

KUHS TO HOLD NIGHT CLASSES IN SPEAKING

An announcement was made today at the high school that due to requests on the part of townspeople a night class in public speaking will be organized. The first meeting of the class has been set for Tuesday, October 2, in the Little Theatre, located in the rear of the high school building.

Walter Eschebech of the high school faculty will have charge of the class. Mr. Eschebech is a graduate of the University of Oregon, where he majored in both undergraduate and graduate work in speech.

Tentative plans for the course indicate that it will be designed primarily for the business man and woman. Emphasis will be placed upon a study of the psychology of personality and behavior and the principle of persuading and influencing others. Some study will be made also of the principal types of speeches for various occasions.

The class procedure will center around participation by the students through practical speeches, supplemented by lectures and criticism by the instructor.

Those who are interested in this course are asked to call the high school and leave their names before Wednesday, Oct. 9. Further details will be announced at the first meeting of the class.

MISS B CHARGES H DE LA F DE LA C

HOLLYWOOD, Oct. 2 (UP)—Constance Bennett, who once offered to sue any newspaper which said she intended to divorce her Marquis, headed for Reno tonight to do exactly that.

She would have done it sooner, but she didn't think it crick-et to sue Marquis Henri de la Falaise de la Coudraye while he was fighting the Germans as an interpreter in the French army. Now that the French army is twiddling its thumbs and its interpreters have nothing to interpret, Miss Bennett said she believed the time had come to file her suit.

She bought a United Airlines ticket on the 8 p. m. plane, arriving in Reno via San Francisco a few minutes after midnight. After six weeks in Nevada she will be a free woman for the second time in her turbulent life.

The blonde Miss Bennett, who has spent as much time in court probably as any other movie star, will charge the Marquis H. de la F. C. de la C., once known in Hollywood as "Hank," with the standard cruelty allegation.

Miss B's first husband was the wealthy New Yorker, Phil Plant, whom she married in 1926 soon after she had reached stardom. She announced her retirement from the screen and said she would devote her life to her husband, her home, and her son, Peter, now 10. Four years after she married Plant, she divorced him. He gave her \$1,000,000.

About that same time Gloria Swanson, queen of the silents, divorced the Marquis Hawk. Miss Bennett married him here Nov. 22, 1931.

GERMAN MAYORS APPOINTED FOR RUMANIA CITIES

BUCHAREST, Oct. 2 (AP)—German mayors and deputy mayors will be appointed for 12 of Rumania's largest cities and towns as part of new privileges granted to Rumania's German minority of about 600,000, it was announced Tuesday.

A program to "Germanize" these cities, including Brasav, Timisoara, Arad, Sibiu, Sighisoara and Resita, will be under direction of Rima Andreas Smitt, who has been duly appointed German gauleiter (district leader) for Rumania.

At the same time it was announced that German military experts shortly will begin training the Rumanian army in the nazi technique of the use of tanks, airplanes and motorized equipment.

It was understood the plan to restore German control to certain cities includes turning over many key municipal positions to members of the German minority.

Portable Sawmill Solves Wood-Lot Owner's Problems

What the threshing machine has been to the farmer in harvesting his wheat—the modern portable sawmill promises to be to the wood-lot owner in getting out his logs. Up to the present time the small sawmill on wheels has not proved entirely satisfactory as evinced by so few of them in use. But now, after nearly 10 years of experimental work on the part of a practical small mill owner, a portable sawmill has been built which together with unique service features opens interesting possibilities, particularly in cutting home-grown timber to be used on the farm, says the U. S. Forest Products Laboratory, Madison, Wisconsin.

The mill, which is of the circular-saw type, is mounted on a two-wheeled trailer and requires only 8 minutes to take down and 15 minutes to set up. A novel feature is that the mill employs an automobile generator to charge a battery which in turn operates three self-starters for manipulating the log during sawing.

Most of the jobs handled by this mill consist in sawing 25 to 100 logs into reserve material

available for repairs and for the many minor building jobs required on the farm. Coordination in scheduling jobs usually follows the pattern of thresher outfits in that the crew tries to swing around a circuit rather than go out to individual jobs from the home base. The crew boards on the job and sleeps in a truck equipped with bunks. The farmer provides help adequate to feed logs to the sawyer and to keep slabs and lumber clear. The charge is \$8 per thousand and board feet of lumber sawed, and if less than 10 thousand feet are sawed a flat charge of \$2 is made.

The mill is an ideal tool to meet emergencies resulting from fire, wind, or flood. When fire destroyed a barn just before haying, the mill pulled out of its scheduled jobs, moved 80 miles, sawed out 22 thousand board feet of framing and rough lumber from the farmer's own logs and two weeks after the fire hay was being put into the new barn. Farm economics and woodland forestry would benefit if a few thousand instead of several such mills were available throughout the country.

Tom Foster and the bus driver are played by Ray Migliaccio and Bob Napier, and the stranger is George Schmidt.

Specialties between the acts will be provided by the Laurensen trio, piano, violin and xylophone; Keith McGilivray, ac-

cordianist, and Miralou Schultz, vocalist.

The play is presented under the auspices of the Women's Society of Christian Service and proceeds will go toward a fund to buy an organ for the church. Tickets are on sale at the Wood Drug store or may be had from members of the cast and the organization.
