

BRITAIN WILL REOPEN BURMA LINK TO CHINA

(Continued from Page One)

renewal of a 10-year lease on the disputed island, but the Japanese-controlled Nanking regime declared the lease terminated. Amid these ominous developments in the far east, German warplanes in great numbers unleashed one of the most furious daylight assaults of the war on London.

Striking back in retaliation for the severest aerial bombardment Berlin has undergone—a 4-hour, 42-minute attack by RAF bombers—the Nazi raiders caught London during the morning rush hours and dropped screaming salvos of bombs as crowds dashed for cover.

The toll of dead and wounded was apparently high.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8 (AP)—The government today advised American citizens in the far east, especially women and children, to consider the advisability of returning to the United States because of disturbed conditions in that area.

State department officials said that American consuls in Japan, China and other parts of the orient had been notified to suggest to American citizens the advisability of utilizing transportation facilities now available.

This was described as a continuation of the precautionary policy of the government regarding safety of American citizens in various parts of the world.

The state department's warning to citizens was issued almost simultaneously with Prime Minister Winston Churchill's announcement to parliament in London that the Burma road, overland supply route to beleaguered China, would be reopened October 17—nine days hence.

SHANGHAI, Oct. 8 (AP)—The Japanese navy was reported today to have landed forces on Liu Kung island off Shantung peninsula, on which the Chinese government of Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek recently granted Britain renewal of a 10-year lease.

The landing apparently was designed to enforce the stand of the Japanese-dominated Chinese regime at Nanking, which regards the lease as no longer operative.

Travelers from Weihaiwei on the northern shore of Shantung peninsula said the Japanese posted proclamations announcing they were taking over the island.

BOMBING HEAVIER FOR ALL BRITAIN

BERLIN, Oct. 8 (AP)—German bomber squadrons dropping on London without a break since 8 a. m. (2 a. m. EST) have bombed heavily the northwest warehouse district on the Thames river and hit important supply dock facilities, DNB, German news agency, reported today.

(This dispatch was sent from Berlin at 8:40 p. m. (1:40 p. m. EST).)

DNB said a large London gas works was the target of a heavy attack and three immense fires were observed there.

The "cyclone attack" also rolled along the southeast coast of Britain during the day, DNB said.

Nazi party... operated by little pigmy Hitler. He added the "pigmy" to his prepared text.

"This is the Issue"

In that address Willkie linked Flynn, whom he called "boss of the Bronx," with Mayor Frank Hague of Jersey City and "the commissioner of sewers" in Chicago as "pillars of the new deal democracy."

To the applause and cheers of a crowd in the Newark stadium estimated by police at 32,000, he shouted:

"This is the issue that we republicans have with the new deal. The new deal relies on political bosses. The republican party relies on the people."

"We are ranged in battle against threatening forces. We are fighting against the forces of federal spending, federal patronage, corrupt city machines, and smear propaganda."

The president, Willkie asserted, "not only has pushed America close to the war in Europe and Asia," now seeks "to drag the wars of Europe and Asia into American politics."

"He tells us that he, and he alone, represents democracy," the candidate continued. "But I say that he cannot represent the democracy that I stand for while he seeks to perpetuate his power through party Hitler in our own land."

"That is democracy already on the way to dictatorship."

4. Age in years (as of your last birthday).
5. Place of birth (city or town, county, state, country).
6. Country of citizenship.
7. Name of person who will always know your address.
8. Relationship of that person.
9. Address of that person.
10. Employer's name. (If in business, answer "self").
11. Place of employment or business.

After a man has been registered, he will receive a registration certificate which he should carry with him at all times.
