

HIGHWAY MEN PREPARED TO BATTLE SNOW

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means anything. All equipment, including snow removal plows, are ready to go, earlier than at any time since equipment was placed in this territory due to the number of new pieces delegated to this district.

N. H. Jones, superintendent of the shops, stated Tuesday the four large rotary plows, or "sno-goes" are in readiness for use on highways and one new sno-go will be stationed on the Willamette pass to keep that stretch open through the winter. The highway will remain clear unless an exceptionally heavy storm blocks the pass.

Several new blades, or snow plows for trucks, and three new V-type plows have been ordered for this part of Oregon and are expected to arrive from Portland within several days.

The department will also receive several new four-wheel drive trucks for snow removal work, it was learned.

There has been no need to bring out the equipment thus far, Jones stated, although a light fall on Sun mountain a week or two ago was reported. The fall rapidly melted and no need to take a plow to that section was felt.

CROSSING ORDERED FOR KANE STREET

The public utilities commissioner's office has issued an order authorizing a public grade crossing over the Oregon, California and Eastern railway on Kane street, in the southeast suburbs.

A copy of the order was received Tuesday by the county court, and may be seen by interested citizens at the court room, County Judge U. E. Reeder said.

The order provides that the railroad company will put in the planking and signs on the right-of-way, the county to be billed for the planking. The county will maintain the crossing and the railroad company will maintain the signs.

Judge Reeder said that work on the crossing will be done as soon as possible.

'RIP VAN WINKLE' RE-ENTERS LIFE FROM BEHIND BARS

PORTLAND, Oct. 16 (P)—Feeling like a modern Rip Van Winkle, Clarence Johnson, 52, said here Tuesday he was trying to prepare himself to reenter life in "a changed world."

Johnson served 21 years of a life sentence in the Oregon State penitentiary on a murder conviction.

On his release last summer he was returned to San Quentin prison, Calif., to serve 18 months of a previous sentence but was released two months later.

SETTLEMENT ENDS KESTERSON SUIT

Settlement out of court ended the case of Louis O. Gueringer against the Kesterson Lumber corporation.

The case was brought by Gueringer on grounds that he had been injured while working in the woods for the defendant and had suffered permanent partial disability. He asked for a total of \$12,593. No indication of the terms of settlement were given in the court records.

Circuit Judge Arthur D. Hay had been assigned to the case.

"Well," said Mayor Richmond, "we let the democrats put one up. I guess we'd better let the republicans!"

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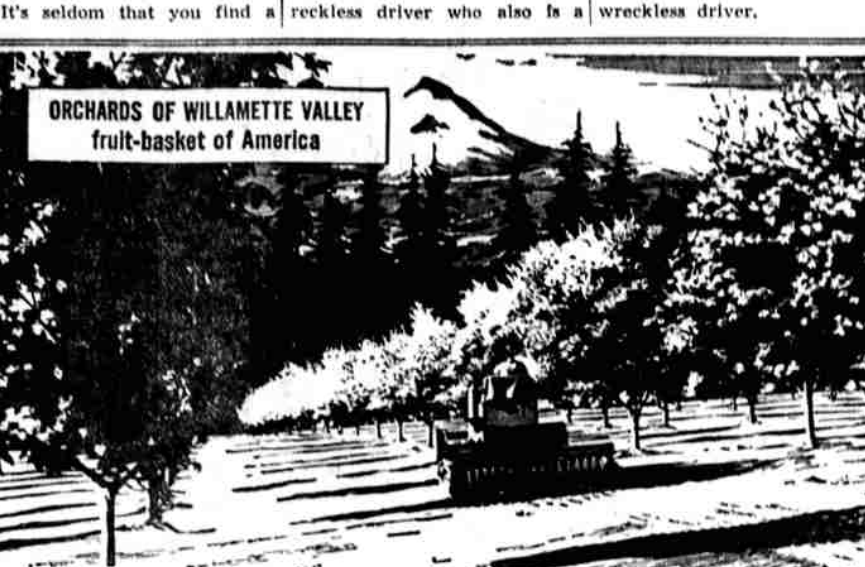
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
