

STAFF DOCTOR OF RED CROSS ARRIVES HERE

Howard Boyd, first aid chairman, Klamath County chapter, American Red Cross, announces the arrival of Dr. Frank E. Hull, staff physician of the Red Cross and national instructor for Red Cross first aid, on Monday, October 7, for one week. With headquarters in San Francisco, he comes to give a course for first aid instructors at Klamath Falls.

The course, including home and farm accident prevention, will be held at 420 Main street, Monday evening, October 7, between 7:30 and 9 o'clock. All those qualified are asked to register at headquarters. Much interest is aroused in these classes and many have already registered. The American Red Cross feels it is vital at this time to stress accident prevention, fire prevention, first aid and home hygiene for emergency preparedness.

Dr. Hull served as an officer in the U. S. Army medical corps. During the San Francisco fire he was a member of the staff of the Clara Barton hospital and later was medical officer of a British mining syndicate at Durango, Mexico. He is medical examiner for the Los Angeles YMCA and teaches swimming and handball. Dr. Hull began his first aid and accident prevention work while medical officer of the Paraffine company in Los Angeles.

Fire and accident prevention will be the subject of an address Dr. Hull will give on Tuesday afternoon at an assembly at Klamath Union high school. The service clubs of this city will hear Dr. Hull as follows: Kiwanis club, Thursday, October 10; Rotary club, Friday, October 11.

Marines Practice Landing In Catalina Maneuvers

SAN PEDRO, Calif., Oct. 3 (AP)—"The marines have landed."

The colonel smiled as he gave out the old and famous report. Standing on the shore at Johnson's bay on Santa Catalina island, Col. D. G. Oglesby had just watched a company of 80 barefoot marine reserves jump from the decks of a fleet of yachts, splash through knee-deep rollers to shore and with rifles ready "capture" a land-head as an invasion base.

"It is a highly successful operation," the commandant of the Los Angeles area reserves announced. As might be expected, there were rough spots. A couple of the "invaders" fell flat on their faces in the surf. But as the company pulled on shoes, assembled and marched off into the interior to make camp, the colonel was obviously proud of an operation never before tried on the Pacific coast.

It marked the unveiling of southern California's "mosquito fleet," a squadron of small boats which probably would be quickly pressed into service for shore patrol if the United States went to war. There are some 5000 such craft in local waters, ranging up to palatial 120-foot yachts.

The immediate operation, the colonel explained, was offensive. "Suppose," he said, "some power has seized one of the Hawaiian islands. Our job would be to get it back. Hundreds of these boats could be shipped across by transport and used by land forces for an attack. Because of their low draft and easy handling, they can approach to a few feet of shore." But the fleet's major purpose, he indicated, is defensive. "Almost all of them can mount machine guns effectively," he went on. "A majority can carry one-pound cannon, some larger. And torpedo tubes can be attached to the sides of all but the smallest. Great Britain has an immense fleet available for repelling invasion."

Los Angeles' unit of the U. S. power squadrons is the fleet's nucleus. Twenty-three of its several score members used their boats in the operation. The power squadrons is a national organization, strongest in the east and along the Great lakes but rapidly gaining members here. Only the most skillful pilots and navigators can join.

STOCKHOLM, Sweden, Oct. 3 (AP)—Two bombs dug craters in a park of Malmo, Sweden, opposite German-occupied Copenhagen, capital of Denmark, early today when Swedes said British fliers presumably sought to raid the Copenhagen area.

Bombs also dropped in Swedish territorial waters.

LOCAL MEN HEIRS OF AIRLINE PILOT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3 (AP)—Lowell V. Scroggins, pilot of an airliner that crashed near Lovettsville, Va., killing 25 persons on August 31, left an estate valued at \$37,365.

A petition for letters of administration filed in District of Columbia court by his brother, Leslie A. Scroggins, Berkeley, Calif., said the pilot left no will.

It listed these heirs: Leslie A. Carlton F. Scroggins of Lakeview, Ore.; and Claire H. Scroggins, of Klamath Falls, Ore., brothers, and a sister, Mrs. Georgia Scroggins Powell, of Richmond, Calif.

OREGON JUSTICES INCREASE FINES

SALEM, Oct. 3 (AP)—Oregon justices of the peace paid \$22,656 into the state highway fund during the first nine months of 1940, compared with \$17,135 during the same period last year, State Treasurer Walter E. Pearson said today.

The justices pay into the fund half the amount they collect in traffic fines. The increase was the result of a state police investigation which forced justices to be more strict in the collection of fines, Pearson said.

CADILLAC DISPLAYS NEW MODELS FOR '41

On the heels of its sensational announcement that Cadillac for 1941 will invade the medium price field, dealers this week put six series of new models on public display.

In addition to the lowering of base prices for 1941, the company states, all Cadillac interiors will be trimmed by the Fleetwood Custom Body division of General Motors. Lower and longer than a year ago, the 1941 series reflect a modernistic influence in design. The new Cadillacs are being shown at the Marshall Cornett company.

YAMHILL RECOUNT FAVORS OSBORNE

McMINNVILLE, Ore., Oct. 3 (UP)—A recount of ballots in the contest for state representative from Yamhill between incumbent W. R. Osborne and Peter Zimmerman Wednesday night seemed to be bearing fruit for Representative Osborne.

With 19 of 33 precincts recounted, Osborne gained two votes and Zimmerman lost four. The original total was Zimmerman, 1533; Osborne, 1520. Changes cut the 13 vote lead to seven, with recounting expected to finish Thursday.

STATIONS ROBBED

PORTLAND, Oct. 3 (AP)—Two well-dressed men slugged John D. Westron, service station attendant, early today, and rifled the till of \$37, Detective O. K. Robertson reported. About half an hour later a pair, believed the same men, robbed another station of \$11.

