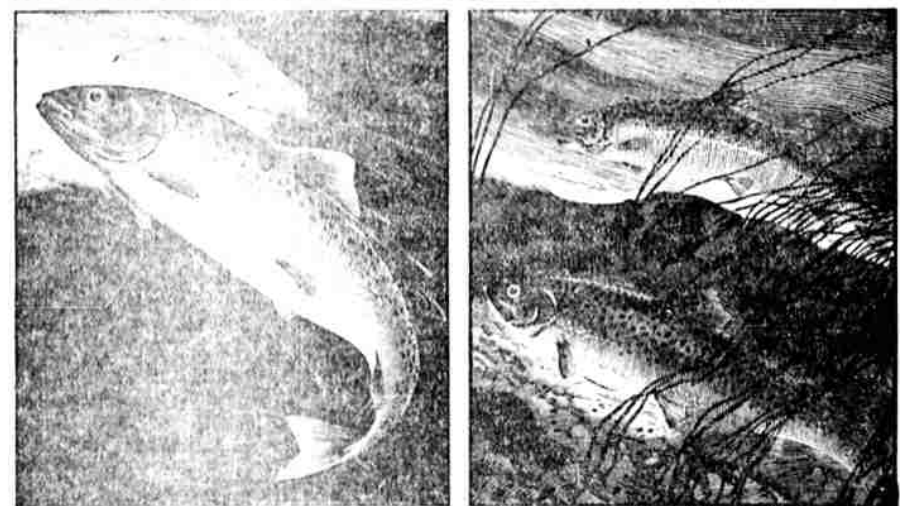

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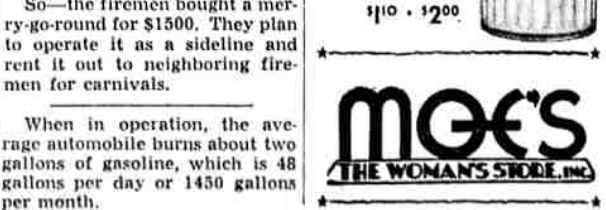
