

YANKS DROP BACK AS CLEVELAND, TIGERS WIN.

Foxy Lloyd Madsen of Chico, who soothed Coach Gustafson and the Pelican team into the belief that Chico's chances last year were nothing better than hopeless, is up to his old tricks.

Last season as Gustafson was optimistically preparing his Pelicans for the Chico opener Madsen forwarded a letter in which every other word was a messenger of gloom.

He complained that his team was composed of untrained, unsophisticated and unsatisfactory sophomores whom he was ashamed to bring across the state line. Sophomores they were, but never have local fans witnessed a more booming pass attack than those sops, marshalled by Half-back Watson, turned loose in a last half drive that tied the locals 13-13.

This week the crafty Chico headman, formerly a professional ball player, sent north a 1940 bear story that outbunks the 1939 version.

Watson, a sophomore last year, is missing from the lineup, according to Coach Madsen. His squad, according to the round figures pencilled after his players' names, average only 155 pounds per man, an unbelievably light team for a school of approximately 2000 students.

Chances are the team will outweigh the Pelicans and that Watson will be in the lineup.

GLOOMY GUSTAFSON

NEW YORK, Sept. 13 (U.P.)—Detroit, Cleveland and New York, in the three-cornered American league struggle, went to bat Thursday and when the daily hodge-podge was unraveled, the Tigers held the driver's seat by .003 percentage points over the Indians and the Yankees trailed by two games.

The Tigers came from behind with a four-run rally in the eighth inning to beat the Yanks, 6-3. Rudy York's single, driving in Hank Greenberg from second, tied the count. Bruce Campbell was purposely walked and Pinky Higgins singled, ending the game as far as the Yankees were concerned.

Harder Whips Bosox
Schoolboy Rowe went the route for the Tigers and although rapped for 11 hits pitched effectively enough to gain his 14th victory. Atley Donald and Marvin Breuer worked for the Yanks, giving up nine blows between them.

Cleveland pounded out an 8-1 victory over the Boston Red Sox behind Mel Harder's three-hit pitching. Harder had a shutout until the ninth when Doc Cramer tripled and scored on Ted Williams' fly.

Cleveland made seven of their eight runs in a big fourth inning to knock Fritz Ostermueller from the box.
The Chicago White Sox moved into a tie with Boston for fourth place by knocking off the Philadelphia Athletics twice, 1-0 and 4-3. Bill Dietrich held the A's to four hits while Ed Smith fashioned a five-hitter in the nightcap.

Thompson Wins 15th
Washington belted Vernon Kennedy and Roxie Lawson for 13 hits and scored a 7-2 victory over St. Louis. Rookie Arnold Anderson held the Browns to six hits.

In the National league, Gene Thompson won his 15th victory and his fifth straight as the Cincinnati Reds pounded out a 9-4 victory over the New York Giants. Ex-Giant Jimmy Ripple had a perfect day at bat with "3 for 3," two doubles and a single.