REGISTER ANYWHERE

SALEM, Oct. 3 (AP)—Col. Elmer V. Wooten, state director of selective service, said today that Oregon residents subject to the draft may register Oct. 16 anywhere in the United States.

LIQUOR PROFITS

SALEM, Oct. 3 (AP)—A total of \$2,455,279.93 in liquor profits were turned over to the state treasurer for public welfare and old-age assistance during the first nine months of 1940, the state liquor control board reported last night.

STATE AUTO LICENSE DRAWING HELD NEXT MONTH

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 3 (UP)—The drawing for low automobile license numbers, instituted several years ago to end bickering, will be held about Nov. 22, Secretary of State Earl Snell announced here.

License plates this year will have white numbers mounted on a green field. The numerals themselves will be of a different shape than those used in the past, more clearly legible at a distance.

EXAMINERS FAVOR CROSSING ON KANE

Petitions for a grade crossing at Kane street, formerly known as Bailey way, in Altamont, were favorably reported on Wednesday by a meeting of public utilities examiners, county court officials, and Great Northern railroad men in the courthouse.

Final approval is contingent upon action of the county court in okaying construction of aprons leading to the crossing on each side. It was believed this would be included in the budget for next year. It will be decided when the budget committee meets in December.

NEARLY IDENTICAL TITLES SEPARATED

SEATTLE, Oct. 3 (AP)—A federal court jury listened steadily to recordings of songs entitled "I Can't Keep You Out of My Mind," and "I Can't Get You Out of My Mind."

It then decided yesterday that the Decca Distributing company did not infringe upon the first song, written by Joe Tenner, former Seattle band leader, six years ago and copyrighted. He sought \$1,250,000 damages from the Decca concern and two distributors here for distributing records of the second song.

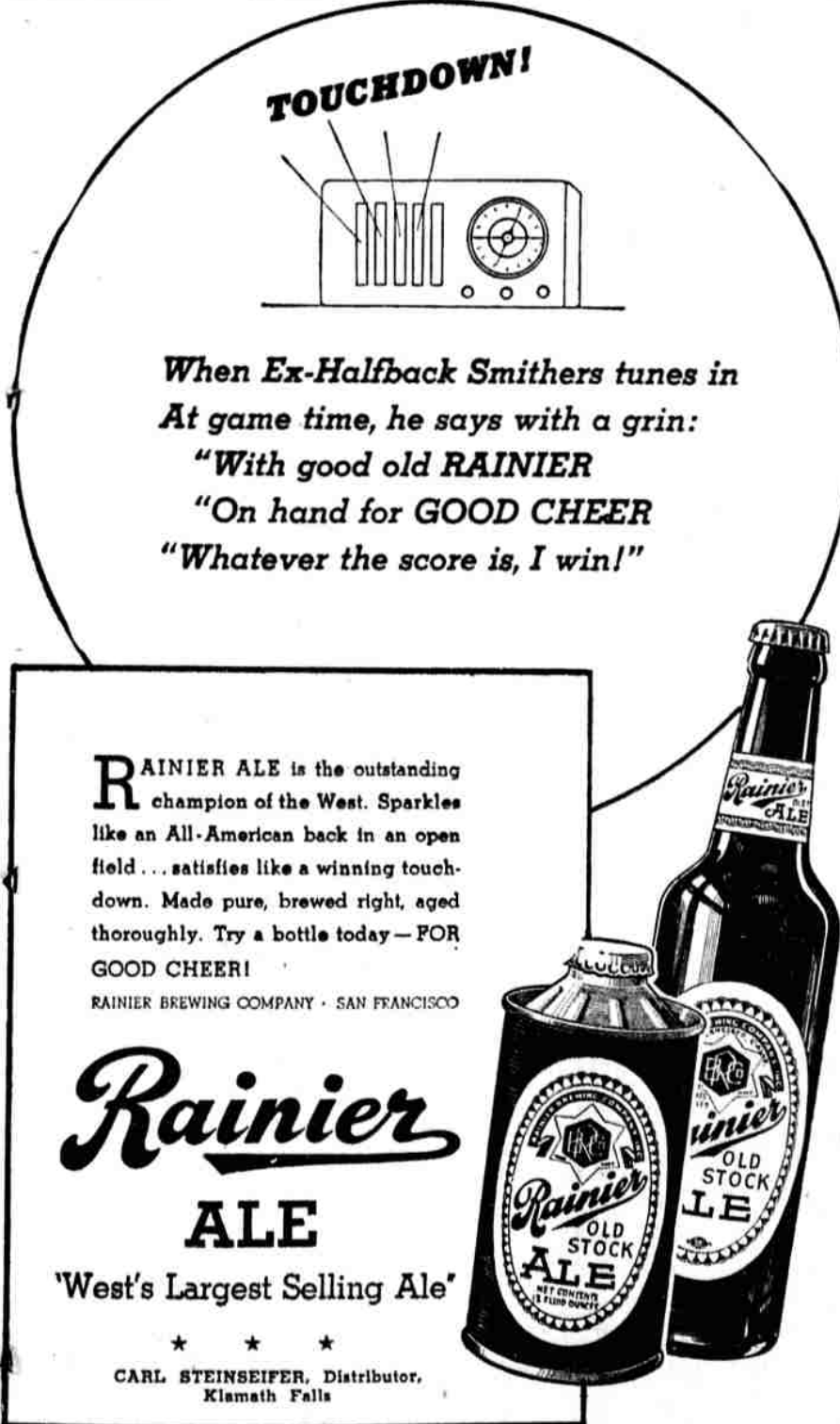
