

AFL DOCKMEN END STRIKE ON SOUND

TACOMA, Sept. 13 (P)—Puget Sound waterfronts returned to near-normal today as longshoremen in Tacoma, Port Angeles and Anacortes ended a two-week protest strike and "hot cargo" picket lines were dissolved at Seattle.

Officially, the strike called by the International Longshoremen's association (AFL) in protest to a national labor relations board ruling making the CIO's International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's union the exclusive Pacific coast bargaining agency, ended at 8 a. m.

However, longshoremen in the three ILA controlled ports had to await the arrival of ships before they could resume work. At Tacoma, the first stevedore "picking" since August 30 was scheduled at 11 a. m. Unloading was to begin at noon.

Termination of the strike brought contradictory statements from the west coast's rival waterfront leaders.

T. A. Thronson, coast ILA secretary, said the NLRB had promised to conduct hearings and allow the ILA to bargain for the ports where its members are in the majority. He declared the ILA had "beaten the NLRB" and termed it "one of our greatest victories."

At San Francisco, Harry Bridges, ILWU president, disputed Thronson's claim to victory and called on the NLRB to "immediately confirm or deny" it had "promised a re-hearing" to the ILA. He said ILA officials "were forced to resort to this final desperate maneuver as an excuse for calling off the strike . . ."

Thronson could not be reached immediately today for a statement.

Following yesterday's meeting, Barney Mayes, ILA publicity director, said the NLRB's action might develop into a coastwide vote and result in the AFL controlling more ports.

"This is the biggest wallop Harry Bridges has taken yet," Mayes declared. "So far the ILA has had to make a defensive fight but this puts us on the offensive against the CIO."

Mayes said if the ILA could negotiate better contracts with waterfront employers "it would bring a lot of CIO men over to us and we would have a majority in their ports."

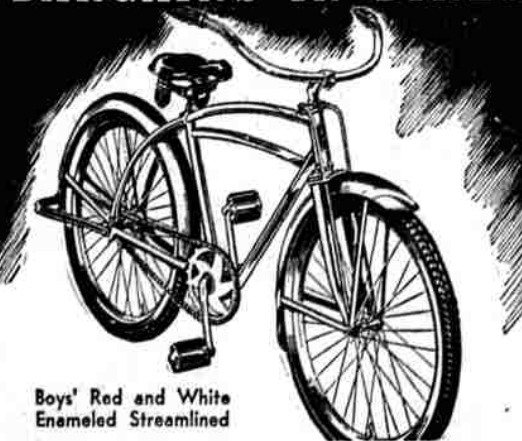

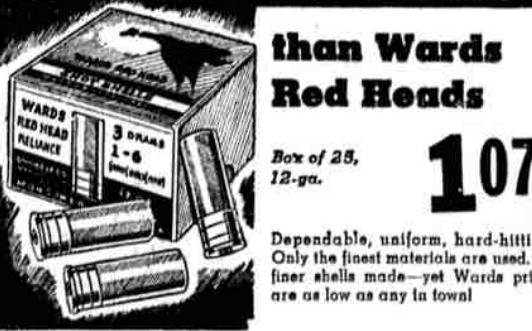
