

LEADERS SLIP AS ATTEMPTS AT RALLY FAIL

NEW YORK, Oct. 7.—(AP)—Stock market leaders slipped in the final hour today after early attempts at a rally brought little response. Today's turnover of around 400,000 shares was the smallest for a full session in about two weeks.

There was nothing much in the spot news either from Europe or the Far East to depress sentiment, brokers said, although fears were voiced in some quarters that a new Nazi war thrust might be in the making.

Major steel issues were uninspired by an upswing in this week's officially estimated mill operations to within 2 of a point of the high mark established last November. The latest increase of 1.8 points put production at 94.2 per cent of capacity.

Off fractions to a point or so at the worst were Bethlehem Steel, Douglas Aircraft, United Aircraft, Westinghouse, Consolidated Edison, Du Pont, Great Northern, American Smelting, Chrysler and U. S. Rubber.

Resistant were Johns-Manville, Sperry, Eastman Kodak, Loft, J. C. Penney and American Telephone.

Bonds were narrow and commodities shade uneven.

WHEAT DROPS OFF AFTER CENT GAIN

CHICAGO, Oct. 7.—(AP)—Decreasing movement of wheat to terminals and tightening of the commercial supply situation due to the loan program gave wheat prices another strong boost today but after registering gains of about a cent the market backed down, losing all the gain.

The upturn carried values to within fractions of last week's highs, which stand as the peak levels for almost four months, and this attracted renewed profit taking. Attention was called to the fact that largely because of the war U. S. exports the first two months of the current crop year amounted to less than half the volume of the corresponding period a year ago only about one-fourth exports two years ago.

Wheat closed unchanged to 1 lower compared with Saturday, December 82 1/4, May 81 1/4; corn 1 1/4 lower, December 58 1/4, May 59 1/4; oats unchanged to 1 down.

Medford, Bend, La Grande and Salem crocheted new links on their chains of victory in state high school football over the weekend and commanded greater respect from those who try to keep books on state championship possibilities.

Bend and Medford particularly gained stature. The Lava Bears, after hibernating through the first half of a tough date with Albany, scored three touchdowns in the last half and won going away, 20-7. It was the first loss for the Albany team, which had walloped Oregon City and University High.

Medford bogged down for three quarters against a heavy Grants Pass eleven but punched over two quick scores in the last 13 minutes—one on Orr's 50-yard scamper—to defeat the Cavemen, 20-6. It was Grants Pass' first loss.

Jacobs Trounced For Coast Title

BERKELEY, Calif., Oct. 7 (AP)—Bobby Riggs provided the expected finish to the Pacific coast tennis tournament by capturing the men's single title, but Virginia Wolfenden, attractive San Franciscan, produced the biggest upset when she trounced top-seeded Helen Jacobs in the women's final.

Riggs, the confident Chicagoan, downed Frank Kovacs of Oakland 6-4, 2-6, 6-2, 6-2 Sunday.

A short time before Miss Wolfenden disposed of the veteran Miss Jacobs, former national and Wimbledon champion, 6-4, 6-2. The national men's double title holders, Ted Schroeder and Jack Kramer of Los Angeles, took the coast championship from Kovacs and Ed Amark of San Francisco, 8-6, 6-2, 4-6, 2-6, 6-4.

Mary Hardwick of England and Margaret Osborne of San Francisco, won the women's doubles by defeating Gracy Wheeler and Jacques Nelson, both Los Angeles, 6-4, 6-4.

Salem, gathering momentum after last week's 19-0 conquest of Tillamook, ran over Oregon City, 39-7.

Klamath Falls, another potent southern Oregon eleven, went out of high school circles to try its hand against the Lassen, Calif., Junior college and got an 18-7 defeat for its trouble.

Astoria, irked by last week's 7-6 loss to The Dalles, took it out on Rainier, 62-0, Friday. Milwaukie, last year's No-Name league sensation, traded touchdowns with St. Helens, 13-13. Eugene, bowled by Klamath Falls, 32-0, a week ago had its head high again after walloping McMinnville, 26-0.

University High of Eugene and Redmond stayed sociable, 13-13. Hill Military, previously beaten three times by astronomical scores, practically considered Friday's 20-0 loss to Princeton a moral victory. Pendleton won its second Blue Mountain league game, 13-2, from Baker. In the same circuit Milton-Freewater downed Union, 24-0. Corvallis received balm from last week's thrashing by Medford, defeating Tillamook, 12-7.
