Petersen Gives Statement on Senate Campaign Platform

Marius Petersen, candidate for state senator from this district and a mill operator in Lake county, made public his campaign statement Saturday.

It follows:

Conservation of Timber and Water Resources

If I am elected to the state senate, I shall seek the conservation of our timber and water resources. In order to preserve our water sheds and the continuation of our timber operation, we must act, and act quickly, without delay for our timber is dwindling away fast. In order to preserve our water the year around and avoid having floods in the spring, I propose that a law be passed compelling every timber owner to cut his timber on selective basis. In doing so, we will eliminate exchange of



cut over land with the national forest, and, in that way, save the tax payers a great loss. I believe that this is very important from a standpoint of farmers and tax payers, and also timber men. In fact, every citizen will benefit by a law of this nature.

I pledge myself to support such a measure.

I propose a \$50.00 per month pension at 60 years of age.

I believe in an old age pension so that our old people can live in security and our young people can go to work. Get away from relief as much as possible. Machinery has taken the jobs away from the worker.

We are producing more than we can consume. Let humanity benefit by our over-production.

We have plenty of room for more taxes on liquor and luxuries that will maintain and take care of our elderly people. WE OWE IT TO THEM!

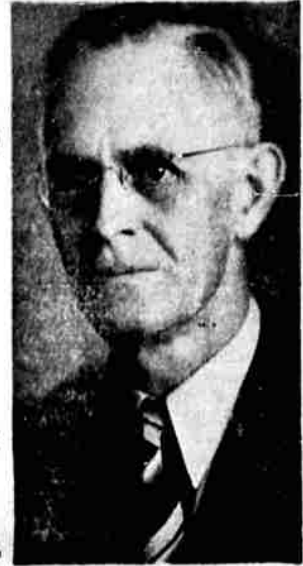

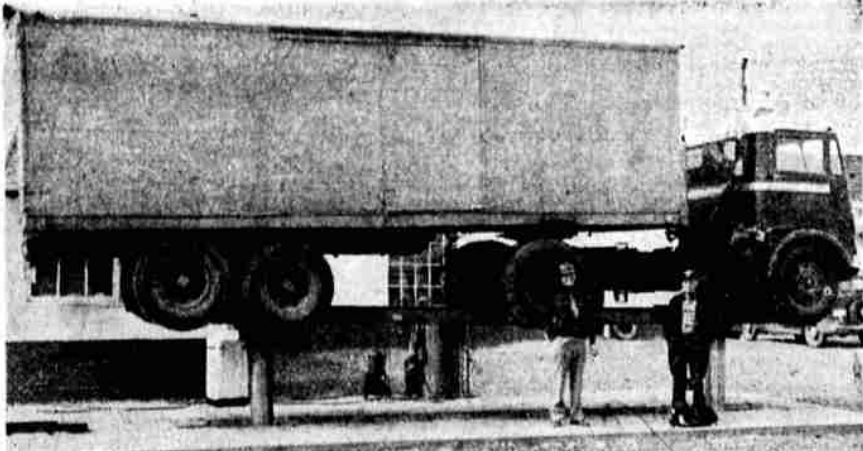
