HISTORICAL PLAQUE USED BY WCTU HERE

A southern Oregon pioneer who became known as "the dean of craftwomen in America" was remembered at the WCTU convention here this week.

She was Ann Hill Russell who in 1895 carved out of marble the white ribbon emblem used in the memorial service here, a duplicate of the bow she sculptured for the Francis Willard cottage in Evanston, Ill., hub of the WCTU organization.

The emblem, a white bow of marble sent to Mrs. Russell as a gift from Vermont's famous quarries, was carried to the altar in a procession of 12 girls clad in white and carrying white candles at the opening of the convention memorial ceremony. Across the bow is engraved the motto of the WCTU, "For God and Home and Every Land."

Mrs. Russell who traveled the Oregon Trail in 1852 and was the first president of the Ashland WCTU in 1884, was the wife of James H. Russell who sent Oregon's contribution of a native stone for the Washington monument, a block of marble from the Oregon Caves area.

Mrs. Russell was the mother of 11 children and was still active in the field of sculpture when she died at the age of 92 in Ashland in 1930. Her daughter, Mable Russell Lowther, who brought the white bow to Klamath Falls, is an artist in her own right and her huge painting of Crater Lake is hung in the Lithia hotel at Ashland.

Mrs. Lowther remarked that her mother had written a history of Oregon which has not been published.

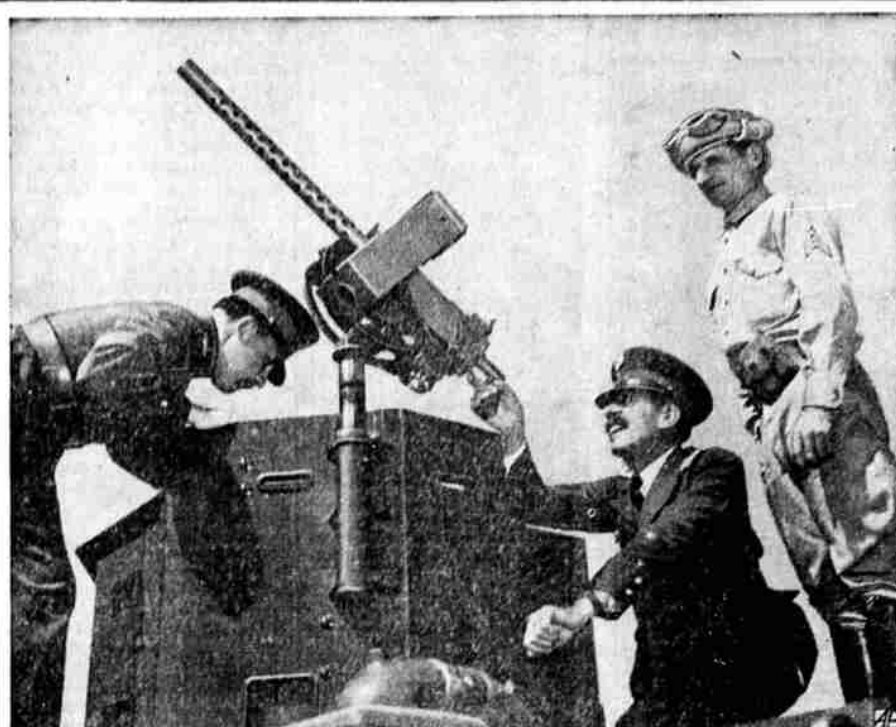

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PRITCHETT SOON TO ENTER, REPORT

Harold J. Pritchett, international president of the IWA now being detained by immigration authorities in Canada, will soon be allowed to enter the United States and take out application papers for American citizenship, it was stated here Friday by L. H. Fenton, international IWA representative.

Fenton returned to Klamath Falls Thursday after several weeks' absence during which he attended the IWA convention at Aberdeen, Wash., and went into Canada for a visit with Pritchett.

"Pritchett possesses a five-year passport granted by the Canadian government," Fenton said, "and he is being detained only because of objections by American immigration authorities. Grounds for these objections include, first, that Pritchett's legal residence cannot be established because he has been in and out of the United States so often, and second, that he may become a public charge. The latter objection is ridiculous."

Fenton intended to make a trip east on pleasure and business, but was unable to do so because of labor matters which kept him in eastern Oregon and the state of Washington. He will probably make the eastern trip in the near future and expects to stop long enough in the midwest to pick up a large sum of money which he recently inherited from relatives.

Good progress was made on IWA organizational plans at the Aberdeen convention, Fenton said, and the membership drive will be continued after the current campaign's closure in January, 1941.

Delegates from the Klamath basin district reported larger gains than any other district in the international organization, Fenton said. The Klamath district now includes five signed contracts. Most of the membership increase has been in northern California.

Fenton said that the convention delegates passed with only a few dissenting votes the resolution condemning action of the communist party, and demanding that communists "cease interference with the IWA."

He said that Harry Bridges, longshoreman president and west coast CIO leader, gave a "splendid talk," but did not address the convention until all controversial matters had been cleared away.

SLOVAKS REPORT ROOSEVELT BACKS CAUSE IN EUROPE

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18 (AP)—The chairman of a delegation of Americans of Slovak descent said after a White House call today that President Roosevelt had told them that "independence would have to be restored" to "all these little (European) countries that have been absorbed."

Dr. Peter P. Hietka of Chicago, the chairman, made it clear the delegation thought the government was deeply interested in seeing to it that the independence of Czechoslovakia and other small European nations which fell before the nazis would be returned.
