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For Voter Consideration

THE fact that Wendell Willkie has served well the corporation he has headed and the clients he has represented as a practicing attorney is a strong argument in his favor as a candidate for the presidency. Mr. Willkie climbed the ladder of success through determined, loyal effort, and there is every reason to believe that he would give the same efficient service to the government and the people of the United States if they repose responsibility in him.

There grew up a few years ago a prejudice against success. Its effect was apparent in the elections of those years, and the result was to fill many public offices with men who had been unsuccessful in their private enterprises. In many cases—too many, for the public good—they carried their record of failure into the public business. It was natural that this should happen, for there is no reason to suppose that a man who can't do an efficient job in private enterprise is going to be transformed into a howling success when given public office.

Mr. Willkie is a successful man, but success has not gone to his head nor made him bigoted. He is imbued with patriotic loyalty and a sense of public service and social values. Given the opportunity to use his talents in the office of the presidency, we believe he would discharge his responsibilities to the benefit of the government, and therefore of the people of the United States. To the thoughtful (rather than the prejudiced), this is a sound reason for consideration of Mr. Willkie's candidacy for the presidency of the United States.

Potato Shipments

BEGINNING with today's issue, this newspaper renews its publication of a potato table showing carload shipments from the Klamath basin. These statistics, to be published daily hereafter through the shipping season, show shipments for the previous day, for the month and season to date, and corresponding figures for last year. Published also in this newspaper are daily reports from market centers indicating supply and demand and sales prices.

This market service began many years ago. For some years, we published a "potatogram" from the United States department of agriculture. About four years ago, when a problem of disposing of a surplus of potatoes here developed, the potato table showing shipments from this basin was worked out for the purpose of informing growers. This table proved so popular that we have continued it through the succeeding shipping seasons.

Potato tables of the past seasons have been a source of much news interest, not only for potato growers, but for all persons interested in agricultural activity in the basin. They have shown, for one thing, the remarkable orderliness and consistency with which Klamath's potato crop is marketed, despite the fact our potato industry continues on a strictly individualistic basis.

DORRIS TEACHER STARTS NEW CLASS

DORRIS—A new enterprise has been started in Dorris and is becoming a success although only in its second week. This is a private kindergarten or nursery school started by Mrs. Claude Milligan. It is held from 1:30 till 4 every afternoon except on Saturday and already eight children have been enrolled.

Mrs. Milligan when Miss Helen Turner taught the first grade of the Dorris Grammar school. In her private school she teaches the youngsters of preschool age how to do four or five kinds of handwork such as painting and coloring with crayons, clay modeling and fashioning things of paper. The main idea of the school is to teach the youngsters to work with their hands and to play together harmoniously.

NEWS BEHIND THE NEWS

WASHINGTON, October 10—You may never see them—and especially the Japanese will not see them—but steps are being taken to strengthen our weak Pacific outposts, the Philippines and Guam.

Funds which can be used to make the Philippines slightly more formidable have been tucked into recent appropriation bills passed by congress in such a way that their purpose will not be noticed.

The navy admirals simultaneously have gone after the White House for a straight large open appropriation to fortify Guam.

TO IMPRESS JAPAN

These are coming steps designed to impress Japan with the seriousness of the position she has assumed in the axis, but there may be others first. Extension of the embargo against shipment of copper has been considered. An investigation of the domestic effects of embargoing cotton and baring silk imports is being conducted.

None of these individual steps would be grave, taken singly, but in progression they would advance nearly the whole distance toward the grave result forecast when Navy Secretary Knox called out the naval reserve.

TILTED NOSE

This government has silently tilted its nose at the British offer to let us use Singapore naval base. It is not because our navy likes the British less. It merely likes the Singapore base less.

The naval board of strategy is in full agreement that Singapore is "too far up the creek" for efficient use by American vessels. Its position is too far around from the prospective fighting area in the China Sea to make its full use desirable. The admirals would rather have small storage bases at Mindanao, the southernmost Philippine island, or in British New Guinea. From such storehouses American vessels could operate northward on a shorter line to the scene of probable operations.

The White House has been definitely advised not to take up the British suggestion.

KNUDSEN THREATENS

William Knudsen, national defense commissioner, has privately threatened to resign his post if the Hillman-Jackson quarantine law is imposed on the defense program.

Knudsen went to see Mr. Roosevelt at the White House last Friday. No news of their visit got out. What was said was kept private apparently by both parties involved. But the conversations which both Knudsen and Commissioner Stettinius, the two top business men pushing defense, have held among their associates have left no doubt of what transpired. Both men were deeply upset by the development.

Their positions of responsibility for producing defense would become untenable if the largest and most efficient industries are barred from defense production for political-labor reasons of any sort.

NO CREDIT NEED

The propaganda drive to foster American credits for Britain will have a hard time getting beyond a little-noticed routine commerce department report on the present British financial position in this country.

This report disclosed the United Kingdom reduced its cash bank balances in the United States.

STATE HOME GUARD PLANS NEAR READY

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 10 (UP)—Plans for a home guard in Oregon were being completed here this week.

Oregon, as well as many sister states, is technically in no position to enforce the law or protect life and property in extreme emergencies since the mobilization of the national guard.

Gov. Charles A. Sprague has pointed out there is no absolute certainty that Oregon will be immune to social catastrophes and emergencies in ordinary times, and has proposed a home guard force.

The organization of the guard would be composed of World War veterans. It is expected that within the next few weeks plans and organization of the home guard will be made.
