

WORKERS MAY GET SECURITY FIGURES

Wage earners whose jobs are covered by the federal social security act may now obtain a statement of wages credited to their accounts since the law became effective on January 1, 1937, Wesley Hayes, Klamath Falls manager of the social security board, announced today.

Hayes said that if employees would request a statement of wages credited to their accounts each year, it would help eliminate any errors in reports filed with the social security board.

A postcard form for requesting this information can be obtained at the board's Klamath Falls office at 921 Main street. "The revised social security act now provides monthly insurance payments to the widow and young children of a worker who dies," Hayes said, "and I believe many workers will want to have a report on their social security accounts for the information of their families."

Monthly insurance payments to insured workers at age 65 and to the families of deceased workers are based on the worker's average monthly wage at jobs covered by the social security act.

Employers are required to file a quarterly report showing the name of each employee, his social security account number and wages earned by the employee in the previous three months.

SALEM, Oct. 16 — Klamath Falls, Eugene and Hood River divided honors in the weekly

job placing reports filed with State Director L. C. Stroll.

Klamath Falls led 22 offices in fulltime private industry jobs with 123, Eugene led in temporary placements with private firms with 123 and Hood River placed the most in seasonal farm work with 527, mostly apple pickers.

During the week 474 workers

were placed in regular jobs, 544 in temporary work and 1286 in seasonal harvesting. New claims for unemployment insurance totaled 617, while 4985 filed continued claims for benefits.
