

T. B. TEST TO BE GIVEN ALL FIRST GRADERS

One of the vital steps toward prevention of tuberculosis within the community is now underway in the city and a portion of the county schools where tuberculin tests are being given to all first grade pupils, according to a report made by Dr. P. H. Rozendal, county health officer, at the Monday night meeting of the Klamath County Public Health association's executive board held at the Nelson Reed home on Del Moro street.

Tests have already been given at Mills and Roosevelt school where the percentage of positive reactors was found almost negligible. Dr. Rozendal stated. He made tests in the first grade of the Bly school Monday and will complete testing in the city schools within the coming two weeks. He also said that as much testing as time will allow will be done in schools of the county.

All cases of positive reactors are immediately followed up. Dr. Rozendal reported, by more thorough examination and location of the source of contact.

The health association is particularly interested in this phase of tuberculosis work not only for its preventive value but because the testing is one of the projects stressed in its annual program for which funds are raised annually by the sale of anti-tuberculosis Christmas seals. By the location of early infection of this disease in children, it is felt that tuberculosis will be eventually stamped out in the coming generations.

SCIO MUST KEEP ITS JAILHOUSE

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 29 (UP)—State police said here recently that Scio is probably a very "virtuous town."

EDUCATORS FROM THREE STATES MEET AT U. OF O.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Oct. 29—(Special)—Educators from Oregon, Washington and Idaho will meet on the University of Oregon campus November 1 and 2 to discuss the general topic "Progress of Curriculum Improvement in Oregon," under the auspices of the Inland Empire Curriculum society, it was announced here by Hugh B. Wood, professor of education.

Featured speaker for the event will be Herbert B. Bruner, professor of education at Columbia university, and a noted authority on school curriculum. He will speak at the banquet session Friday evening.

The meeting will open Friday morning when Harry Johnson, principal of Eugene high school, will give a review of curriculum progress in Oregon. At the afternoon session Dr. Wood will speak on "The Oregon Cooperative Curriculum Study Project." Roben J. Maasko, president of the Eastern Oregon College of Education, will lead the panel discussion.

TRY AT RECORD BURBANK, Calif., Oct. 29 (UP)—G. T. Baker, president of the Florida Air Lines, said Monday night he will attempt a transcontinental transport speed record from Burbank to Jacksonville, Fla., this week in a new Lockheed Lodestar plane. OFFICIALS PRAISE WOMEN'S PROGRAM

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The Honorable Frank Knox, secretary of the navy, and J. Edgar Hoover, director of the federal bureau of investigation, are among the prominent officials of the United States government who have written letters to Mrs. Saldie Orr Dunbar, president of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, commenting on and highly commending the patriotic program recently projected by the first vice president and chairman of the golden jubilee, Mrs. John L. Whitehurst, for the final year of white participation in the golden jubilee celebration.

Secretary Knox says: "In an effort to assist our most worthy project, I am outlining the views and aims of the department which I am privileged to direct: (a) registration of man power for its uses in national defense, so we may man the navy and the army most efficiently; (b) to speedup the material building of the navy, as well as our brother service, the army. These are our aims and in them you may find means to support them. I appreciate deeply the spirit and the strength which is behind your organization, and desire to thank you for giving me an opportunity to express my views on the program to be used in connection with your golden jubilee."

Mr. Hoover, with whom the federation has worked closely for a number of years, writes: "I have received your letter of August 23, 1940, and I deeply appreciate your sending me a copy of the appeal being used by the General Federation of Women's Clubs in its nation-wide drive for the preservation of democratic principles in the United States."

PIGEONS TO BRING VOTES FROM UTAH MOUNTAIN TOWNS

SALT LAKE CITY, Oct. 29 (UP)—If America's choice of a president depends on the vote in the remote Utah mountain communities of Grouse Creek, Yost and Lucin, candidates Roosevelt and Willkie won't have to wait several days for the decision, thanks to the Brigham City Carrier Pigeon club.

On election night, each counting board will have a caged pigeon ready to speed the news to Brigham and the telegraph wires.

No telephone, or telegraph service extends to the tiny communities, and in the past returns have been delayed as much as a week by wash-outs of mountain trails.

The judges plan to keep duplicates of the results, however, just in case the pigeons disprove the outcome.

NEW MEASURE WOULD EXEMPT HOMES FROM TAX

SALEM, Oct. 29 (UP)—An initiative measure which would exempt from taxation the first \$2000 in case value of any home in Oregon was filed with the state department Monday by the Home Owners Tax Exemption League of Portland, of which Charles H. Ager of Portland is organizer.

The measure, which would be on the ballot in November 1942 if petitions are successful, would exempt homes where the taxes would be needed to pay existing state, county, municipal and district bonded debt. It would be a constitutional amendment.

LUMBER WORKERS SUPPORT LEWIS

SEATTLE, Oct. 29 (UP)—Officers of the International Woodworkers of America, a CIO affiliate claiming membership of about 50,000 loggers and mill workers, Monday night dispatched a telegram to CIO President John L. Lewis pledging "unqualified support" in his endorsement of Republican Presidential Nominee Wendell L. Willkie.

The telegram was signed by Acting President O. M. Orton and Secretary-treasurer B. J. McCarty. A similar declaration of confidence was made public by McCarty Saturday.

Support of Lewis, they said was based on a resolution adopted by the recent IWA convention pledging approval of any commitment made by Lewis and labor's non-partisan league.

McCarty and Orton were understood to have conferred with IWA President Harold J. Pritchett of Vancouver, B. C., unable to enter this country for lack of a passport visa.

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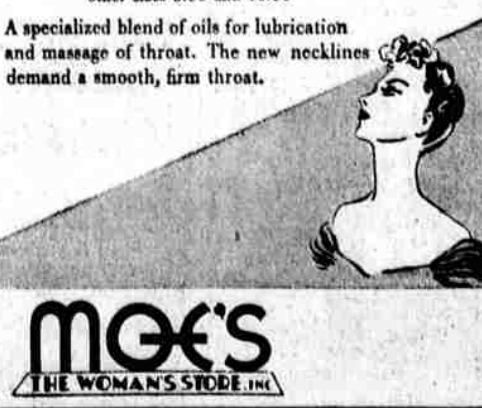
