OREGON UNIONS REPUDIATE LEWIS

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 29 (UP)—Two of Oregon's largest CIO local unions with total memberships of more than 3000, Monday repudiated John L. Lewis, CIO president, for his recent speech endorsing Wendell L. Willkie for president.

They were No. 3 of the International Woodworkers of America with 1600 members and No. 1-8 of the International Longshoremen and Warehousemen's union with about 1400 members.

Morris Fisher, secretary of the longshoremen's local, wired Lewis: "We request your resignation as president of the CIO."

The woodworkers sent President Roosevelt a copy of a resolution pledging support of his candidacy for a third term, with another copy to Lewis.

SEATTLE, Oct. 29 (AP)—The lot of the football official isn't much better than that of a baseball umpire, but it's still better. There are none of those prolonged, on-the-spot beefs.

But the football official has his own viewpoint, and he insists it's a better viewpoint than that of anybody else in the stadium. "The coach is usually about 50 yards away from the play, and the scout is about 150 yards away, up in the press box. We're right there on the field and when we call 'em, it's because we see 'em," explains H. H. "Hub" Huebel, one-time quarterback at Michigan under "Point-a-Minute" Yost.

Hub is one of the oldest officials in point of service in the northwest, and he got quite a thrill a few weeks ago when a skinny youngster trotted out to him and said: Huebel for Steele.

It was his 155-pound son Jack. Ohio States' charges that Cornell's Coach Carn Snavely called signals from the bench reminded Huebel of similar goings-on in a Rose Bowl game about 20 years ago.

"I noticed the eastern coach sitting higher on the bench than his players. I watched him and was certain he was signalling his quarterback, but I had no definite proof.

"Finally the easterners' quarterback called for a placekick. Then he looked toward the bench and I saw the coach shake his head. Immediately the quarterback shouted 'Change signals.'

"So I conferred with the referee and told him I had evidence there was coaching from the bench. We informed the quarterback to go ahead with the placekick or we'd penalize his team 15 yards.

"He went ahead with the placekick. He didn't squawk much, but boy, did that coach howl!"

War Department Prepares For Attack on Any Possible Part of West Hemisphere

(Editor's Note: During the past week Associated Press has presented a series of stories relating to the training of the new huge army being built by the United States and to other phases of our defense. The sixth and final article discusses the possible theatres of war, all covered by defense plans which constantly are kept up to date with changing world developments.)

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29 (AP) Poke around the war department and ask questions and you will find that it has a complete plan of defense worked out to flatten any type of attack upon the United States that skilled officers can imagine.

Nor are the plans allowed to gather any dust. Officers fresh from the field, familiar with the areas covered by the individual plans, are continually going over them at the army war college, suggesting changes which the strategists in the war plans division ponder—and frequently adopt.

Thus they keep the defense plans a live and ready instrument, fully cognizant of changing weapons and modes of warfare. And though the strategic location of the United States narrows and sharpens the underlying philosophy of the war plans, it also widens the possible theatres of operations.

Basically, the war plans rest upon two points: Keep the Panama Canal clear at all times for the quick movement of the fleet from one ocean to the other.

Make certain that no aggressor from abroad has a base in this hemisphere from which to operate.

Unlike European nations such as, say, France, which envisaged a theatre of operations along the German border and built the Maginot line, or another possible one along the Italian border and established garrisons, the United States has to imagine broader possibilities. France got crossed up when Germany used its own plan instead of the one the French strategists had worked out for Germany to use.

But it is not any battle along the Mexican border or the Canadian border that the United States army is thinking about. Of course, a few marauding chickens have been shot in the wrong garden a few times in the past along the Rio Grande, but those things worked out. The United States expects no trouble along either its northern or its southern borders.

It hopes to do whatever fighting it may have to do farther away from home than that.

Plans that exist for meeting any hostile army on its own continental borders are last ditch plans. For the United States, these borders would be something less than the one yard line. They would be the last pair of inches before touchdown.