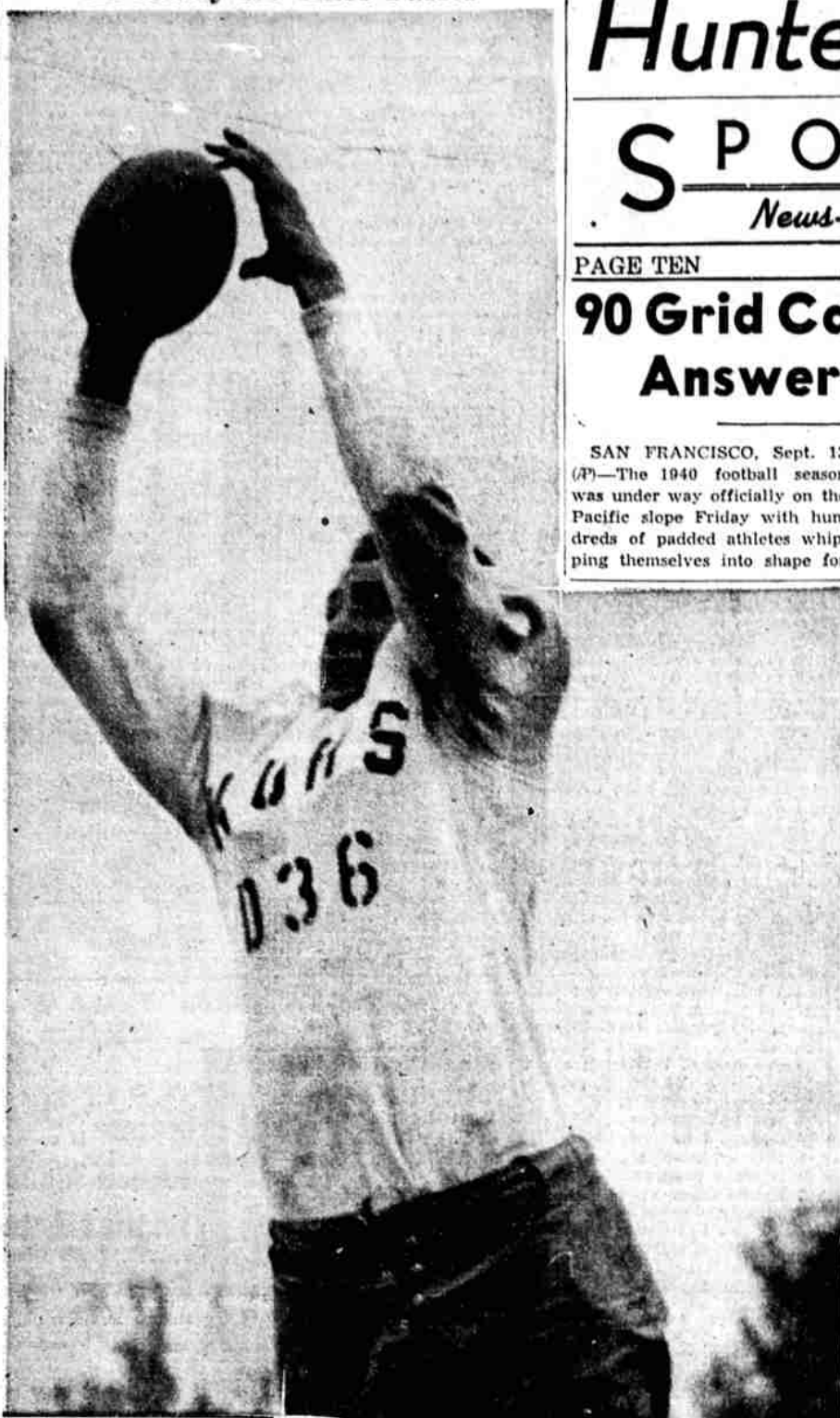
Brooklyn cut the Reds' league lead to 8½ games by taking two from Pittsburgh, 7-0 and 7-4. Hugh Casey stopped the Pirates with three hits in the first game and then stepped in a relief role in the nightcap to gain credit for his second victory and 11th of the season.

Boston trimmed the St. Louis Cardinals in both ends of their doubleheader, 17-7 and 6-1. The Bees slammed out 21 hits in the opener while Bill Posedel hand-cuffed the Cards with six hits in the nightcap.

The Chicago Cubs won their fourth straight victory, 5-1, over the Philadelphia Phillies. Larry French won his 13th victory as he held the Phils to five hits.

Frankie Dasso allowed only five hits to win for the Seals while Orrell and Fallin who worked for the Beavers were touched for seven.

Dick "Kewpie" Barrett, veteran Seattle righthanded pitcher, gained another win tonight with an easy 11-6 victory over San Diego. Barrett left the game in the seventh with Seattle leading, 8-4, and Paul Gregory kept the Padres from becoming too dangerous in the last three frames. The Rainiers garnered 18 hits off Dick Newsome, Jim Morris and Al Olson.

