

SIGNAL LIGHTS ON UNDERPASS EYED BY DADS

Routine business—passing of ordinances, consideration of reports, applications, and building permits—occupied the greater part of Monday night's council meeting with little argument by any councilman.

Councilman Charles Thomas and Rollin Cantrall argued concerning the advisability of using the traffic signals on the underpass. Thomas holding that 95 per cent of the users considered them unnecessary, while Cantrall asked if accident and death was required before they were put in operation. The matter was left for a future council to decide.

The council referred to the city attorney a court decision presented by J. H. Napier concerning an alleged unreasonable ordinance requiring a \$500 license fee for beauty schools.

Posting of Rogers street with no parking signs during the winter months was referred to the city engineer and police committee with power to act, after the matter was introduced by Councilman Elmer Hosking.

The need for a responsible man to care for the city-owned cabins on Market street was again laid before the council by Councilman Thomas. The street department was instructed to cut the weeds about the cabins and burn them, but the selection of a caretaker was left to the police judge with the council's approval.

Councilman Thomas reported that Harold Frane, building inspector, had met with the contractors in a meeting considering the flexible building code which he is enforcing, and will meet again to consider adoption of another code more adaptable to this city.

Rebond applications and beer licenses were allowed, reports placed on file, building permits totaling \$28,000 approved, and property sale ordinances passed subject to the city attorney's approval.

An ordinance prohibiting erecting advertising posters on private property without permission of the owners involved was passed first and second readings.

make our Atlantic defense well-nigh impregnable.

Describing the American navy as "the most powerful fleet afloat," Knox said "on short notice, the fleet can take its station and dominate the sea lanes." Then he added: "That grip, however, may not be strong enough. We waited far too long to begin reinforcing it. To the limit of our capacity, we must drive steadfastly to overcome the handicap of wasted years."

"We now have 15 battleships. We will have 32," he continued, "we now have 37 cruisers; we will have 85. We now have 6 aircraft carriers; we will have 18. We now have 159 destroyers; we will have 325. We now have 104 submarines; we will have 185. We now have 1200 contestant planes; we will have over 6000. That is our long distance objective."

KENNEDY LEAVES LONDON, Oct. 22 (AP)—Ambassador Joseph P. Kennedy left today for Lisbon where he will take a clipper plane for the United States. The authoritative British Press association, noting his departure, said "He is not expected to return as ambassador."

RED CROSS TO AIM FOR 5000 MEMBERS HERE

"Our goal in Klamath county for 1940 is 5000 members and our financial goal is \$6500," says Fred Hamilton who has just been named Red Cross roll call chairman for the Klamath chapter. The roll call will be held November 11 to 30.

"Considering there are 8500 men now registered in the national draft from Klamath county, this \$6500 is less than one dollar per man registered," Hamilton declared Saturday adding that \$1500 of the amount must be secured from special gifts since membership in the Red Cross is but one dollar per year.

"This year every branch of the nation's armed forces will be expanded to meet the needs of the hour," he continued. "It is imperative that the Red Cross enlarge its assistance since thousands of recruits being enlisted have had no previous military experience and many will be hundreds of miles from their homes."

"We must increase the enrollment of Red Cross nurses. Additional first aiders must be trained to meet the needs growing out of the new national defense program. It is only through roll call that our chapter can finance this increasing program. With this responsibility in view we must not be satisfied until every American is enrolled under the Red Cross."

Hamilton has appointed committee chairmen, including G. A. Krause, special gifts committee; Robert A. Thompson, business; Lee Smith, group enrollment; Mrs. Frederick Hamilton, booths. Other appointments are under advisement and will be announced soon, it was understood.

F. Walter Webster and Paul Landry, republican candidates for the legislature, declared their determination to serve the state and this legislative district constructively if elected. There are indications of mounting public interest in the four-way race for two legislative seats among Webster, Landry, Bolvin and Henry Semon.

PILOT TAXIS PLANE 10 MILES BEFORE TAKE-OFF

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 22 (AP)—Lee U. Eyerly of Salem, pilot member of the Oregon Board of Aeronautics, Monday night told how he landed a plane in a potato patch in a heavy fog, with four passengers aboard, taxied 10 miles down a highway, and took off again on a golf course.

paratively easy peace terms. Vice Premier Laval was reported to be in Paris discussing the situation with Nazi officials.

There have been rumors here for weeks of a pending amicable arrangement with France. For a fortnight, the German press has refrained from saying anything derogatory about the vanquished nation.

British Prime Minister Winston Churchill's appeal last night to France to refrain from doing anything that might hurt the British cause, finally gives substance, however, to recurring intimations that German negotiations with France have advanced to the stage where a visit by Von Ribbentrop may clinch them.

Willkie Returns To Chicago; F. R. To Make Tour

By The Associated Press While Wendell L. Willkie returned to Chicago today for his second campaign appearance, President Roosevelt arranged to visit Wilmington, Del., and Camden, N. J., tomorrow prior to his address in Philadelphia.

In a speech in Milwaukee last night, Willkie accused the president of letting Chicago's democratic organization and two others "try to steal the election for him without even a rebuke."

He referred to democratic organizations in Jersey City, N. J., and in the Bronx, N. Y., as well as to that in Chicago and said: "Here is a candidate for president who has proclaimed himself as a liberal, as a reform candidate, but who allows three of the most corrupt political machines to try to steal the election for him without even a rebuke to them."

Mr. Roosevelt's itinerary was announced by the democratic national committee in New York. He will leave Washington by train and make a platform appearance at Wilmington. After reaching Philadelphia he will go by automobile to Camden to inspect the New York shipbuilding plant. Returning to Philadelphia, he will inspect the Cramp ship yards and Frankford arsenal and that evening speak in Convention hall, Philadelphia.

NAZI NORWAY LOSSES SET AT 67,000

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 22 (AP)—Nazi losses in the Battle of Norway on land and sea were 67,000 killed, Carl J. Hambro, exiled president of the Norwegian parliament said Monday.

Hambro was in Portland on a lecture tour. He said most Americans did not realize the cost in manpower to Germany in the speedy conquest of Norway.

"Germany has failed utterly to establish a legal government in Norway," Hambro said. "Norwegians at home are living in a state of revolution, loyal to the king, now operating the official government from headquarters in London."

The first words heard on a telephone were spoken on March 10, 1876.

the exercise of this right may not be abridged by proscribing it at the scene of a labor dispute. It has declared the streets of a city appropriate places for the dissemination of views on matters of public moment, and that labor controversies come within that category."

Chief Justice Rand, in his dissenting opinions, wrote that the state "may permit picketing at such a place by a majority or deny it to a minority without making the statute unconstitutional and without denying to the minority any constitutional right, upon the theory that there would be less liability to violence where the picketing was done by the majority rather than by the minority. Like other legislative acts, whether the making of this distinction was wise was a legislative question, with the wisdom of which the courts are not concerned. For the reasons stated, I am compelled to dissent."