The far flung areas of the Pacific, the Atlantic, South America, the Panama Canal and Central America are what hold the watchful eyes of the army and navy departments.

Wake, Midway, Guam, the Hawaiian and Philippine Islands, all of them signposts on the route to the Orient, have been made increasingly important by the Japanese flare-up.

The army does not regard them as offensive outposts for use in any attack upon Japan. But each of them shortens the distance an attacking force would have to travel in moving against the west coast.

And north of Hawaii lie the immensely rich territory of Alaska and the Aleutian Islands. Both the army and navy are establishing new bases in Alaska, putting reconnaissance and surveillance outposts in the Aleutians. The army figures that if they held in reasonable strength, no enemy will try any invasion of the northwestern United States and thus lay itself open to a flank attack.

In the Atlantic and Caribbean, the army and navy are prepared to operate as a team to watch over the new bases obtained from Great Britain. They help to fence off attack upon both the Atlantic coast and the Panama Canal.

From Newfoundland, for instance, an enemy could operate by air against the big cities on the seaboard as far south as the Potomac.

From the Bahamas, air operations could strike as far inland as the Alleghenies.

Puerto Rico is within striking distance of the United States and, in the hands of an enemy, could be used to smite coastwise commerce and the canal. The lesser Antilles, Trinidad, Jamaica, all of these are strategic points which stand about the entrance to the canal. In the hands of an enemy, they would be a constant menace, just as would the Galapagos Islands in the Pacific, any of the spots along the Central American coast, or the mainland of South America. Any one of the republics outside nation would be regarded as a menace to the security of all.

Consequently, the army is developing a highly mobile, well armed, seasoned force which can leap to the aid of any republic in this hemisphere upon whose territory an aggressor

might seek to establish a base. Brigadier General George U. Strong, assistant chief of staff, puts it this way: "The establishment of a base by an aggressor from abroad in the territory of one of the other American republics is just as real and just as dangerous a threat against us as against the country in whose territory the base is seized."

Many new precautions, in addition to the Caribbean bases, have been taken to strengthen the Panama Canal defenses. A much stronger garrison is stationed there. New air facilities are being added. Harbor defenses, anti-aircraft guns, pursuit and bombing planes have been increased. New locks are being added.

The new locks, like many of the other precautions, have as one purpose the preventing of sabotage. An ever watchful eye is kept out for any effort to blow up a vessel in the locks, or to dynamite locks, dams, power stations and other vital points. New devices are continually being added to supplement human watchfulness.

No chances are being taken with this key to the American defense system.

TULELAKE TO HAVE REPUBLICAN MEET

W. H. Weitkamp of Tulelake, chairman of the Willkie-McNary club of that district, announced that there will be a republican meeting at the Tulelake high school gymnasium Wednesday evening at 8:30 o'clock.

Weitkamp announced that a prominent republican speaker will address the gathering, and urged people from Merrill and Malin to attend.

Music will be furnished by the high school band.

TATMAN AFFIRMS STAND OPPOSED TO PORTLAND COUNCIL

G. C. Tatman, member of the executive board of the state federation of labor, wired word to Portland Tuesday that he is standing firmly behind the endorsement of Homer D. Angell for reelection to the United States congress.

Tatman's action came as the result of an endorsement of Mrs. Nan Wood Honeyman for congress by the central labor council of Portland in opposition to the Angell endorsement, which was made September 7 by the executive board of the state federation.

Tatman expressed his fullest support for Angell and described him as being held in high regard by Oregon labor. Tatman's wire was sent to D. E. Nickerson, executive secretary of the state federation.

Action of the Portland central labor council, in opposition to the stand of the executive board, will be objected to vigorously by the state federation and local brotherhoods, Tatman said.

The local labor official produced a copy of an endorsement of Angell by William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, as published recently in the Oregon Labor Press.
