

# CAIRO REPORT OF ULTIMATUM WINS DENIALS

If of Greece, resignation of Premier-dictator John Metaxas, and formation of a pro axis government.

BERLIN, Oct. 19 (AP) — Informed sources categorically denied today that any ultimatum-like demands had been made upon Greece as reported from Cairo.

These sources declared, however, that if Greek diplomats had inquired in Berlin or Rome concerning the axis attitude toward Greece they were frankly assured that so long as Greece has a British guarantee she must be considered a friend of Britain.

ROME, Oct. 19 (AP) — German and Italian demands on Greece and Turkey to bring their governmental policies in line with the axis were indicated as imminent today by Relazioni Internationali, often authoritative fascist weekly.

"Italian influence on the Balkans and Mediterranean countries... is destined to have future developments," the paper said. "This influence, in relation to war necessities, is henceforth not to be restrained."

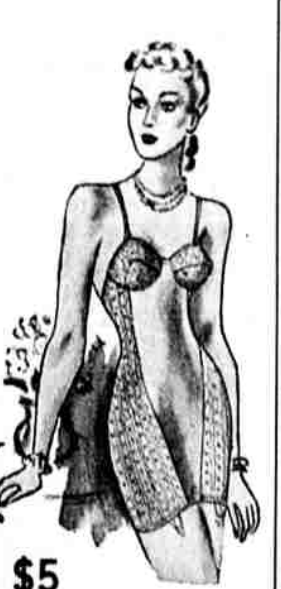

anything about the Harkness brothers or ever heard of the jail break at Port Orchard, Kitsap county, Wash. They continued their denials when confronted with the detective magazine description that answered that of Jackson in every detail—except that Jackson, the potato picker, had a Van Dyke beard while the picture showed Harkness as clean-shaven.

**Key Found**

But the officers believed they had two "hot" prisoners. They went through the effects of Jackson and Davis. It was then that they found the hidden jail key that added to their determination to hold the men until they received further information on the case from Sheriff Blankenship of Port Orchard, to whom they wired immediately.

The key had been fitted into a hole gouged out in the brown oxford heel. The inner sole, which had been lifted to secrete the key, was then placed back in the shoe, completely covering the hiding place.

According to Deputy Sheriff Francy, the men had evidently hoped that they could take the key back into jail with them, if ever captured, and would have it handy for another escape.

**Admit Identity**

On Saturday, pictures and further information arrived from Port Orchard. The two prisoners were confronted again with the evidence against them, and, according to Francy, admitted their identity and waived extradition.

Francy said that criminal records showed both men had been convicted several times on charges of narcotics possession, gambling, and burglary. Convicted as habitual criminals, they were sentenced to life imprisonment shortly before they escaped from the Kitsap county jail.

The detective magazine indicated that rewards have been offered for the arrest of the Harkness brothers. Francy said that if rewards are given, they will go to the individual who reported the presence of the fugitives at Merrill.

McNary of Oregon, the vice presidential nominee.

Johnson spoke over the radio in Washington, and he was followed on the air by his democratic colleague, Sheridan Downey, who, speaking from Los Angeles, urged Mr. Roosevelt's reelection because of his "idealism."

**Important Issue**

Johnson said that "upon all matters I do not agree with Messrs. Willkie and McNary, but they are eternally right upon the great issue, and the all-important one, of a third term." Stating his view of "what is certain to happen if a president sees fit to destroy this great tradition and custom," Johnson declared:

"If he sees fit to increase his term four years, he can increase it eight, or 16, and finally, as Jefferson once remarked, the whole presidential office becomes but an inheritance."

**Downey Answers**

Downey said there evidently was "no anti-third term sentiment here in California," because, he said, Johnson had been elected to the senate for four terms and "it is apparent his people will soon honor him for a fifth time."

Johnson, 74, has served in the senate since 1917 and has obtained the nominations for another term of the democratic and progressive parties, as well as the republican.

### Offices to Open

Monday both boards will open offices in the basement of the county courthouse for the duration of the selective service program.

Following the drawing of the first three serial numbers for each board, which got the work of designating each registration card with a serial number off to a start, the boards began sorting out cards signed by residents of other sections of the country.

Only cards filled out by residents of Klamath county will be kept here. All others will be mailed back to the home counties of the registrants, whether those counties be in Oregon or in other states. At the same time, the Klamath boards will receive through the mails cards signed by Klamath county residents who happened to be in other counties or other states on registration day. This work will require about two weeks.

### Children Draw

At the same time, the work of giving each local card a serial number will continue.

This process was started by a drawing in which two children, Leroy and Karen Porter, son and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Porter, picked at random three names for each of the two local boards.

Oddly enough, the first card drawn by Leroy Porter for Board No. 2 happened to bear the name Glenn W. Dehlinger, route 2, box 671 Klamath Falls. He is the son of one of the members of Board No. 2, S. P. Dehlinger of Henley.

Serial number 2 for the second board is James Plozman, Sprague River, and serial number 3 is John Thomas Huffman, Beatty.

For board No. 1, serial number 1 is Bruce Hunt Heuston, 2138 Vine street; number 2 is Leonard Thure Linden, 410 South Fifth street; and number 3 is Alger Waldo Nelson, 2346 Radcliffe street.

These persons will not be more eligible for the first call to armed training than any others.

After the work of numbering all local cards has been finished, the total will be sent to Washington, D. C. There, on October 26, a national lottery will be held, and serial numbers will be

### Equal Praise

The council abstained from endorsements on state senator, giving equal praise for Marshall Cornett, republican nominee, and Marius Petersen, democratic nominee.
