SILVER LAKE MAY SELL TIMBER LOT

SILVER LAKE — J. W. O'Keefe, representing the Silver Lake Irrigation district, went to Klamath Falls Monday to confer with Charles E. Stricklin, state engineer, concerning the sale of a tract of yellow pine timber owned by the district in Thompson valley.

J. Kimball of the Weyerhaeuser company has made the district an offer for the timber which is comprised of 1,263,000 feet. Such a sale would enable the district to make many necessary improvements, O'Keefe said.

Repairs are needed on the dam in Thompson valley, on the division dam and on the two mile flume that carries water to the ditches.

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TULELAKE LETS CONTRACT FOR SEWER SYSTEM

TULELAKE — The city's proposed sewer system took concrete form Monday night with the awarding by the city council of the contract to Manuel Smith, Oakland, who submitted a bid of \$42,289.09. Only other bid submitted was by Clifford Dunn, Klamath Falls, whose bid was approximately \$200 higher.

The above figure is exclusive of attorney and engineer's fees which are expected to bring the total cost of the system to between \$48,000 and \$50,000.

Seven per cent assessment bonds were purchased by the contractor. Lot assessments in the newly created sanitary district are not to exceed \$175, all lots to be assessed equally. The disposal plant will be located one-quarter mile south of town and although specifications on the plant have as yet not been released by City Clerk Harold Roth, the plant will be similar to plants installed at Merrill and Malin.

Work on the project will get underway by November 14.
