NEW YORK, Oct. 8 (AP)—The going was a bit rough for the stock market today and leaders were shaken down fractions to a point or so. A few inactivities were off more.

The list kept its footing fairly well in the forenoon when price changes were negligible in either direction. Offerings picked up after mid-day, although selling never really was urgent.

Transfers were around 800,000 shares. While business news at home still was an argument against liquidation, brokers said, renewed tension in foreign affairs caused some traders to stand aside.

General motors stock failed to respond to the company's sales compilation showing distribution of cars and trucks to consumers in this country during September to 97,527 units against 56,789 in the like 1939 month.

Without much support were Chrysler, Sears Roebuck, J. I. Case, United Aircraft, Bethlehem, U. S. Steel, Sperry, Westinghouse, Union Carbide, Allied Chemical, U. S. Gypsum, Johns-Manville, American Smelting, Du Pont and Texas corp.

CHICAGO, Oct. 7 (AP)—Grain futures slithered around aimlessly throughout most of the session today with final prices minor fractions below Monday's closing levels.

Commission houses absorbed most orders easily and there was some buying of July wheat here that was believed to be against sales of May at Kansas City.

The trade generally seemed inclined to sell after the stock market showed signs of easiness.

Final prices for wheat were 4-5 cents lower than yesterday's close, December 82 1/2-82c, May 81 1/2-81c; corn was unchanged to 1c lower, December 58 1/2c; May 58c; and oats were unchanged to 1c higher.

COAST LUMBER IN PERIOD OF READJUSTMENT

SEATTLE, Oct. 8 (UP)—West coast lumber markets have passed into a period of readjustment after meeting emergency requirements of the national defense program, the West Coast Lumbermen's association announced Monday.

Weekly averages in September returned to 143,278,000 board feet following a peak production in August of 151,137,000 board feet.

The decrease, according to the association, "principally reflects the return to the orderly course of west coast business that began in mid-September."

"For the first time in many weeks, productions and orders have approached a balance. In the light of the current outlook, it is probable that the peak of the rise stimulated by the defense program was reached in late August and early September."

The industry's unfilled orders stood at 646,585,000 board feet at the end of September. Cumulative production in the first 39 weeks of 1940 reached 5,293,268,000 board feet, compared to 4,732,839,000 last year and 3,777,988,000 board feet in 1938.

PLANE AUGMENTS GAME ENFORCERS

A special flying squad of law enforcement officers in plain clothes and an airplane to spot violators are being used to augment the regular force of state police during the present hunting season.

The men who have been selected from the field personnel of the Oregon State Game Commission are working directly under Frank B. Wire, state game supervisor, and will be shifted throughout the state, perhaps working one week in one section and the next in another.

The airplane will carry an officer in addition to the pilot who will be equipped with a two-way radio set.

If poachers shooting pheasants are spotted, the officer in the plane will communicate location of such violators to officers in automobiles on the road.

"The aim of the game commission is to prevent law violations," said Wire. "More effective patrol work can be done, we believe, through officers working in plain clothes this year, too."
