REV. BILLESTER WILL SPEAK AT BAPTIST CHURCH

Rev. Michael Billester, traveler, missionary, lecturer, will pay

a return visit to the First Baptist church, Eighth and Washington street, Klamath Falls, from October 27 through November 1, with timely messages for all.

Mr. Billester was born in Russia, came as a small boy to America, and after completing his education, returned to his own people, a missionary. His first converts were his father, brothers and relatives. Since then, Mr. Billester has travelled extensively in the interests of Russian refugees and his travels have taken him to Spain, France, Germany, Czechoslovakia, Poland, Rumania, Bessarabia, Greece, Palestine, Latvia and Belgium. A few months ago he returned from his last European tour, where for six months he travelled through belligerent territory. He was arrested in Germany, was in Poland until three days before bombardment started, and escaped along eastern Poland into Lithuania, thence to Latvia, Sweden and at night, into the weirdly-strange blackouts of the London streets.

Mr. Billester will show his beautiful pictures, in natural color, taken in Germany, Poland, Latvia, Sweden and England, as well as recent pictures showing the conquest of Poland, Holland, Belgium and Finland. The pictures will be shown for 15 minutes before the message. Under discussion will be the unprecedented events as they affect Europe.

U. S. Making Extensive Plans To Keep New Army Strong in Spirit As Well As Methods

(Editor's note: Here's an old saying that an army is no better than its morale. With that truth in mind, the United States has made extensive plans to keep the men going into its huge new army happy and strong in spirit. The methods are related in the following story, the fourth of a series of six telling how the army will be trained and dealing with other phases of defense. Tomorrow: practice battles will stretch across the nation.)

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25 (AP)—The war department figures it will cost \$400 to house each one of its soldiers and provide the buildings and grounds needed to trim him and keep him happy. That is the figure to which the department cost breaks down. It covers the per man cost of not just barracks but of a station hospital, mess halls, recreation buildings and grounds, administration buildings, warehouses, laundries, refrigerating plants, roads, and, of course, grading a drill field.

It has nothing to do with food. William S. Knudsen of the national defense commission sagely remarked that men in the service eat about the same as they do at home except that if a man is in the army he drinks more coffee and if he is in the navy he eats more catsup.

But in these days, army officers recognize that it takes more to build an army than just feeding men and teaching them how to march and handle a gun. Twenty odd years of working with men in the citizen's military training corps and the reserve officers training corps have given the army a fund of information it did not have in 1917.

And the war department wants an army that not only knows how to handle arms, but has the spirit to handle them well, a spirit that flows from good health and the conviction that it has something worth fighting for.

General George C. Marshall, the chief of staff, puts it this way:

"The war department undertakes full responsibility for the welfare of the army and it is absolutely essential that provision be made for it."

"The whole matter of morale is an extensive one, with many ramifications seemingly far removed from simple, pleasurable athletic diversions."

"Provision is made for initial issues of athletic equipment and reading material, and for the establishment of service clubs and motion picture theatres. Hostesses and librarians are provided for in the division camps. This matter is vital to morale. "Our army will be an army of citizen soldiers and must be essentially a democratic institution. In a democracy such as ours, military discipline is attained through the exercise of leadership by our officers. Our volunteer and selected service men with the colors will quickly realize the necessity for the type of military discipline which is needed for leadership and mutual cooperation."

To help commanders in the field plan and develop recreational and welfare facilities, a new morale division is already busy. It is buying athletic equipment, magazines, books and the material for service clubs and movies.

Each regiment will have a post exchange and recreational buildings. Each division will have a service club with hostesses. Each sizeable unit will have a movie. Each company barrack will have a recreation room.

Save for a program of home service for the able bodied and hospital and social service for patients, which will be conducted

ed by the American Red Cross, the army will manage its own welfare and recreational facilities. Red Cross field directors will be stationed at each camp or cantonment.

To ride herd on camp followers and the undesirable elements that spring up on the outskirts of camps, army commanders will maintain close cooperation with local civil police and health authorities.

The new recruit, captured into the army by the drawing in Washington, will pass through a classification system that is likely to follow him the rest of his life.

Eight eminent psychologists have worked out a series of questions that will be fired at the recruit in the reception tents to find out what duties his past experience comes nearer to qualifying him for. His answers will determine his army unit and follow him out into civil life, where, again, he may be put into a job according to his abilities.

Forty-eight army officers have been given a special training course to equip them for this work. One of their duties will be to prevent such incidents as happened in numerous cases in 1917, illustrated by a newspaper reporter who was inducted into the army.

He was assigned to lugging equipment from here to there. Finally, there was need for a typist, and he volunteered for the job.

"What were you doing before you came into the army?" he was asked.

"I was a reporter."

"And is that how you were classified when you came in?"

"I don't know. That's what I told them."

They checked up his classification. There it was, plain as day, after his name was the notation: "Porter."
