COURSES HELD IN PREVENTION OF ACCIDENTS

"Correct the trouble at its source," is the plea issued by Howard J. Boyd, first aid and accident prevention chairman of the Klamath county Red Cross chapter. He announced that Dr. Frank E. Hull, American Red Cross first aid and accident prevention representative, is teaching a nine-hour accident prevention course from 3 o'clock to 5 o'clock each afternoon, October 7 to 12, at Red Cross headquarters.

Dr. Hull's first aid classes for instructors will be held at headquarters each evening from 7 o'clock until 9 o'clock during the week. His schedule for the week includes:

Monday—6:00 p. m. Business and Professional Women (talk); 3 p. m. and 7 p. m. Class instruction.

Tuesday—Talk at noon luncheon Lions club; 1:30 p. m. Klamath high school assembly; 3 p. m. and 7 p. m. class instruction.

Wednesday—20:30 club noon luncheon; 1:30 p. m. Klamath high school assembly; 3 p. m. and 7 p. m. class instruction.

Thursday—Kiwanis club noon luncheon; 3 p. m. and 7 p. m. class instruction.

Friday—Rotary club noon luncheon; 3 p. m. and 7 p. m. class instruction.

Boyd said that he was particularly interested in reaching large groups and urged that members of the Parent-Teachers associations, the safety council, granges, and civic clubs and other organizations take the course on home and farm accident prevention.

"More than one-third of all persons killed in this country last year were killed in home accidents, and of the more than 4,000,000 injured, 140,000 received permanent injury," Boyd said. "We feel that the causes of the accidents and the methods of prevention should be brought to the attention of the public, and we are offering this course to train leaders in safety and accident prevention work."

Whistling Carriers Comprise Big Army To Circulate News

on the streets. Gone is the baggy-trousered, newsboy wail, his oversized cap over one ear, and his eyes full of wistful yearning. The type went out with the parlor organ—perishing with the wane and hour legislation which sets forth that news vendors and carriers must be 14 years of age or over. This results in a corps of newsboys, most of them high school age, with an idea of college in the back of their heads.

There are 80 city and suburban routes which this paper's circulation department must supervise. In addition there is the mail circulation in which case Uncle Sam's boys in blue carry the paper to the country homes and residents outside the city of Klamath Falls.

Newsboys are paid according to the size of the route which they serve. The "little merchants plan" is used on the Klamath Falls papers—in other words the boys buy their papers for an average of one and three-fourths cents each. A boy with a route over which he delivers some 100 papers will average \$25 a month.

Street boys buy their papers for three cents, sell for five, and pocket the remaining two cents profit. On "fair days" the best sellers average between 35 and 40 papers a morning or evening.

On days when the news is hot, (take big war news or latest story on a kidnapping), the boys can sell 60 to 75 papers with little effort.

The circulation department must be on its toes at all times. "Extras" are few and far between, but when necessary for the news department to get out an extra paper, the circulation desk must contact each newsboy by telephone and ask the boy to report immediately. They are usually in full force within a period of 10 minutes. Where the boys are without reach of phone, "runners" are used to call them.

The Herald is usually off the press by 4 a. m., and the News at 4 a. m. The papers are on the doorstep of customers within a period of two hours after they leave the press.

MISSING CUSTOMER BAD BUSINESS

All is not gold that glitters in the newsboy's life, however. There are times when he misses a customer and as a result receives a "kick" from the circulation desk. This means a fine of 10 cents. Any number of boys take pride in the fact they never miss a customer. This is also comforting to the customer.

Circulation manager of The Herald and News is Delia McGrath. Delia sits in the front office and rules the circulation roost. Delia handles all "kicks" and "starts," sends out bills on the Herald circulation. Across the room sits Vernona Graham, assistant manager. Vernona sends all bills on the News circulation and assists with the ABC bookkeeping.

ABC means little or nothing to a person outside the newspaper or advertising field. The three letters stand for Audit Bureau of Circulation and is one of the greatest benefit to national and local advertising men. A member of ABC publishes a statement at the end of every six months showing net paid circulation. There are no complimentary copies on the books. Once a year an ABC auditor checks the books and puts the stamp of approval on the paper.

Joint circulation of The Herald and News is 9280, not including the street sales. There are more than 2000 mail subscribers, and the papers are sent over the entire United States. Vacationists often ask that their papers follow them on their travels.

IT'S A BIG PAYROLL

Into the pockets of newsboys throughout the nation go millions of dollars, quarters, nickels and pennies. The newsboy payroll on The Herald and News was no less than \$25,788.24 last year, good hard money in anybody's language. The average monthly payroll is \$2149.

Strangely enough there was but one printer in the back shop who admitted to being a newsboy in his youth. But in other fields the average was much higher. Art Bremer, Herald deskman; Wesley Guderian, news photographer; Rusty Orr, flatter; George Godard, pressman's apprentice and mailer, all started their newspaper careers peddling or delivering the papers

of either The Herald or News. "Red" Bremer, who recently finished his back-shop apprenticeship and obtained his Union card, was also a newsboy on this sheet a number of years ago.

"Mac" Epley, managing editor of The Herald and News served as a newsboy, but rather late in life. While news hawking on the Morning Register at Eugene, Epley put out an "extra" on a murder case along with Herb Lundy, now political writer on the Oregonian. Newsboys failed to materialize and Epley and Lundy went to work on the street.

In the advertising department both Deb Addison, advertising manager, and Justin "Mac" McDonald, member of the staff, had their fling at delivering. Results were not happy in either case, they admitted. Addison delivered an Oregonian route for a friend one morning, had 25 papers left over, and sold them on the street. McDonald, in a playful mood, threw a rolled paper through the web of the Eugene Register-Guard and beat the pressman to the door by two jumps. That ended McDonald's route on the Eugene paper and he remembers he had a little trouble collecting back pay.

EX-NEWSBOYS ON MAIN STREET

Along Main street there are plenty of ex-newsboys. Adjutant Norman Bowyer of the Salvation Army had a route in Austin, Ill., where he delivered the Chicago Daily News. He was just 14 years old at that time and maintains it is "good experience."

Fred E. Fleet's newspaper career started along a different line. He printed his own paper in Moline, Ill., and called it "The Weekly Goldbug." It was McKinley's campaign and the paper's battle cry went something like this as coined by the versatile Fleet:

"Hurray for McKinley, He's the man, We Can't Vote, Our Daddies Can."

Leigh Ackerman, acting police judge, was a rather former "newsie." Leigh delivered the Journal in the Mt. Scott district in Portland when that paper was in its infancy.

On the staff of the First National Bank is also a one-time newsboy, George McIntyre. Said McIntyre, "Sure I delivered papers once, but it ended in a very sad way. It was during somebody's election and they kept sending me a dozen or so extra papers to sell on my residential beat. I finally gave up."

Not one paper, but four, did R. D. "Hod" Eller, illustrious poet of Hillah temple and well known insurance man, deliver as a youngster. Eller had the Springfield, Oregon, territory for the Portland Oregonian and Journal, and the two Eugene papers, Morning Register and Guard. It kept him busy and out of mischief, he reports.

Your newsboy, an important member of The Herald and News family, calls at your home once each day, whether it be afternoon or evening. It's his job to serve you and serve you well and the carriers are just as anxious for you to get your paper on time as you are!