A last inning Sacramento rally fell one run short and Hollywood eked out a 5-4 win over the sliding Solons. Sacramento scored three times in the seventh and once in the ninth. Wayne Osborne was credited with the pitching win although Hiram Bithorn took over in the ninth. Oscar Judd, promising southpaw in the Cardinal chain, was charged with the defeat.

Los Angeles walloped Henry "Cotton" Phippen and Oakland, 8-3, in a lopsided game. John Fallon limited the Oaks to 10 scattered hits while his mates pounded Phippen and Joe Mulligan for 12. Phippen left the game in the seventh after the Angels scored two runs in the third and three in both the fourth and the seventh.

Forest Officials Caution Hunters

Aware that California deer and bird hunters are their own best monitors in adhering to the

sportsman's code of ethics, the United States forest service has just issued a cautionary notice in the interests of forest fire prevention.

"We haven't funds to assign as many patrolmen as in previous years to guard against hunters' fires this fall," said Regional Forester S. B. Shaw. "And if any opinion of sportsmen is still correct we won't have to."

"Despite severe fall fire hazards in the woods the past several years, hunters have proved to us quite conclusively that they can be careful with their campfires, warming fires and smoking materials."

90 Grid Candidates Answer Call at Cal

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 13 (U.P.)—The 1940 football season was under way officially on the Pacific slope Friday with hundreds of padded athletes whipping themselves into shape for

initial games only two weeks away.

Turnouts were large for the most part Thursday, the first day of practice for Pacific Coast conference schools and most of the major independents.

More than 90 varsity candidates reported to Leonard "Stub" Allison at University of California. The Bears have a date with Michigan at Berkeley Sept. 28, and Allison put the boys through their paces with no delay.

Seventy-one, with more expected shortly, turned out at University of California at Los Angeles, the largest Bruin squad in history. Head Coach Edwin "Babe" Horrell predicted he would have "another powerful team."

Howard Jones looked over 65 candidates at University of California, and said he was satisfied with the turnout although about 10 more had been expected. USC, conference winner and Rose bowl team the past two seasons, must replace three ace backfield men—Ambrose Schindler, Greenville Lansdell and Doyle Nave.

University of Washington, picked by many to set the conference pace this year, had two sessions Thursday with 53 men on deck. Stanford, with Clark Shaughnessy the new head coach after a disastrous 1939 campaign, had 60 men reporting, including as a halfback candidate, Clyde Jeffrey, one of the country's fastest sprinters.

The Oregon State college outfit, weeded out in spring practice, totaled 39. University of Oregon also had a light turnout. A half dozen or so veterans were expected at University of Idaho to bolster the squad of 36 which reported to Coach Ted Bank. Mac Beall, 1938 quarterback, is back after a year's lay-off.

SHOOT STARTS NEXT MONDAY IN CALIFORNIA

Many Klamath basin deer hunters will travel south of the state line Sunday to be on hand for the opening of deer season in northern California a half hour before sunrise Monday morning, September 16.

Other hunters are making preparations for the opening of the season in Oregon on Friday, September 20. There will be no shooting of deer this season, under regulations of the state game commission, but the mule deer, refuge in western Klamath and eastern Lake counties will be thrown open for the first time.

Extension of the open season on migratory birds this year for both northern California and southern Oregon will encourage a large number of Klamath basin residents to buy \$10 California non-resident bird licenses. Many hunters will probably pay the \$1 additional for California deer tags, a survey of local hunters indicates.

California hunting regulations have set the deer season for northern California districts September 16 to October 13. In district No. 11, in the northeast corner of the state, the limit is one buck and forked horns cannot be taken. In district No. 14, in the northwest corner of the state, the limit is two bucks and forked horns can be killed. The dividing line is the Southern Pacific tracks, extending south from the state border.

The annual deer kill for California is 40,000 animals, according to game commission figures. Each year 250,000 persons take out hunting licenses and about one half of these purchased deer tags.
