Extension classes will be held in Klamath Falls again this year according to word received here from the Oregon state system of higher education, extension division.

Opening date of the classes is set for October 2, all classes to be held in Fremont school Wednesday afternoon, 4 p. m. to 6 p. m., and 7:15 p. m. to 9:15 p. m. The afternoon class will be devoted to the study of, "History of Modern Europe," and the evening class, "American Literature."

Fees per term for each person are \$5 for one course, \$9 for two courses. The instructor is Arthur S.
