First Inning Tigers
Bartell took one strike, and then lifted a high fly to Ripple. With the count one strike and two balls, McCormick struck a pop foul which Werber took in front of the boxes near third base. Ripple made a running catch of Gehringer's fly in the left field corner.

No runs, no hits, no errors, none left.

First Inning Reds
Werber waited out a three and two count, and then belted a liner against the fence in left field 325 feet from the plate, and made second before Greenberg could reach the ball.

M. McCormick laid down a sacrifice bunt on the first pitch and was thrown out, Rowe to York. Werber reaching third.

Goodman hit the first pitch on a bounce to York about 30 feet from first base and reached the bag for a single before Rowe could get there to take a throw. Werber scoring on the play.

F. McCormick waited out a count of two balls and one strike, and then shot a vicious single along the third base line, Goodman leading up at second.

John Gorsica, a right hander, started warming up in the Tiger bullpen.

Ripple sent a long foul into the right field stands, and then singled sharply to right center, scoring Goodman and sending F. McCormick to third. Rowe was replaced by Gorsica.

Wilson took one strike, popped a foul while trying to bunt, and then struck out on the third pitch.

Higgins raced to his pick-up to make an almost miraculous left-up of Joost's grounder and throw to Gehringer to force Ripple at second.

Two runs, four hits, no errors, two left.

Manager McKeechie continued the argument with Ormsby for several minutes and the crowd boomed and then Ormsby finally motioned McKeechie away. F. McCormick was charged with an error.

Murder Charges Hold Unwed Girl, Sweetheart

FRESNO, Calif., Oct. 7 (UP)—FREDERICKS were filed against a 15-year-old daughter of farm migratory worker and her 18-year-old sweetheart Saturday as investigators revealed the girl's baby had been strangled with lemon juice immediately after its birth last February.

District Attorney W. C. Tupper, who filed the charges, said the girl, Rita Emily Castanon, had admitted giving the child raw lemon juice shortly after its birth, and with the aid of her sister, burying it in a shoe-box in a chicken coop.

Paul Garnica, 18, admitted he was the father of the child, and he had suggested the means of putting it to death, Tupper said.

The two will be arraigned next Wednesday in the Riverside, Fresno county, justice court.

GOP, DEMOS SLATE RALLY EVENTS HERE

With registration closed and the date for the general election less than a month away, political forces in the county settled down for the final push Monday. Both major parties announced political rallies for this week.

Frank Van Dyke of Ashland will be the principal speaker of the evening at a republican rally scheduled for the circuit court room at the courthouse for Wednesday evening.

The committee in charge consists of R. G. Call, Frank Z. Howard, Mrs. Letha Murphy and Mrs. Christine Murdoch. They were appointed last week by Chairman William Kuykendall of the county republican central committee.

Purpose of the meeting, the committee stated, is to discuss organization of a live republican club for the county. Republicans were urged to attend and bring two other republicans with them.

Chairman Jack Henry of the democratic county central committee said that the democratic rally will take place at a banquet at the Willard hotel Saturday evening. A caravan of state democratic dignitaries, including State Chairman Charles Leach and National Committee man Howard Latourette will be on hand.

The dinner is free to all members of the county democratic central committee. Others will attend on a no-host basis.

Henry also announced that democratic headquarters had been opened on South Seventh street between Main street and Klamath avenue.

Howard Wall, president of the Willie McNary non-partisan clubs of Oregon, announced that Wendell Willie will appear on a question and answer radio program at 7:30 p. m. on the red network of the National Broadcasting company.

JAPS ESCAPING DRAFT FOR WAR

PORTLAND, Oct. 7 (AP)—Youthful Japanese-Americans in Japan are returning home to escape conscription in the Japanese army, Howard Nomura said today.

Nomura, president of the Portland chapter, Japanese American Citizens League, added that his fellow American citizens of Japanese ancestry were "willing to protect our country, America, but we're not going to go out and fight for any other country."

This statement was in reply to a recent announcement that Japanese were seeking passports to leave America in record numbers.

"I wish we could get people to keep us in a separate category from the Japanese," he added.

Passport applications largely have been made by older Japanese, Nomura declared, most of them by the 2600th anniversary of the founding of the Japanese empire, "a tourist attraction much the same as a world's fair."

EUGENE, Oct. 7 (AP)—Funeral services will be held here Tuesday for Judge E. O. Potter, 80, former member of the state legislature and Lane county judge from 1886 to 1900.

Judge Potter, the son of pioneer parents, died early Sunday. Born near Irving of pioneer parents who crossed the plains in early wagon trains.

Judge Potter graduated from the University of Oregon in 1887. He was also prominent in state and local Masonic lodge activities and was secretary of the Lane County Pioneer association.

FIERCE FIGHT RESUMES OVER SCARRED CITY

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Press association declared seven German planes were believed to have been downed in a single big battle over southwest England. It also reported an extension of the German raids to northwest England early tonight.

The intensified attacks followed London's first quiet night in a month. Newspapers played up the "big news" that residents got a good sleep.

Brilliant sunshine succeeded channel storms and clouds which grounded both British and German fliers last night.

However, the air ministry said its bomber squadrons made daylight attacks from the north coast of The Netherlands to Boulogne, France, yesterday and, much damage among shipping, docks and airfields in a steady unfolding of the "master plan" to destroy Germany's ability to make war.

Some counter-action is to be expected in the far east, too, informed sources said, indicating opening of the Burma road to Chinese war supplies may be announced soon as a result of Japan's joining Britain's enemies in an axis alliance.

Continuing preparations for a winter of war on the London front, Health Minister Malcolm MacDonald announced a plan for comprehensive removal of women and children to billets in the country.

Members of the family viewed the body and identified it as that of the young woman.

OCTOBER 12 SET AS DEADLINE FOR SIGNING AT SOCE

SOUTHERN OREGON COLLEGE OF EDUCATION, Ashland, (Special)—Students interested in enrolling in the Southern Oregon College of Education may register up to and including October 12, 1940. Students registering for the first time must furnish transcript of either high school or college record prior to registration. Individuals interested in civilian pilot training, either the preliminary phase or the restricted commercial or advanced phase ascertain the particulars involved in order that they might register on or before October 12 as the fall classes in aeronautics will begin October 15.

DEADLINES SET FOR ARMY JOBS

FORT LEWIS, Oct. 7 (AP)—Construction of more than \$7,000,000 worth of barracks and hospitals that will house conscripts and national guardsmen at three Washington and Oregon army posts must be underway by October 22, Fort Lewis officers announced today.

The work, which will employ approximately 5000 civilians at Fort Lewis, Worden and Stevens, must be completed by January 10, according to contract stipulations.

On the biggest job, construction of a 894-building cantonment near Dupont on Fort Lewis, work will be on a three-shift, 24-hour basis. The contract was let for \$4,711,000. The other contracts and their amounts: two hospitals on the Fort Lewis reservation, \$1,550,000; Fort Worden, \$382,110; Fort Stevens, \$369,000.
