

GEN. PERSHING QUIETLY MARKS BOTH BIRTHDAY

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13 (AP)—Twenty-two years and 3000 miles removed from his greatest military triumphs, General John J. Pershing observed his 80th birthday Friday in the quiet seclusion of his hotel apartment.

Over 800 congratulatory messages, more than he usually receives, piled up in his ornate, old-fashioned office in the state department building, which is labeled with the title that he alone bears among American military men, "General of the Armies."

There, General Pershing arranged to grant a press interview before making a brief birthday speech by radio, and after receiving the distinguished service cross from President Roosevelt.

Meanwhile, as war thundered across the shores where he and his doughboys once stood on their way to the battle fronts of France, he prepared for a quiet family luncheon with his son Warren, a New York broker, and his young daughter-in-law.

Twenty-two years ago, on his birthday, General Pershing launched the St. Mihiel offensive, first major action in which American troops engaged as an independent army in France—an attack which was the beginning of the end for the old imperial German army.

With German men on the march again under the new banner of national socialism, General Pershing recently returned to the fight with a proposal that the United States send destroyers to aid Great Britain.

His appeal was answered with the president's transfer of 50 vessels to Britain, and on his birthday some of the ships were passing into British hands.

This is the man who, just two and a half years ago, had been given up for dead by many of his closest friends. His gallant triumph over an oft-times mortal combination of liver and heart ailments brought him back slowly to the arena of public affairs.

Although Pershing has held aloof from "meddling" either with the army or with politics during his 16 years of retirement, the man who led the American expeditionary force in France has spoken this year on military matters which he considered critical to national safety.

Carefully nurturing his gradually improving health, Pershing lives quietly in a three-room suite of a downtown hotel (The Carlton), keeping in touch with current events, chatting with frequent callers (usually the multi-clad comrades-in-arms of other days), dining often alone, and venturing outside only at dusk for a quiet drive through the city in his black limousine.

PETITIONS OUT FOR ACKERMAN

Another candidate's name appeared Friday when friends appeared at the city clerk's office and obtained petitions which they are circulating in behalf of Leigh Ackerman, acting police judge and sergeant on the city police staff, for the office of police judge.

Ackerman is now on his vacation and will not return for 10 days. Before his departure he said he would not be an active candidate for the office because he did not wish to lose his civil service rating of long standing. However Ackerman did say if he would be a candidate if "drafted" by friends.

This seems to be the case and the "draft" was well under way with petitions popping up over the entire city in Ackerman's behalf.

Serve More Milk, Butter And Fruit in Modern Menus

The new American food economy calls for more milk, more butter, more fruits, more green colored and leafy vegetables and more eggs in the diet, according to Hazel K. Stiebeling, senior food economist, economics division, United States bureau of home economics.

When a great nation sets about to put itself on a total defense footing, certainly part of its effort should go to securing diets that are nutritionally good for its citizens if those citizens are going to be up to the job of national defense. Americans like to brag of their diet as "pretty darned good." But the usual domestic diet in this country needs more protective foods to deserve being called good nutritionally," Dr. Stiebeling insists.

Milk is nutritionally good according to the feed of the cows, for example. Green vegetables are vitamin rich according to the richness of the soil in which they were grown. "One of the greatest needs in this new campaign for family defense is basic information on nutrition for teachers and club and group leaders and others who can help put over the job of teaching the American housewife the facts of modern nutrition."

Dr. Stiebeling uses the army diet as an example. "Army food is abundant and generous. The men are given a large supply of food so that whatever selection they make will still be protected from a nutritional standpoint. But the army knows that if a man is to fight well and have stamina, he must be satisfied with his food, no matter how odd his taste may be. Therefore the army diet leaves room for selection although the generous me-

nus are planned to include all nutritional requirements."

"America Cooks"—a book of practical recipes from 48 states, written by the Browns, will aid you in adjusting nutritional principles to your local tastes.

White Mountain Apple Pie
Fill a round dish solidly with sliced apples. For 7 apples, mix 1 teaspoon salt with 1 cup sugar, and use to sprinkle over the layers of apple. When the dish is filled, pour 2 tablespoons molasses over the top and dot with small bits of butter. Cover the dish and set where the apples will heat through and soften—not boil—for 5 minutes. Remove cover, and cover with plain pastry. Bake in hot oven (450° F.) for 40 minutes. Serve with whipped cream.
