STEEL LEADS ADVANCE FOR STOCK MARKET

NEW YORK, Oct. 16 (AP)—Under the firm leadership of steel shares, the stock market scored a general, although fractional, advance today.

An undercurrent of confidence, based largely on industrial expansion, overruled profit-taking sorties throughout the session.

At the close, about 650,000 shares had been traded, making the session the liveliest in two weeks.

Although no real developments in the war were apparent, traders managed to derive some optimism from the German-Russian imbroglio.

Affecting market sentiment was an extremely busy day in Worth street, where it was estimated that 25,000,000 yards of cotton gray goods were purchased and prices advanced. Also of market interest was an advance of 1 cent a pound in the price of lead.

Among the rising shares were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Republic, Youngstown, Crucible, U. S. Rubber, Harvester, Douglas, Sperry, Westinghouse, Union Carbide, Eastman, U. S. Gypsum, Cerro de Pasco and Loft.

Bonds moved a bit higher.

WHEAT CONTINUES TO FORGE AHEAD

CHICAGO, Oct. 16 (AP)—Wheat futures continued to forge ahead into new high ground for the season today with the May delivery reaching 84 1/2c and July up to 79 3/4c. The nearby contract advanced to the best levels for the current movement at 85 1/2c. Final prices were at or near a shade under the day's best levels.

Traders said the advance was due to the scarcity of offerings of "free" wheat due to the large volume of grain being pledged under the government loan pro-

gram. Strength in securities also was a contributing factor.

May and July oats and December and May soybeans also established new seasonal peaks. Wheat closed 1/4 cent higher than yesterday's final quotations. December 85 1/2c; May 84 1/2c; corn was 1/4c up, December 59 1/2c; May 60 1/2c; and oats were 1/4 cent higher, December 33 1/2c, May 33 1/2c.

Soy beans jumped 21-2 1/2 cents, October 81 1/2c; December 82 1/2c.

WOOL MARKET

BOSTON, Oct. 16 (AP-USA)—Prices were very firm today on fine and half-blood territory wools in Boston. Good French combing lengths, fine territory wool, with a fair amount of staple combing, brought \$1.02-1.05, scoured basis, for graded and original lines. French combing half blood was sold at around \$1, scoured basis. Prices at the wool auction in Boston on Tuesday on western brown wools stored in the west were close to the current prices on spot wools in Boston. Prices on graded wools, delivered Boston, were around 97c to \$1.03, scoured basis, for combing wools running bulk average to short French, 92-97 cents, scoured basis, for half blood average combing, mostly 83-88 cents, scoured basis, for three-eighths blood and 78-81 cents, scoured basis for quarter blood. Original bag fine bulk average to short French brought mostly 95c-\$1 scoured basis.
