The flower class of the garden study group, Klamath Falls Woman's Library club, will meet at 10 o'clock Monday morning in the small club-rooms of the city library.

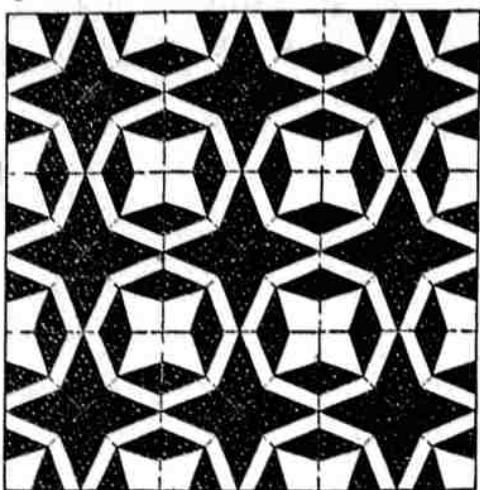
