

CAA TO MATCH SCHOLARSHIPS FOR AIR WORK

An arrangement whereby the government will add one CAA flight training scholarship to each one locally sponsored and paid for was announced Thursday by the Klamath chamber of commerce.

The present Civil Aeronautics Authority program includes 10 scholarships for the Klamath area. Approximately 40 students are now engaged in ground school work of which the ten highest in the class will be granted flight training. Ground school will end November 1.

According to a letter from Grover Webster, acting director of the Civil Pilot training program, the CAA will match each locally sponsored scholarship. The cost has been set at \$325 for the air instruction, \$10 for ground school work and \$6 for the physical examination, a total of \$341.

The locally sponsored scholarship must be granted to a student already engaged in ground school work.

WAR DEPARTMENT WILL BUY HORSES

The county agent's office is in receipt of a letter from the war department indicating that they will purchase horses for the army in the very near future. Major F. W. Keater, Quartermaster Corps, Western Remount area, San Mateo, Calif., in this letter, dated October 8, states as follows:

"Congress has authorized the purchase of approximately 20,000 horses to meet the expanded needs of our army incident to conscription. Of this number, approximately 1700 horses are expected to be purchased by December 20, 1940, within the Western Remount area, which comprises the states of Washington, Oregon, Nevada and California. Of this total expected to be purchased within the Western Remount area, the vast majority will be riding horses, only a very few being draft horses. "The rapid purchase of 20,000

Hamburger Handy for Home Buffet Supper Gathering

Hamburger can be sweet music at a party. Johnny Green, popular composer-maestro, gives a home buffet supper every other Thursday and cooks for the crowd. The boys from his orchestra report Johnny's hamburger compositions harmonize easily with a man's appetite. Here are three of Johnny's popular numbers on the kitchen stove.

Hamburger Hash
(Serves 4)
Three cups cube raw pota-

toes, 1 cup chopped raw carrots, 2 small onions, chopped, 1 tablespoon minced parsley, 1 pound ground round steak, 1 cup milk, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon black pepper, 1 cup buttered bread crumbs. Mix all ingredients (except crumbs). Place in buttered baking dish. Sprinkle with bread crumbs in slow oven (325° F.) for one or more hours.

Hamburger Dumpling Stew
(Serves 4)
One and one-half pounds ground round steak, 1 cup corn flakes, 1 teaspoon salt, pepper to taste, 1 teaspoon grated onion, 1 egg, 1 cup boiling water or clear soup stock, 2 cups stock for cooking. Mix ingredients thoroughly and shape into small balls. Fry in large sautépan with cover in bacon fat or butter until well browned on all sides. Add 2

cup soup stock or boiling water. Simmer for 1 hour. Make dumpling mixture. Drop a spoonful of mixture on top of each ball. Cover sautépan securely and cook for 10 minutes. Serve at once with cooked vegetables.

Dumplings: Sift together 2 cups flour, 1 teaspoon salt and 3 teaspoons baking powder. Mix in enough milk to make soft dough.

Baked Meat Balls
One pound ground round steak, 4 small potatoes, 1 small onion, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon black pepper. Run potatoes and onions through food chopper. Add to ground steak, season and knead into ball about 2 inches in diameter. Drop into 2 quarts of rapidly boiling salted water and cook 20 to 40 minutes.

YOUR ARMY
A Series Describing the Arms and Services of the Regular Army

ENGINEERS
The modern army is like this modern world—helpless without its engineers. The vital functions of the army engineers, closely allied with the functions of other branches of service, give this branch an importance and a diversity of interests which makes it especially appealing to ambitious young men.

Army engineers do things—interesting things. They build roads and bridges. They build railroads and other things essential to the functioning of the army, in war or peace.

Because of the many technical duties of the corps of engineers, the opportunity for study and advancement is especially bright in this branch of service. Approximately three out of every seven soldiers in the corps of engineers hold ranks higher than that of private. In addition, there is a large number of spe-

cialist ratings assigned to the engineers. Half of these ratings, with the extra compensation, are held by privates. These specialist ratings include blacksmiths, buglers, carpenters, chauffeurs, clerks, cobblers, cooks, demolition men (who handle high explosives for blowing up enemy wire entanglements, bridges, etc.), draftsmen, electricians, horseshoers, general mechanics, motorcyclists, riggers, saddlers, wagoners, and others.

Other specialist ratings include bandmen, stationary engineers, instrument repairmen, lithographers, mimeograph operators, telephone switchboard operators, photographers, power linemen, painters, sign painters, storekeepers, recorders, rodmen and structural iron workers.

Surveying and mapping are among the interesting and important functions of the corps of engineers. Enlisted specialists in the corps of engineers are trained at the engineer school at Fort Belvoir, Virginia, and schools of other branches are also open to army engineers.
