

FOOD STAMPS TO BE HANDLED ON MAIL BASIS

Food stamps, when the U. S. department of agriculture's plan is extended to this county on November 1, will be handled on a mail order basis, according to announcement made today by Jack Luhn, chairman of the state public welfare commission, and Donald A. Fa'ed, local representative of the Surplus Marketing administration.

Klamath county is one of many counties in the new Oregon area to receive the stamp plan. All families receiving public assistance will be eligible to purchase food stamps by mail after they have been declared eligible by Altha Urquhart, county welfare administrator. Records already in the welfare department office permit making up the list of eligibles without requiring personal interview.

"Upon completion of the list of eligibles," declared Mrs. Urquhart, county welfare administrator, "detailed information will be sent each family. How the plan operates, what needs to be done to buy food stamps by mail—all this will be carefully explained."

Purpose of the plan is to move over-abundant crops into the home of under-consuming families. For every dollar worth of orange colored food stamps, good for any and all foods for human consumption, stamp plan participants receive 50 cents free of blue surplus food stamps. The blue stamps are good only to purchase those foods which are designated as "in surplus" by the secretary of agriculture.

Stamps are used in the same manner as cash at any food store which wishes to accept stamps. Such stores must be approved by the Surplus Marketing administration which redeems the stamps for payment to the retailer by the U. S. treasury. It is found that most retailers turn their stamp cards over to wholesalers at payments on account.

The inauguration of the food stamp plan eliminates direct distribution of surplus commodities through welfare department trucks and depots.

On the surplus food list at the present time are: butter, eggs, all pork which is not cooked or packed in glass or metal containers, pork lard, dried prunes, raisins, rice, corn meal, hominy grits, and white, whole wheat
