A Nazi spokesman in Berlin, however, indicated that Hitler may be planning a decisive blow. "Events move very rapidly nowadays," he said. "Everybody is in a hurry for a decision."

A delayed-action bomb which fell near the United States embassy in the heart of Mayfair, was removed still unexploded, and a member of the embassy staff said wryly:

"We certainly had a hell of a night — they were popping all around us."

Aimed at Defenses

Nazi quarters in Berlin, describing the raids as aimed at London's aerial defense bases, said seven out of the British capital's 10 remaining airports have been badly damaged in the past 24 hours — some beyond possibility of immediate repair.

With today marking the state of the fourth month of daily air attacks on England, official reports put the total nation-wide total at 13,000 casualties, including 3,333 deaths. In the first 15 days of September alone, Prime Minister Winston Churchill disclosed yesterday 2,000 have been killed and 8,000 wounded.

DNB, the official German news agency, asserted that last night's smashing blows had wiped out "entire blocks" in London and that one tremendous hit was scored on a subway.

While Hitler's bombers cracked down harder than ever on the stubbornly defending islanders, the RAF heaped new "large scale" destruction on the German invasion fleet, the British air ministry reported.

Barges and communications all along the Nazi-held coast were bombed, the air ministry said, and "certain targets" in Germany also felt the lash of explosive "sticks."

The air ministry disclosed, too, that RAF pilots, quietly and systematically, have sowed more than 30 different minefields in German-controlled waters from the Norwegian coast to the Bay of Biscay.

"It is known that thousands of tons of enemy shipping have been destroyed in these fields," the ministry said.

(Continued From Page One) The democratic renomination was successfully advocated by administration forces in 1938, lost out in efforts to win both republican and democratic nominations in Manhattan's 16th congressional district.

Decisive defeats blasted O'Connor's twin hopes in New York. William T. Pfeiffer, worsted him in the republican primary, and in the democratic contest he lost again to his victorious 1938 opponent, pro-new deal Rep. James H. Fay.

The Massachusetts primary's outstanding contest was for the democratic gubernatorial nomination and Attorney General Paul D. Dever, one of the party's best vote-pullers in the state, won it handily over Francis E. Kelly, former lieutenant governor for the U. S. senate nomination. Senator Walsh, the incumbent, was unopposed on the democratic ticket, and Henry Parkman, former Boston corporation counsel, was the unchallenged republican choice.

Townsend to Back Willkie Campaign

NEW YORK, Sept. 18 (AP) — Dr. Frances E. Townsend, leader of the old age pension movement which bears his name, announced today he would campaign actively for the Willkie-McNary ticket.

He said at a press conference that he planned to leave today on a 6,000-mile tour through New York, Wisconsin, Minnesota, North Dakota, Montana, Washington, Oregon and California. He will advocate Willkie's election as well as speak for his own pension plan, he asserted.

Dr. Townsend said he expected to swing between 10,000,000 and 12,000,000 votes "half of whom are democrats."

Teller Held for Embezzlement

MILWAUKIE, Ore., Sept. 18 (AP) — District Attorney Fred A. Miller at Oregon City said today charges of embezzlement of sums amounting to \$20,000 were filed in Justice of the Peace C. F. Richardson's court last night against Donald F. Egan, 33, teller at the State bank of Milwaukie.

Federal agents arrested Egan Monday on a charge of misappropriating \$1500 of bank funds. The heavier charge was brought by the state, Miller said, after an investigation of Egan's records by state examiners.

DIXON COMPLETES LAND TESTIMONY

Testimony of the contestant was completed and the contestee presented evidence in the hearing Tuesday of the Tule lake homestead case of Wilford Dixon versus Albert Schindler, conducted by U. S. Commissioner Bert C. Thomas.

Dixon himself testified Tuesday, offering further evidence in support of his contention that Schindler has not fulfilled requirements for ownership of the homestead involved. His attorney is J. H. Carnahan.

William Kuykendall, representing Schindler, put several witnesses, including neighboring homesteaders, on the stand to refute the contestant's claim. Schindler was expected to testify Wednesday. His witnesses supported his contention that he made the homestead his home and fulfilled requirements.

The case will be decided by the federal land office.
