IWA ADVISED TO LISTEN TO TALK BY CIO LEADER

SEATTLE, Oct. 23 (AP)—Unions affiliated with the International Woodworkers of America have been advised by national CIO headquarters to listen to John L. Lewis' radio talk Friday night, O. M. Orton, acting president of the IWA, said here today.

A telegram said the speech would be "concerned with political issues," he said. "People have been asking me 'What if he comes out for Willie' but I say I have no idea whom he will support," Orton said. "But whatever recommendations he makes the great majority of the CIO will follow. We always do."

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HALL TELLS OF EARLY REALTY DEALINGS HERE

E. B. Hall, proprietor of the Hotel Hall, and who was a pioneer real estate man in the years of the first decade of the present century, was the guest speaker at the regular meeting of the Klamath Realty board at the Willard hotel at the Monday luncheon. This was the first meeting since the board adopted the plan for luncheons on the first and third Monday of each month, to be featured with programs.

Hall portrayed the existing conditions under which the interest of investors and intending settlers was aroused in the opportunities of the Klamath basin when it involved an arduous journey by stage from Pockama, over 36 miles of unimproved roads. In a reminiscent vein the contest between rival promoters of city subdivisions was recalled, and the financial problems of some of the pioneers in the building of the city was related. The realtors were told that in that period a great many sales were made from blueprints, to outsiders who preferred to be informed by the salesman with a map rather than to make the trip into Klamath Falls and endure the difficulties of travel. He brought intimate glimpses of some of the pioneers of the real estate business and acquainted his auditors with highlights of early history of the district.

The annual election of the Klamath Realty board was a feature of the meeting. R. C. Dale, a director since the reorganization of the realty organization and president the past year, was elected to continue on the directorate. Fred E. Fleet was also elected for a three year term on the board. The officers for the ensuing year will be chosen by the board of directors at an early session.

TATMAN CORRECTS COMMENT ON CASE

G. C. Tatman, local labor leader and prominent official of the American Federation of Labor, asked Wednesday that correction be made of statements attributed to him in connection with the supreme court ruling against the state labor law.

Tatman said he was incorrectly quoted to the effect that "the unions may take advantage of the ruling and abuse their right to picket for a short time." He asserted that he never at any time inferred that American Federation of Labor unions might abuse their privileges. His belief, he said, is to the contrary—that the AFL unions will adhere to the rules of propriety and fair dealing at all times.

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JOSEPH VICTORIN PASSES WEDNESDAY

Joseph Victorin, 72, who has made his home in Malin for the past 31 years and one of that community's most highly respected residents, died in Klamath Falls Wednesday morning following a brief illness.

Mr. Victorin was born February 17, 1867, in Melnik, Czechoslovakia, and came to the United States in 1900, first settling in Cleveland, O., where he lived for a period of two years, later moving to Fremont, Neb. where he spent three years, from there going to Loveland, Colo., for one year, and then to Ludington, Mich., where he resided for five years.

In 1909, Mr. Victorin moved with his family to Malin where he has resided since that time. He was a member of the IOOF lodge of Ludington.

Surviving Mr. Victorin is his wife, Elizabeth, two sons, Anton and Frank, and six grandchildren, all of Malin.

Funeral services will be held from the Bohemian hall in Malin Friday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock with burial in the Malin cemetery. Arrangements are being made by Ward's Klamath funeral home.
