

ENGLISH NAVAL HERO DIES AT SEA

LONDON, Sept. 19 (AP)—Death of Vice Admiral Basil George Washington while in active service at sea was announced today. He retired in 1931 after 28 years in the royal navy, but returned to active duty this year. He served as naval aide-de-camp to the late King George V, and his last post before retirement was command of the battleship Royal Sovereign. He was decorated for service in the world war.

TATMAN GIVES REPORT AFTER LABOR PARLEY

Action taken by directors of the Oregon state federation of labor, meeting recently at Portland, was reported here Thursday by G. C. Tatman, Klamath Falls director, upon his return from the meeting.

Most important, Tatman said, was the endorsement of the proposal to repeal the Knox liquor law, which would return the sale of liquor to private retailers. The directors also went on record as opposed to the operation of pin-ball machines in the state.

Among political endorsements, the body listed candidates Walter Pierce, James Mott and Homer Angell.

A need for better traffic regulations along the lower stretches of the newly opened Willamette highway, between Goshen at the junction with the Pacific highway and Oakridge, was stressed by Tatman upon his return.

While driving over the new route, Tatman said, he barely escaped having three wrecks, caused by farmers of the district parking their autos along the narrow highway. He said residents of the section who carelessly make frequent stops along the route apparently fail to realize that the highway has been turned into one of the main arteries of the state, and that traffic has been greatly speeded up.

Tatman also suggested that an effort be made to place an adequate sign directing traffic to Klamath Falls, at the junction of the new route with the Pacific highway at Goshen.

TWO INJURED IN AUTO ACCIDENTS

Two auto accidents in which cars turned over and injured passengers were reported at the sheriff's office Thursday.
